

On Farm Reported Favorable by Tom Roberts of AAA — March-April Behavior—About Arabia—Scarcity Boosts Prices—Community Asset — SOS Organized.

Tom Roberts of the AAA has lately surveyed agricultural and livestock conditions in Wayne county. Despite less snow than usual he finds, by reason of a few soaking rains, the ground well mellowed. Comparative freedom from freezing permitted moisture to soak in. He says seeding small grain in March usually means a heavier stand. Mr. Roberts finds pastures three weeks ahead of what they were a year ago. More ground is devoted to grass, and the corn acreage has dropped one per cent.

The survey revealed an increase of four per cent in the number of feeder cattle in the county. Milch cow population is about the same as last year. Sheep have decreased two per cent. Ten per cent more hogs are in the county. Pigs have increased five per cent.

Mr. Roberts says farmers have been operating larger acreages, notwithstanding less help. Modern equipment has made this possible, though he explains that machines are wearing out and often need to be replaced. Farmers have been patching equipment and anxiously looking forward to the time when replacements will be available. Mr. Roberts says farmers can buy manure spreaders which they do not need, but cannot buy end-gate seeders which they do need.

Mr. Roberts sees a possible solution for the acute housing shortage in municipal centers. Increased acreage, handled by one family has often left a vacant house. With two houses on a farm, one is often empty. The total number of vacant houses in the county would markedly help solve a distressing problem. A family could enjoy the landscape and fresh air of the country, and the household cash replenisher could board his car and reach town in time to work.

Mr. Roberts stresses the need for more farm help. He adds that his office and County Agent W. R. Harder's office have records for farm requirements and can connect anyone wanting a job with an attractive opportunity. This helpful service costs nothing.

Weather Uncertainty. How April will behave after a comparatively mild March causes some speculation. There are plenty of precedents for April extremes. The Omaha World-Herald reports that in 1910 March was 18.6 degrees above normal, but that two inches of snow fell on April 17. Consulting the Omaha Weather Bureau, the World-Herald says "out of 42 balmy months of March, only 15 have been followed by cold weather in April." Thus, experience gives ground for hope. The weather is always uncertain, but March and April are particularly so.

Rev. W. A. Mansur Writes. In The Arab World appears an article by Rev. W. A. Mansur of Omaha, former pastor of the Methodist church in Winside. The writer emphasizes the little people generally know about Arabia and the progress it has made under heavy handicaps. He praises the abolition of idolatry under the leadership of Mohammed centuries ago, and mentions spiritual development that followed his inspiration. Rev. Mr. Mansur thinks the Arabs are not understood and therefore not accurately or justly appraised. He is keenly interested in world affairs and often raises his voice in behalf of improving the social and religious order.

Farm and Town Properties. Twenty-five years ago farm lands zoomed all up of proportion to actual values, but following the late war prices have been kept within reason. A determination not to repeat the experience after World War I has been reasonably successful. Farm land prices are not out of line with real worth based on probable earnings. But town property has been soaring. This is due to housing shortage following years of scarcity of material and help. And people are not buying houses for speculation. They are buying them to secure living quarters. Town prices are now having their innings, and lower values are not an sight at this writing.

Able Leadership. Prof. Russel Anderson's versatility as a music leader adds immeasurably to his value. Last week he led a group of training school students through the evolution of a musical performance. A packed, pleased house attested to his success. The youngsters did exceedingly well what they were trained to do. Prof. Anderson is perfectly at home in shaping either a comedy or serious role. He is a community asset as well as a college asset.

Give Grass a Chance. At this time of year when tender grass is starting, children are tempted to wear a path through it instead of sticking to sidewalks. This thoughtlessness has prompted organization of the SOS—"Stay on Sidewalks"—in one department of the Wayne high school. In that

Need Is Urgent For More Foods

USDA Formulates Program Of Increasing Supplies For Stricken Areas.

To meet the urgent need for food for war-torn and famine-stricken countries, USDA meetings have been called to promote increased food production. Wayne county USDA council, in special session at the AAA office Tuesday evening, considered greater grain acreages, more gardens and food saving as means of relieving the distress. The local program was formulated. A similar meeting was held in Dixon, county.

Gardens are just as important now as during the war, it was pointed out, because war and drought have caused great reduction in grain supplies of the world. Veterans returning from war zones report desperate conditions abroad, with civilians glad to eat discarded morsels. If peat is to be permanent these people must be supplied with grain for food. USDA stresses.

Corn and wheat, on which people may subsist are easier to ship than meat. For this reason, USDA urges greatest possible production. It is noted that Nebraska grains the past year were of better quality than grains in any state. They were drier and thus stumped better. USDA also stresses the need to continue beef and pork production. But, T. P. Roberts is informed, the government asks marketing stock with less fat so as to save the extra grain for shipment.

Gardens are important for supplying essential foods for consumption here and abroad. Nine recommendations as to homekeepers can help in the emergency food program, are presented by the board. Cut down wastage of bread is one suggestion. It is estimated that five per cent, or one slice of every loaf baked, goes into the garbage can. Reduce the amount of bread used through substituting potatoes and oat cereals, also using fruits instead of cakes and pastries for dessert. Use less wheat cereals by alternating foods. Save cooking oils by using drippings for cooking and seasoning foods. Hold down the number of fried foods served. Save and re-use fats and oils for cooking. Keep back grease for cooking and render excess fats on meats. All fats that cannot be re-used should be turned in to the butcher or grocer. Save on oils and salad dressings.

All public eating houses have been urged to save food supplies.

BOND VOTING FOR MEMORIAL PARK IS NOW IN PROSPECT.

SEEDING of Memorial Park, north of Iowa, is one more step in the direction of an improvement vital to the future of the community. The prospect is also a source of high satisfaction to widely scattered surrounding areas. A possible legal barrier to voting sufficient bonds to finance the enterprise has been explained away by J. H. Morrison, member of a committee in charge of plans. He says fully informed advice reveals a course wholly within the law. He thinks the bond question will be ready to submit to electors in mid-summer. Then the work of building the proposed recreation field may proceed as rapidly as practical judgment directs. The plan includes a modern swimming pool, picnic grounds, golf course, and other means of diversion. Mr. Morrison's idea is to make the park attractive not only for families of Wayne, but for those of the entire county and adjoining counties. He would have a park provide recreation and rest for families of varied tastes without favor or distinction. The improvement is deemed one needed now to keep the town going in the right direction.

C. I. Blake Passes Away at Chambers After Living Nearly Century.

C. I. Blake, pioneer of Wakefield and one of the first homesteaders in this state, passed away at Chambers, Neb., Wednesday evening, March 27, at 6:45, aged 98 years, 8 months and 8 days. Funeral rites were conducted Friday at 2:30 from the Methodist church in Chambers. Services were held Saturday at 2:00 from Hyspe road and at 2:30 from the Wakefield Methodist church with Rev. Basil Anderson of Norfolk officiating. Committal followed in Wakefield cemetery.

Closs Isaac Blake was born in Sweden July 19, 1847, and came to this country at the age of 6, settling near Chicago where he grew to manhood. He was baptized in the Swedish Lutheran church. Mr. Blake and Miss Carrie Miner were married at Sioux City March 10, 1878, and the couple recently observed their 68th wedding anniversary. Mr. Blake took an active part in Wakefield's 50th anniversary celebration some years ago.

The Blakes moved in 1900 from Wakefield to Holt county. Mr. Blake leaves his wife and 11 children. William Blake of Burwell, Neb., Della Coolidge of Amelia, Neb., Edward Blough of Hebron, Neb., Myrtle McCullough of Hebron, Cal. Margie Sylvant of Douglas, Wyo., Goldie Nachman of Douglas, Lee Blake of O'Neill, Neb., Pearl Gankel of Burwell, Bessie Nachman of Bassett, Neb., Gladys Smith of Amelia, and Guy Blake of Chambers. Two children, Etta Park of Wakefield, and Frank Blake of Bassett, preceded Mr. Blake in death. There are 46 grandchildren and 26 great grandchildren.

Paul F. Danielson, Who Had Served Long in Navy, Dies in Omaha.

Paul F. Danielson, 29, of Winside, former navy man, was killed late Thursday, March 28, in a water main dirt cave-in in Omaha where he was working. Leo Perry, 28, of Council Bluffs, also lost his life, and Everett Cornelison and F. M. Sheppard were injured in the accident.

The men were working at the bottom of the 10-foot ditch in which a water main is being laid when the dirt caved in, burying the four under two tons of earth. Other workmen dug the men out, but the two died before arrival at a hospital.

Funeral for Mr. Danielson was in Omaha Monday at 2. Mr. Danielson received an honorable discharge from the navy last Christmas. He had served in the Pacific area over two years. Mrs. Danielson and two children resided in Winside during the time Mr. Danielson was in service. They lived in Wayne a few months. ONLY ONE COUNTY OFFICE ATTRACTS MANY CANDIDATES

THE county commissioner's vacancy in the First district is the only office that has drawn numerous candidates. There is a dearth of aspirants so far for other offices. The commissioner receives comparatively small pay. He is not paid in accordance with the responsibility he bears. But anyway the place is in demand. The board of three commissioners is the business department of the county. Its members arrange assessments and meet financial obligations. They direct the county's business affairs. The importance of their service requires sound business judgment. But there is no wild rush for other and more highly paid offices. This condition of scarcity follows a rule which when times are flush salaries paid county officers are not normally attractive when wages in other fields soar with the increased cost of living.

Light Vote Cast In City Election

L.W. McNatt, Bernard Meyer New Officers Picked Here Tuesday.

In Wayne city election Tuesday, with a very light cast, L. W. McNatt was elected mayor. L. W. Ellis, treasurer, W. S. Bressler clerk, G. A. Lamberson police magistrate, Bernard Meyer, W. A. Hiscox and L. B. McClure councilmen, Mrs. Edith Wightman and T. S. Hook school board members. McNatt and Meyer are new in their offices.

Winside Farmer Fatally Injured

Nick Bohm Sustains Skull Fracture When Returning Home with Plow.

Nick Bohm, 63, of five miles south and a half west of Winside, was fatally injured about 11:30 Friday morning when the team he was driving home from a field ran away on the highway and the attached walking plow evidently struck his head, fracturing the skull. Mr. Bohm's son, John, who had been disking in a nearby field, found his father when he was returning home a few minutes later. John hurried to the home a short distance away to get the family car and rushed his father to Winside for medical care. Mr. Bohm was lifeless when he reached Winside. County Attorney Burr R. Davis and Sheriff Hans Tietgen were summoned as coroner's jury. They said no investigation would be necessary.

No one witnessed the accident, but it appears that when the horses ran the nose of the plow dug into the ground and then flew up and struck Mr. Bohm on the head. Mr. Bohm and one of the horses had been dragged about 100 feet and Mr. Bohm lay about 12 feet from the point of the plow. Both horses stopped near the scene. One was tangled badly in the harness and was lying on the road. The other was standing nearby.

Funeral services were conducted Wednesday afternoon at 1:15 at the home and at 2 at St. Paul Lutheran church in Winside with Rev. H. M. Hilpert officiating. Gaebler & Neely had charge of burial. Pallbearers were Adolph Miller, G. C. Hoffman, Henry and William Deck, Walter Werner and Ed. Gathje.

Nico Bohm was born July 20, 1882, in Schleswig-Holstein, Germany, to Gustav and Henry Bohm. He came to America with relatives in the spring of 1908. The folks came directly to the Storm Lake, Ia., region. Mr. Bohm worked on a farm there a few years and then went to Persh, Ia., where he farmed with his brother-in-law a year. In 1918 he came to Winside community and worked on farms near Winside.

Mr. Bohm began farming for himself west of Altona. From there he moved to a place five miles south and three east of Winside in the spring of 1918. He married Mathilde Thomsen March 12, 1919. In the spring of 1922, Mr. and Mrs. Bohm moved to a farm six miles south and one east of Winside. They remained on that farm until 1928 when they went to Iroquois, S. D. In 1931, the folks moved back to a farm four miles south and two west of Winside. In 1933 the family moved to a farm five miles south and one-half west of Winside, where they had resided since.

Mr. Bohm leaves his wife, the former Tillie Thomsen, two daughters, Mrs. Gertrude Hibbing of Winside, and Mrs. Henry Proehl of San Pedro, Cal., and two sons, John at home, and Sic Henry who this week received an honorable discharge from the navy at Tacoma, Wash., after serving two years in both the European and Pacific theatres. He also leaves a sister, Mrs. Hannes Nissen of Hancock, Minn., and other members of the family in Germany, and four grandchildren, Gary and Carol Hibbing and Helen and Robert Proehl.

With hundreds of workers still slated for separation, the naval gun factory reported it has reduced personnel from a peak of 24,300 to 12,300. A factory spokesman said it is impossible to estimate the full extent of the final cut-back, but he pointed out normal employment in 1938 was 8,000.

The Byrd committee has been making a study of possible economies in the federal government, and in a recent report to the president pointed out that 3,649,769 civilians are now on the federal payroll, compared with 992,953 in August, 1939.

fertilizers, insecticides, fungicides, use of agricultural products, how to use farm buildings and other kindred subjects. The new book will be sent to the public printer toward the end of 1946 and will be ready for distribution some time in 1947.

From the farmers come the questions as to how the demand can be met with even less labor on the farm and an acute shortage of farm machinery, especially in the middle west.

But farm labor must have tools to work with, and strikes, limitation of government allotments of steel and other materials for machinery output until now the dealers in every community are wholly unable to meet even a small part of the farm demand.

Some of the smaller farm machinery factories are working and turning out what they can with the materials and labor available, but the big plants have been mostly idle since January 21, when the unions made their demand for new collective bargaining contracts.

The civilian production administrator has issued his rules for the issuance of priorities for all building purposes. The idea is to curtail the use of lumber and other building materials for commercial structures in order that they may be used for the erection of homes.

Under this system, practically all building materials are to be channeled to the construction of homes. Even public buildings and government structures will have to wait.

ment land near Columbus. The district, if it acquires the land, plans industrial development to utilize electric energy generated by the Loup project. Edwin Burr, former owner and publisher of the Central City Nonpareil, has purchased a printing establishment in Lakeland, Fla. Capt. Burr was recently discharged from the army. He served in World Wars I and II. Soil conservation officials here state that while they will feature dams in Nebraska, they will carry on tree planting in the shelterbelt program. Members of the Nebraska Aeronautical Commission are coming to Washington for their annual conferences with federal agencies including the army, civil aeronautics administration and committees of congress. The federal-aid airport bill and CAA appropriations are objects of the Nebraska commission's interest. The price control extension bill is expected on the floor of the house soon. OPA supporters want continuance to combat inflation. Opponents say if OPA restrictions are terminated, we will have some advance in prices for a short period of time but that we will have increased production to check price rises. The bill will set off bitter debate. Washington cherry blossoms, now called "Korean" blossoms, attracted hundreds of thousands of visitors. Nebraskans claim Nebraska apple blossoms are better. Washington cherry blossoms have no scent and the trees bear no fruit. The house passed another surplus appropriation rescission bill. It amounted to over six billion dollars. Considerable money for lend-lease was not rescinded. This was because of contracts made by the United States prior to V-J day. The minority tried to cut \$200,000,000 from present lend-lease, of which \$180,000,000 had been allotted to Russia, some of it for war supplies. The minority figured the war was over and it was no longer necessary for Uncle Sam to spend his money for that purpose. The majority claimed the contract was made, and the amendment was defeated. So the Russian will continue to get lend-lease aid for war goods. Letters and telegrams are coming to Washington asking intervention by the state department to insure General Mihalovich a fair trial. He was captured recently by Marshall Tito's forces in Yugoslavia. The general belief is that this is the end of the road for the Chetnik leader who in 1941 took to the hills and opened guerrilla warfare on the German invaders of Yugoslavia. The soviet radio station in the Pentagon has been granted a three-month extension of life, it was learned. The three-band transmitter, which daily transmits thousands upon thousands of coded words between Washington and Moscow, was captured by Russia as a war aid. The White House re-

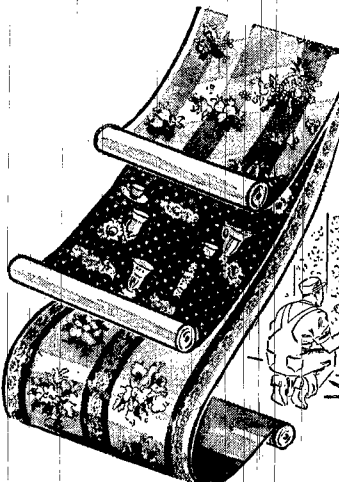

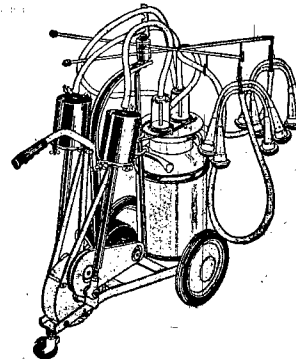

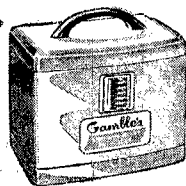

Library News

"All heaven and earth are in the pages of a good book." (I didn't make that up—Christopher Morley said it.) He meant that the man who reads becomes better equipped to understand and appreciate life. And, more important to the common good, he becomes a better citizen.

Yet 35,000,000 people in the United States are without public libraries. The Hill-Douglas bill now before congress will make it possible for every state to attack this problem at once. If it becomes a law, this state will have up to \$100,000 a year for four years to bring libraries to the people without them. We can all help by writing to our congressman and asking him to support bills H.R. 5742 and S. 1920.

We have some good new books to tell you about this week. Morris L. Ernst, a lawyer and writer, has written a book called The First Freedom. It is a plea for freedom of communication. Governments are not alone in restricting the flow of thought throughout the world. In this country the media of mass communication—press, radio and motion pictures—are dominated by a few score of people, and while this book is not a criticism of those people the author points to the frightening trend of monopoly in the mass communication fields.

Mary Jane Ward has written The Snake Pit, which is the story of a girl who lost her mind and found it. A brilliant and uncommonly promising picture of life in a mental hospital. It might have been a horror story, but it is told with such warmth and sympathy and touches of humor that the reader surrenders to its spell, rejoices with Virginia when she improves, grows despondent at her relapses and shares in the final joy of her release. It is a stark, human experience, told—and superbly told—in novel form.
