

"The man who makes a practice of 'deing ready' for drouths, depressions, or what have you, may be entirely unspectacular, but it is significant to observe that he is usually in pretty good shape financially."

Under this system, practically all building materiais are to be channeled to the construction of homes. Even public buildings and government structures will have to wait. Exempted from the limitations will be hospitals and other buildings required by the veterans administration, some of which are only in the planning stage. Among other exemptions are slos and fencing materials for farms. Also the emergency program for veterans housing will be fully protected.

Included in the priorities will be those for construction or repairs for home either in cities or on farms which will cost more than \$400. Jobs costing \$1.000 or more for stores, theaters, or other commercial structures, will have to be paised upon by the reviewing board, as will churches, schools, hospitals, farm buildings other than dwellings, and other buildings For factories, plants or other industrial structures, and airports utility buildings, etc., the limits will be \$15.000. For smaller structures of every kind the limitation will be \$200. Nobody knows how the program is going to work out. Materials are very short, especially lumber, and skilled labor is scarce in most sections of the country, Now about 70 per cent of lumber and buildings other than homes.




