Hoover Hits Communism

J. EDGAR HOOVER, director of the federal bureau of investigation, accepted the distinguished service medal presented recently by the American Legion in convention at San Francisco. In his acceptance speech Mr. Hoover gave due credit to his associates in the task of achieving results. "Bulwarking the men and women of the FBI," said the speaker, "are the high hopes and expectations of the loyal Americans whom we serve." He commended the Legion for its unqualified devotion to American ideals.

In his speech Mr. Hoover spoke sharply of communism as a growing menace to this country. He deplored the infiltration of that alienism into labor union leadership. He did not criticize union members generally, but he did criticize the way they are hoodwinked and misled. He said communism is not a political party, subject to reason. Rather, he said, it is a "system of intrigue, actuated by fanaticism."

Mr. Hoover said the fascism of Hitler, Tojo and Mussolini had been defeated on the battle field. Now he calls for the defeat of communism by "focusing upon it the spotlight of public opinion and by building up barriers of common decency through which it cannot penetrate." He said in conclusion:

"The American Legion, ordained to bring together the veterans of World War I to perpetuate the associations made on foreign soil, is being expanded by the influx of veterans of World War II, who likewise fought that America might live. To allow America to become infected with the malignant growth of communism or to be infested by crime is a breach of our trust to those who gave their lives for American principles.

"Let us gird ourselves with the determination that those basic freedoms and spiritual ideals for which so many have sacri-

ficed so much shall not be destroyed from within.

"Let us be steadfast for America, work and live for America, and eternally be on guard to defend our constitution and our way of life against the virulent poison of communistic ideology."

Captain C. J. Sanders of the Nebraska safety patrol, reports that twenty persons were killed in Nebraska during September in traffic accidents, bringing the year's highway fatalities for 1946 up to 196 as contrasted with 145 for the same period last year. Total deaths in September this year were two fewer than during the same month in 1945. There were 210 fatalities on the road in 1945, and Capt. Sanders emphasizes that it is up to motorists to reduce the number this year. He warns that the football season and longer nights will increase driving hazards.

Price Administrator Paul Porter is worrying lest opposition to price controls will nullify gains and cause inflation. It looks to this department that inflation is already in progress and that OPA is not an effective counter force. Most prices are as high as they were after World War I, and some are a good deal higher. If it would ease Porter as much as it would the rest of the populace, we would suggest that he advise abolishing the agency, and letting the consuming public try handling the controls.

Two proposed constitutional amendments—one to provide an extra tax for schools and the other to guarantee the right to work—appear to be traveling in opposite directions in public favor. At this juncture, the school amendment appears headed for defeat. The other one appeals so strongly to a mid-westerner's sense of justice that it is likely to be swept to victory by a huge majority.

Stop signs have been installed in school neighborhoods as a warning to speeders. Also Police Chief Geo. Bornhoff is on the look-out for violators and is making an extra effort to minimize dangers. School students, seen racing cars and disregarding stop signs, must yield to orderly motoring to escape arrest. The whole set-up in enforcement is to prevent accidents and avoid tragedies.

Gallup's latest poll, a recent government controls, reveals a majority in favor of removing all controls excepting the one fixing a ceiling on rents. The poll last May showed a majority the other way. Americans know when to change their minds, and they usually have the courage to express themselves.

Cattle in feed lots and in luxuriant pastures, with pigs galore and chickens innumerable on every farm, it does not look as though the meat shortage should last long.

Doctors and expert dietitians might help solve an acute problem by advising, for health's sake, more of a vegetarian diet. Vegetables are reported abundant.

TAX LIST.

Today's Herald begins a three-week serial setting forth the annual delinquent tax list, and it is undoubtedly the shortest publication of the kind ever to appear in Wayne county. It means that property owners have been paying their taxes. It is an index of prosperity, of ability and determination to wipe out obligations. Wayne county never did have an impressive delinquent list. Time was when the story of delinquent payments in some Nebraska counties would cover two or more pages. That was particularly true in years when drouth and grasshoppers captured the country, blasted crops, and when revenues were largely cut off. We are glad to note a brief list. Delay in paying is probably the result of oversight.

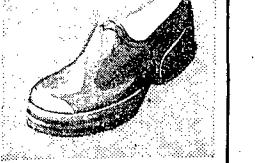
