Rocks HENRY Wallace rocked the peace boat perilously in the troubled diplomatic sea in his recent Madison Square Garden speech. His utterances counter the American policy of firmness as carried out by Secretary of State Byrnes. Russia had been humored and helped, and concessions to it seemed at times almost childish. It became so bold and unreasonable in its demands, so flagrant in its disregard of agreements, that less conciliatory methods followed in defense of a free world.

Wallace says: "We want peace with Russia—but we want to be met half way." That's what everybody thinks. Then he says we want cooperation, and expresses the idea that Russia will cooperate as soon as it understands our objectives. What we have done for Russia and other nations without asking more than peace and order ought to trickle into the soviet mind and lead it to desist in evident attempts at world domination.

Russia should show an occasional symptom of cooperation. It should have persuaded its Yugoslav satellite not to shoot down peaceful American fliers. If it has any idea of human rights and the self-determination of small nations, it should call in its communist agents and quit trying to undermine democracies and strangle the spirit of liberty. It plainly wants to rule, and do it with an iron hand.

Wallace evidently thinks Russia will come half way. Clearly, it won't budge an inch. It responds only to demands suggesting possible force. No pleas based on sense of justice and right percolate through its thick cranial epidermis.

No right-minded American wants war with Russia or any other country, but Americans are learning that coddling methods advocated by Wallace, are more likely to bring trouble than the firm policy lately adopted by Byrnes. Wallace doesn't believe in getting tough with Russia. Neither does anyone unless forced by flouted pacts and evident attempts at aggression. If Russia is disposed to be fair in international relations it will be treated better by the United States than circumstances warrant.

Secretary Byrnes who is contesting for a just and lasting peace in conjunction with other Americans in Paris, is reported incensed by the Wallace speech. The report that President Truman approved the manuscript in advance is disturbing. It is apparent that administration heads should get together, agree on something and then in due time let the people pass judgment.

the interpretation in some present-day quarters. But justice cannot be dipped out of a running stream or picked off the trees. It must be earned and justified. The Post observes in conclusion:

"It is all right to insist that every man should have a fair opportunity, that the poor must be aided over the worst of their troubles and that society should do its best to distribute fairly what it manages to produce. But there is only collapse and stagnation in the notion that justice demands that everyone shall receive more than he produces."

"The world owes everybody a living," to be sure. But that is a debt that you couldn't sell to a bill collector for a thin dime." One fellow works hard, practices self-denial and saves for declining years. Another shifts along indifferently, puts away nothing for a rainy day and whines that he is just as deserving as the one who is industrious and frugal.

It is becoming more and more evident that freedom from the OPA incubus is necessary to supply the country's needs and speed reconstruction. There are too many restraints to stimulate production, too many controls engineered by the central government in possession of too few facts and capable of too little understanding.

Through many decades this country demonstrated its capacity to produce abundantly and serve satisfactorily. Of late, it has had too many bureaus, and these of restricted vision. The administration should get rid of its unnecessary hangers-on ahead of the time when they will be overtaken by indignant voters and uprooted and kicked out in their entirety.

Contesting the validity of signatures to petitions asking submission of the proposed constitutional amendment to restrict labor unions in Nebraska may be construed as a sign of weakness. If a majority do not want the amendment they will defeat it at the polls.

Soon frost will descend and nip vegetation, turning green into myriad hues. Death to plant life and months of suspended growth will follow. Planning next year's crops will have a share in the winter's considerations. Thus, the miracle of growth and man's relation to it go on and on.

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

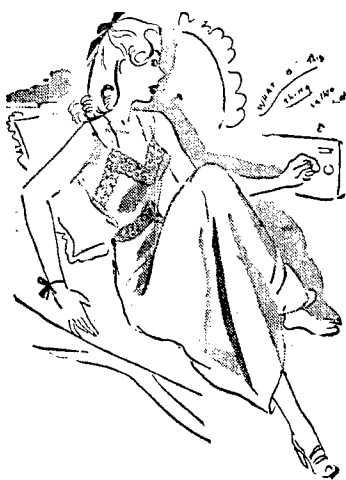

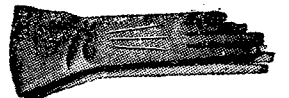

Vet's Corner

National Service Life Insurance.

More than \$90,000,000.00 is being virtually thrown away by World War II veterans who have allowed their National Service Life Insurance policies to lapse through non-payment of premiums, according to veterans administration figures. It is believed, however, that new opportunities and benefits provided under late legislation during the last congress may curb the lapse rate and encourage resumption of thousands of policies already inactive. Although 95 per cent of World War II veterans carried NSL insurance while in the service, approximately 10,000,000 have allowed their policies to lapse since the inception of the insurance program. At present less than one out of four WW 2 veterans has premiums paid up to date. From first of this year through July, the number of NSL policies in force dropped 38.6 per cent. It may be admitted that NSL insurance had a number of features that seem unattractive, such as restrictions on the methods of payment, on conversion, and on beneficiaries. The liberalized measure, which became law August 1, was designed to eliminate most of these features. A provision of the Armed Forces Leave Act (terminal leave pay law) permits veterans to assign bonds received in payment of unused leave for payment of premiums on National Service Life Insurance or as lump-sum payments in converting to permanent policies. The bonds issued for leave pay can be used immediately only in payment of NSL premiums or in the payment of loans made on government policies. Veterans are advised that the law specifically prohibits assignment of bonds for insurance payments as a device for...

securing cash for the bonds before maturity date. It is now estimated that these provisions of the Terminal Leave Pay bill will stimulate reinstatement and conversion of lapsed policies and preparations have been made to take care of the payments of premiums in bonds.

Fee Basis Dentistry.

A program of local dental treatment of ex-service men and women on a "fee basis" similar to arrangements already in effect with authorized private physicians for the treatment of service-connected medical disabilities, was announced by the veterans administration last week. The dental program, however, covers the entire country, while medical contacts thus far include only 12 states, although negotiations are under way with about 20 state medical associations. Professionally qualified dentists participating in the plan for service to veterans must be nominated by the state dental society, subject to the approval of the VA branch office dental chief. Fees can be adjusted to those usually charged the public for similar services. This choice of private dentists at VA expense is intended only for veterans with service-connected dental conditions when VA dental clinic service is not "feasibly available."

Q. Is a record kept by the government of the leave granted servicemen?

A. A record of authorized leaves is entered in the permanent service record of men on active duty. One copy of these records is kept in the Washington office of the various branches.
