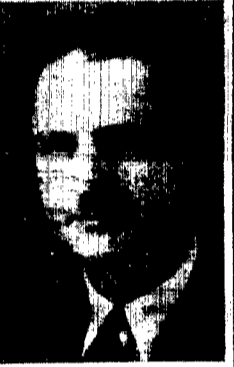

**Vet's Corner**

L. J. Miller, veterans administration training officer, was in Wayne April 26 relative to on-the-job training programs here.

A uniform fee schedule for treatment of veterans with service-connected disabilities is under study by a committee of the Nebraska Medical society. Under the proposal, the state society would contract with the veterans' administration for medical care of the veterans over the state. The veteran would select the doctor he wants and uniform fees would be established throughout the state.

Wayne Air Service will soon begin instruction of veterans in its second training class. The GI bill was amended in December to include flight training with the program set up for the benefit of men who want to take flight training and continue their regular work.

Legislation strengthening veterans' rights to purchase government property received the senate ap-

proval on April 29. It gives them first claim on certain types of property and they rank second only to federal agencies in rights to purchase other types. There has been a widespread dissatisfaction with surplus property disposal.

United States employment service contact representatives, Kafka, King and Speer will again be in Wayne May 9 relative to processing self-employment forms for veterans who are engaged in farming or other business endeavor. Veterans will file May 9 for the month of April.

Q. Does the government provide free tools for a veteran who is taking a course of training under the GI bill?

A. The veterans' administration says that a veteran who is taking on-the-job training under the provisions of the GI bill may be provided with equipment by the employer. The employer may furnish equipment up to \$100 and turn in a voucher for reimbursement. If the equipment is valued over \$100 the employer must have approval first from the veterans' administration in Washington, D. C. The tools are now to be furnished in smaller quantities to the apprentice as he progresses on his job. Suggested plan is to furnish approximately \$25 worth of tools in first six months time and additional tools in like value six months later until total value of \$100 in tools is reached. In other words, the tool distribution should be made at various times during his entire training period. The tools are not the property of the apprentice until he has satisfactorily completed his entire training period. The employer is responsible for tools cost in case an apprentice leaves his employment before the training time is over and takes the tools with him. Both the employer and the veteran must look at the on-the-job training from the long-haul point of view. If an employer is looking for cheap labor, he will find the training costs make it unprofitable.
