Lewis, czar of the coal miners union, called off the nation-wide strike suddenly shrurday, and ondered 400,000 miners back to work, Paralysis of industry and bogging down of all activities had set in. Use of fuel had been greatly curtailed. Many schools were closed. Reduced lighting had been ordered, and the future was anything but bright.

Strangulation of people's rights was strangely and tragically in contrast with the glad Christmas season. With resumption of coal production, the nation feels easier, and the spirit of good fellowship will be allowed to develop without restraint.

Progress in peace negotiations, with less disposition on the part of Russia to force the United States into an unfayorable position, discounts Henry Wallace's Madison Square Garden speech in which he expressed fear that foreign relations would be badly knocked out through failure to purr up to the soviet union with amiable manners and liberal concessions. He resigned from the cabinet, and his ill-boding predictions failed. The firm policy of the state department is apparently bearing fruit in the shape of a more tractable Russia. The soviet union wanted all facts about the atomic bomb and other information it shouldn't know, and brotherly love led Wallace to want to yield. Russia kept its secrets to itself. Failing to play the United States for a sucker not only augured for safety but brought soviet beliwethers to more reasonable cooperation, this in conflict with the Wallace promuncethers to more reasonable cooperation, this in conflict with the Wallace pronounce-

ment.

Suspension of the coal miners' strike happened on the anniversary of Pearl Harbor. That Japanese infamy five years ago, precipitated a terrible war. Victory exacted huge sacrifices. The march back to a peaceful foundation has been slowed by strikes in this country and by contending self-seekers around the world. The Pearl Harbor attack was a terrible shock to unpreparedness. Resumption of coal mining was a profound relief to a nation's over-burdened conomics. Now, let recovery proceed. Let the social order go forward with less strife and more unity. Let disagreements be settled by arbitration and without interfering with orderly reconstruction.

Russia's Utopia is knocked in the head by a blast from the AFL on wage comparisons as reported by Nation's Business which says: "The American worker's real wage is at least 65 per cent higher today than it was at the time of the Russian revolution (1917), while the Russian revolution (1917), while the Russian real wages declined 40 per cent from 1927 to 1938.' Early Testing of Seeds Is Urged

Seeds Is Urged

Farmers desiring germination and purity tests on their oats and barley seed supply for next spring should send the seed to the state seed laboratory now to avoid the rush later in the winter.

About two quarts of grain should be collected from different parts, and at different depths in the bin in order to get a representative sample of loats and barley. Separate samples should be taken for each bin that was harvested and threshed under different conditions. Many Wayne county farmers have increased their small grain yields by planting only seed of good germination. Purity and germination tests should also be secured on other farm seeds to be planted or sold, such as alfalfa sweet clover, red clover, brome and sorghums. A cup of the small grain seeds in sorghum seeds is enough for the tests.

The purity tests and considerably in preventing the spread of noxious weeds such as bindweed leafy spurge and Cahradian thistle. Samples may be sent through the county extension office, state Walter R. Harder, county agent.
