

The OPA has aroused a lot of fiery disagreement. Most persons in business and agriculture think the setup which was adopted as a war measure should at least be greatly modified. It is charged with obstructing production and creating scarcities, thus hindering reconstruction and encouraging rather than prevening inflation. On the other hand, labor union leaders particularly want maintenance of price controls without Reeping down wages. Columnist Louis Bromfield, who is critical of the OPA, concludes his treatment of the subject with this paragraph: "The issue is much greater than merely the question of whether OPA shall or shall not survive. It is a question of whether we shall rid ourselves of an alien system of government controls and whether the whole of the country shall be dominated and regimented by a small, aggressive and tightly organized minority from the great cities fer its own selfish needs and at the behest and pressure of other nations which cannot afford economic or even individual freedom."
