PIONEER CHARACTER-(Continued from Pars One) of grain were grown and mar-keting crops was a big problem. Mr. Nelsen's father cradied his grain. His mother roasted wheat to use for coffee, as coffee was not seen in the settlement, for several years. Wisner was the nearpest market and one could get 18c a bushel for wheat, \$1.60 a hundred for hogs, 3c a pound in summer and 5c a pound in winter for butter, and 3c a dozen for eggs. LaPorte buyers would not take produce because of the problem of hauling it to railroad terminals.

While carrying mail from La-Porte to Ponca, Mr. Nelsen be-came acquainted with a Mr. Skinner who had a butcher shop and who agreed to pay 15c a pound for butter which he would ship to the Biack Hills where the gold rush was in progress. People of the 3kicinity began trading their butter at LaPorte for supplies they needed. Some-times Mr. Nelsen would load as much as 700 or 800 pounds of butter in his platform spring buggy, which would carry a half ton, and take the butter to Pon-ca. He made 6c to 8c a pound on the butter. But much of the profit melted in the summer when the butter dripped through the boxes. The second summer he was hore, Mr. Nelsen bought a bony and herded cattle for his

He had about 300 head to watch. Brothers Carry Mail. When Mr. Nelsen's brother, Jens, was 17 he was driving for Dan Vroman who operated the mail route between LaPorte and Ponca. Mr. Vroman wanted to sell out and Jens was not old enough to take the responsibil-ity, so Nels and Jens bought it tygether. Jens drove the winter route. They hauled mail, passen-gers, produce and everything. The brothers made the trip twice a week, going Monday and returning Tuesday, going Thurs-day and returning Friday, until the raitoad was built in 1881. Then the need for the route led them to dispontinue the service. The hardest trips on the route were in the winter of 1880-81, when snow was deep and tem-peratures hovered around 35 and 40 below zero much of the time.

Mr. Nelsen always got through though he had to miss Mr. Al-len's hôme on the present site of Allen much of the time for three months due to deep drifts. 



He predicted they would make good in peace as they have made good in the successful struggle for victory. They are basically sound, and they will help keep America basically sound. General Eisenhower who is a mid-west-erner—a native of Kansas—felt at home as he again contacted the sturdy citizenry with which he is familiar and which he holds in high favor. At Lincoln he was given an enthusiastic welcome.
