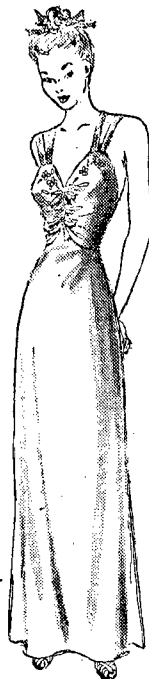

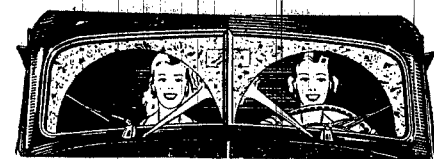

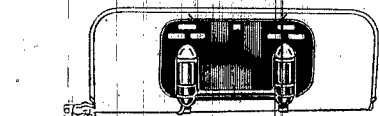

There is a labor-saving or labor-wasting way to do every farm job. Because we use too many old, hard ways, we waste 15 to 25 percent of our time. Greater attention to *how* we do our jobs can save time and work.

Ways of doing livestock work easier, faster and better are especially needed. Most farmers still use almost as much work to make 100 pounds of pork, beef or milk as they did 25 years ago. Yet, thanks mostly to machinery, we have reduced crop work one-fourth to one-half during the last 25 years.

Alert farmers are simplifying farm jobs, cutting chore time 45 to 50 percent. Miss Alice Kremke and Alvin Rennie were married December 9, 1930.

Miss Lottia Bush suffered a torn thumb when she was helping a little dog that had been run over by a car.

Mrs. Paul Gutzman of Hoskins, died December 6, 1930, aged 43.

Mrs. Anton Olson, 27, died Dec-

ember 5, 1930. Her husband and two children survive.

Gordon Nuernberger of Wakefield, was elected to an honor society at the state university in Lincoln.

A chrysanthemum composition painted by Miss Martha Pierce of Wayne college faculty, was hung in Omaha at an exhibit of Nebraska artists. Miss Pierce has been invited to send a painting to the Kansas City art display.

In Early Wayne Files. From Wayne Herald for December 12, 1912: Evan H. Edwards died at Carroll in December, 1912.

Ferdinand Podoll entered a Sioux City hospital. Thermometers dropped to eight and 10 below zero. . . . Evangelist Lingren completed a series of meetings in Wayne. . . . Mrs. Henry Asmus of Winside, died in December, 1912. . . . A. H. Owen, station agent in Carroll, went to Omaha for a railway examination.

Cliff Penn presided at a meeting of 70 county teachers. Dr. J. T. House addressed the group.

Completion of the new Carnegie library in Wayne has been delayed by slow arrival of materials. . . . A mass meeting was called to consider improvements at Wayne's power plant. The Herald sent inquiries to 50 cities and information gained was discussed. A committee named to act in conference with the council on the matter includes Geo. Stringer, Dr. T. B. Heckert, A. R. Davis, S. R. Theobald and C. M. Craven. . . . Wm. Berry, 88, father of F. A. and F. S. Berry of Wayne, died December 5, in Sioux City.

Dixon County Notes. From Northern Nebraska Journal, Ponca, for November 25, 1936: Extensive preparations are being made for Thanksgiving. . . . Photographer Jeffrey is busy taking pictures of business and residence sections with their lofty snowdrifts. . . . "The railroad is a sure thing. Every man has a cut from his front door to the front gate and a corresponding grade on each side (all due to the snowstorm). . . . The terrible snowstorm resulted in no loss of life in the immediate area but large numbers of fowls and swine perished. A great many travelers were forced to abandon highways and to seek shelter in neighboring homes. Three Ponca bankers were caught at Martinsburg. After the snow subsided, the three armed with shovels to battle the drifts like Desoto plunged into the everglades of Florida. After working all day they found themselves two miles from Martinsburg. . . . The snow drifted into the mill pond and floating down with the current, formed at the dam an immense barrier of snow that forced the

waters of South creek to recede, a circumstance never before known in Martinsburg. . . . On the Hartington branch of the railroad the wind blew the snow with such blinding force that it was impossible for the engineer to see farther than the tender and unbeknown to him the train became detached from the engine. He made his run to Concord and there was considerably chagrined to find that his train had been left, perhaps at Coleridge.

**Vet's Corner**

The Veterans Administration is preparing to pay dividends on its 19,000,000 policies, according to officials. The work of checking the files is not yet completed and no figures on the amount of the dividends are available; but individual payments will be based on the age of the insured, amount of the policy, and the length of the time it was held. Dividends are expected to be paid even to holders of lapsed policies. (As recorded in district

civil readjustment office, Ninth naval district, bulletin 14, Chicago.)

Personnel honorably discharged from the armed forces are permitted the prerogative of wearing their uniform on formal occasions, although they are not to be worn otherwise. Wearing of the uniform by persons on terminal leave is optional. For those individuals who have occasion to wear their uniforms at ceremonies or formal events, the order for wearing awards is printed below: 1, medal of honor; 2, navy cross; 3, dis-

tinguished service cross; 4, distinguished service medal; 5, legion of merit; 6, silver star; 7, distinguished flying cross; 8, navy and marine corps medal; 9, soldiers medal; 10, bronze star; 11, air medal; 12, letter of commendation medal; 13, purple heart.

Veterans are urged to designate beneficiaries for insurance. As the insurance act of 1946 does not include the old provision for an automatic order of succession, in the event no beneficiary was designated, veterans are urged to designate their beneficiary so that the proceeds of the insurance will not be paid in a single sum to his estate upon death and thus lose its identity and become subject to all laws governing estates, including claims of creditors, administrator's fees and court expenses. It may happen that in cases in which the insurance is paid to the insured's estate, that those whom the insured otherwise would have chosen, will never realize the benefits. In any event, the veteran who does not designate beneficiaries may expose his dependents to the risk of unnecessary expense and delay. Besides naming the primary or first beneficiary, it is also important for a veteran to name a contingent or secondary beneficiary; because, in many instances, any unpaid benefits will be paid to the insured's estate after the death of the first beneficiary. This might necessitate reopening the veteran's estate many years after his death. The former restrictions on the original NSLI have been removed. Now, rather than the insured being permitted to designate only beneficiaries who are near relatives, he may designate any person or persons, a corporation or legal entity or his estate as the beneficiary or beneficiaries of his insurance policy. The insured should keep the designation of his beneficiaries up to date so that the insurance benefits will go to the proper party.

Veterans of either World War I or World War II who become permanently and totally disabled from disease or injury incurred after discharge from service may be entitled to a pension, according to a report in the retraining and re-employment administration bulletin No. 31, October 17, 1946. The base pension of \$60 a month increases to \$72 when the veteran has been on the rolls ten years or reaches the age of 65. This pension is available only to veterans whose disability is not service-connected. For pension purposes, the Veterans Administration defines total and permanent disability as "Inability to follow continually and substantially gainful occupations, and disability seems certain to last the rest of the veteran's life." To qualify for the pension, a disabled veteran must have an income less than \$1,000.00 a year, if single, or \$2,500.00, if married or a widower with minor children.

Q—Can my subsistence allowance be apportioned in event my wife and I decide to separate?  
A—Yes, the subsistence allowance is subject to apportionment on the basis of 70 per cent to the veteran and 30 per cent for his wife. Further apportionment may be made in case of children.
