Reasonable Prospect for Wayne College—Nebraska Towns Looking Up—Meteoritic Phenomena—Move to Conserve Paper.

AS WE understand, a total of \$40,000 was scraped together through economic management of the college cafeteria to build a needed stadium. The accumulated fund was not due to jacked-up prices. Students paid less for better service than usually charged. The result followed years of frugal handling of cash details. The plan was generally acknowledged and approved.

The state board moved to supply the long-deterred improvement. Bids were received, but they exceeded the available cash. Then the price spiral curled upward. From the amount on hand it appeared impossible to give ground. Then the state board stepped in to do the thing that the saving fund was to do. The state should be distributed accordingly. A move was made in that direction. It was thus proposed to penalize extraordinary thrift. It was junior's call, but Pat's cow.

Now it is proposed, as we conclude, to right an apparent inequity. The coming unimpaired should be led to assimilate the facts and act with a proper sense of justice. The proposed stadium should be built by the state even if the school had saved nothing. As a reward for careful husbanding of income, the legislature should not only grant use of the fund for the purpose mentioned, but it should add enough to complete the job. Common sense is all needed to see fairness in that, and the average selenite is usually so equipped.

Spirit of Enterprise. LIVE Nebraska towns are on the alert for public improvements, and next year promises to be a big one in that respect. The past week Norfolk announced its intention to vote in January on a proposed bond issue of \$125,000 for an athletic and recreation field. The town has other ideas to make itself more attractive. Central City's latest desire is to vote bonds for a proposed airport. This is expected to be done in January. Central City is experiencing a sort of rebirth. It is a stimulus to more timid municipal souls.

Unless something happens, now unlikely, to break the conditions out of plumb, Nebraska towns will be made more inviting and more livable by reason of the coming year's burst of enterprise. Only the moribund will here and there arrest the onward procession long enough to suggest coffin varnish.

Holding to Youth. A FELLOW who is no longer sensitive about his age is really growing old. The fellow who is bothered by a long list of birthdays which he cannot dodge still feels the pulsations of youth. Looking at the calendar, he cannot understand why his hair doesn't fall out, his teeth crumble, his arteries harden, his heart fail. He turns from the record and from frequent warnings to slow up, and he finds himself neck-deep in plans to finish unfinished business and otherwise justify his long earthly trek. His spirit is buoyant and eager, but he does not dimming eyesight, retarded reflex action and less elasticity in his pedal extremities. He sometimes looks and acts older than the family Bible, where his birth is recorded, argues against retention of early vigor and determination to carry on and on.

Celestial Exhibition. FOR centuries, meteors are known to have had the habit of lighting the night sky and sections of the earth. That kind of phenomenon on Tuesday, of last week was visible everywhere in the middle west. Ancient were frightened into thinking the world was coming to an end. We heard of no modern who suspected an impending wind-up. Freedom of feat from unusual subsidiary or superlunary antics shows the centuries have developed a lot of clarified reasoning. It encourages people to believe they are not where they were when Pompeii fell and Lot's wife turned into salt.

Write Washington Boys. WE HAVE a communication from a paper wholesaler, urging exercise of all possible care in conserving paper. It replicates a letter from a Wisconsin weekly whose publisher says he has quit printing handbills and reduced his edition to a mere skeleton. We would suggest that letters of alarm and warning be dispatched to Washington bureaucrats who have wasted many tons of paper the past dozen years, and are still doing it.

Frank Erxleben Passes at Home

Chairman of County Board Served in Office Nearly Quarter of Century.



Frank Erxleben, chairman of Wayne county commissioners nearly a quarter century, passed away at his home Thursday, December 12, at 11:30 aged 71 years, 11 months and 12 days.

Mr. Erxleben, though not robust, enjoyed fairly good health until several years ago when a heart ailment set in and eventually caused his death. About a month ago he was taken to an Omaha hospital for treatments. It soon became apparent that very little could be done to improve his condition so he was brought home by ambulance December 8.

Funeral services were conducted Monday, December 16, at 2 at Grace Lutheran church, with Rev. Walter Brackenschil in charge. The choir, with Mrs. Elmer Meyer director and organist, sang "Asleep in Jesus" and "Abide with Me." Home services preceding the church rites, were from the Beckenhauer chapel where Miss Lois Wescloh sang "Bark of Ages." A large concourse of relatives and friends attended the funeral, and the court house and business firms closed during the rites. Committal followed at Greenwood cemetery. Honorary pallbearers were officers of the church, Roy Langemeyer, Fred Victor, Carl F. Meyer, Geo. Berres, Sr., Geo. Berres, Jr., Frank Longe, Robert Frahm and Charles Tommo, and county officials, J. Frank Henry Carl Erxleben, eldest of 12 children of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Erxleben, Wayne county pioneers, was born at Erxleben home place southeast of Wayne December 31, 1875. He was baptized in the school house which was then used as a place of worship August 23, 1871, by the sainted Rev. G. F. Burger of Stanton county. Mr. Erxleben spent his boyhood days on the farm with his parents, brothers and sisters. He was confirmed at Immanuel Lutheran church northwest of Wakefield April 18, 1886, by Rev. H. Wehking, now of Sioux City.

Mr. Erxleben married Miss Emma Augusta Schach February 14, 1901. After their marriage the couple farmed in Altova vicinity until May, 1923, when they moved to Wayne where they have resided since.

In the fall of 1922 Mr. Erxleben was elected county commissioner, a position which he held until his death. He was chosen chairman of the county board in January 1924, and had served in that capacity (Continued on Page Eight)

Must Find Way To Unify World

Dr. M. Hanawalt Sees Need For Speedy, Wise Choice As Paramount Now.

In addressing the Wayne Women's club at the club rooms Friday on "Unity in a Disunited World," Dr. M. H. Hanawalt stated that "we apparently have reached that point in human civilization where the choice is mandatory, where, in the words of Abraham Lincoln, we must march ahead 'either nobly to win or meekly to lose the last best hope on earth.'"

In spite of the political, linguistic and other unifying forces, this nation still faces such disunifying forces as racial differences, controversies between capital and labor, and religious prejudices. "Only for the last 50 years has the principle of unity been powerful enough to override the forces of disunity in the United States. There is some question whether this can continue indefinitely."

Dr. Hanawalt pointed out that even greater are the forces of disunity in the world at large. Differences of religion, language, political ideology, size and power are more pronounced. "It is paramount that we find some great unifying force to overcome and subdue these disintegrating forces of disunity. We must not become hypnotized by oratorical mouthpieces of the expression, 'One World.' Widely scattered armies and speed in communication and transportation do not necessarily make for unity or oneness in the world. They are perhaps even more likely to accentuate the disunity of the peoples, race, religion, nationalism, political ideology."

"Now that the peoples of the world have been thrown together, it is imperative that we find a thread of basic unity in this disunited world, a basis on which we can build an 'E Pluribus Unum.'" Dr. Hanawalt suggested three possibilities for this unifying principle: Unity through fear, forcing discard of disunifying aspects; unity through conquest, abolishing of disunities through force; and unity in common humanity, which is a long and difficult job. Humanities have not been properly understood and have not been properly taught. But the humanities, properly understood, contain the record of human maturity. "Perhaps it is already too late to choose the last, but choose we must and soon and wisely."

Official Speaks To Kiwanis Club

Norris F. Schroeder Seeks Cooperation for Best Results for State.

Schools, roads and state institutions need many improvements and all possible should be done for them. But Nebraska has been and still is operating on a "pay as you go" basis so changes will necessarily be gradual, stated Senator-elect Norris F. Schroeder in speaking to Kiwanians Monday.

If all requirements for schools were met, taxes would be doubled and no funds left for other purposes. Mr. Schroeder mentioned Wayne college's outstanding plant and expressed confidence that the fine facilities can be used to an even greater extent with more students and enlarged programs. Mr. Schroeder has been studying educational facts in the state so that he may help legislate intelligently.

Regarding roads, Mr. Schroeder stated that people naturally want all roads improved, but most citizens are not willing to pay the high cost. Gas tax funds have been used for maintenance and bridges. A sales tax is proposed as a means of getting funds for roads. This would provide better highways and let the state pay for them while residents use them.

Mr. Schroeder has found that state institutions are in direly need of expansion and improvement. He investigated mental hospitals at Hastings and Norfolk. The Hastings building is 75 years old. One both serves 50 people. Fire escapes are hazards. Inmates have nothing to do. Training for them has been neglected because of inadequate and undepaid staffs. Facilities are far below specifications for such institutions.

The Taxpayers' League recently noted great inequalities in taxes over the state and recommended a master revaluation of the tax assessment schedule. It was stated that much property is escaping taxation.

Mr. Schroeder is moving to Lincoln Friday and gives assurance that he will do the best he can to help the state. He solicits cooperation of all so that he may do a good job.

New Army Plan Has Advantage

M.Sgt. Arthur E. Myers Is In Post Office Here Each Week Day.

A good paying job for life, 30 days vacation with pay and allowances each year and guaranteed ample age retirement after army enlistment, points out M.Sgt. Arthur E. Myers who has opened an office in room 7, in the basement of Wayne post office. Sgt. Myers, who is living in Wakefield, is in the office each week day from 8 to 12 and 1 to 5.

Men by the thousands are enlisting in the new regular army to gain these advantages, according to M.Sgt. Myers, who will be pleased to give details. Starting salary for a private is \$75 per month plus "hidden" pay which brings the total to an equivalent of \$2,080 a year. Pay increases are automatic, and no income tax is assessed. As a career the army offers no worry of layoffs or seasonal jobs. The annual leave is 30 days with full pay and allowances. Retirement income after 30 years is as high as \$18,632 per month for life. M.Sgt. Myers states. In addition the enlistee may receive family and educational benefits now prescribed by law.

Fire Hall Bond Issue Favorable

Auditorium Has Majority But Fails in Required Sixty Per Cent.

Waterford voters, at a special election Tuesday, favored bonds of \$14,000 for a new fire hall and declined \$25,000 in bonds for an auditorium, the latter issue failing by about seven votes to gain the required 60 per cent.

The vote on the fire hall was 204 for and 129 against the proposal. First ward gave 108 for and 57 against the issue; Second ward, 96 for and 72 against. The auditorium issue vote was 186 for and 140 against the proposal. First ward cast 83 for and 80 against, and Second ward 101 for and 60 against the issue.

The plan is to build the fire hall as soon as possible east of the city school. A vote on the auditorium issue will be taken again later.

Dean of College To Arrive Soon

Dr. Howard E. Tempero to Assume New Duties Here First of January.



Dr. Howard E. Tempero will assume the position of dean of the college at Wayne State Teachers College January 1, according to an announcement made by Dr. Victor P. Morcy. He succeeds Dr. Morcy who was named to Dr. Ray Bryan's place and who was later elevated to the presidency.

Dr. Tempero, who since 1944 had been associated with the wages and salaries division of the United Airlines, comes to the college with an excellent background in training and experience. He received his bachelor of science degree with major work in mathematics, social science and science from Kansas State College, Manhattan, in 1931. His master's science degree was earned in education and psychology from Kansas State Teachers College at Emporia, in 1935. He was granted the degree of doctor of philosophy with a major in education at the University of Chicago in 1944.

The new dean began his teaching experience in the high school at Woodbine, Kan., in 1931. Since then he has served in various positions. He was a teaching fellow in the laboratory high school, Kansas State Teachers College, Emporia, during 1934-35, after which he became a fellow in the department of education at the University of Chicago. From 1938 to 1943 he was an instructor in education and psychology at the State Normal School in Johnson, Vt., going from there in February, 1943, to serve as instructor in navigation and geometry in the navy pre-flight school at DePauw University, Greencastle, Ind. He has since been associated with United Airlines as a wage analyst.

Dr. Tempero is a member of Phi Delta Kappa, education fraternity, of Kappa Delta, an honorary education fraternity, of Kappa Mu Epsilon, mathematics fraternity, and of Blue Key, senior men's honorary society.

Dr. Tempero comes from Oak Forest, Ill. He will live in the college property east of the campus, the home vacated by Dr. Bryan, who went to Ames.

Mix together 1 cup mincemeat, ½ cup each of chopped nut meats and orange juice, and ¼ cup each of dark corn syrup and brown sugar, firmly packed. Let stand overnight. Just before serving simmer gently 10 to 15 minutes. Serve hot over vanilla ice cream, allowing 1 to 2 tablespoons for each serving. Serves 6 to 8.

Political Ups and Downs

GROVER Cleveland was sick and tired of the presidency before he concluded his term in March, 1897. There was no sound reason for it. People were fearful over nothing. Prices dropped, and unemployment grew. Just as psychological as reason for the Cleveland economic paralysis was reason for restored confidence on the election of William McKinley. Long before he was installed in the White House conditions improved. William Jennings Bryan's free silver nostrum was buried under the McKinley avalanche. People hailed stability and freedom from threatened political quackery. They pulled together for better times, and they made them better.

The late election voted for a change. People had grown weary of bureaucracy under the new deal, and as continued too long under the Truman administration. The dissenting voice in November led the executive to hurry government out of business and out of private lives. His firm stand in the late coal strike and his tendency to restore government to the people is a welcome easement. But his leadership is not likely to establish sufficient confidence to win popular endorsement two years hence. People are eager to give republicans a chance to cure a lot of existing ills. If the new congress makes appreciable headway in doing that, the next president will no doubt be a republican.

Unfair to Public. INJUSTICE usually imposed on the innocents by strikes is emphasized at Oakland, Calif., where truckers not only decided to quit, but wrecked traffic and visited vengeance on persons who unwittingly infringed on the organization's rules. According to a current magazine, Oakland strikers often

used brute force to make the helpless public toe the mark or get run over by the union juggernaut.

Manifestly, law-abiding citizens should not become helpless victims of labor-management disputes. They should not be drawn into the vortex of property or personal peril to satisfy the hatefully pressed demands of any group.

Dangers involved in unleashed mob hysteria call for effective laws, promptly and impartially enforced. Laws that give union leaders undue license to outrage society, should be repealed and supplanted by others in keeping with the popular welfare.

Compulsory arbitration in labor disputes has been talked for many years. It should now be applied as means to fair decisions and uninterrupted production. Adequate protection to union members should not necessitate overthrow of orderly processes.

Removing restrictions from home building is another step in the direction of freedom from Washington controls. Materials are said to be more plentiful than a year ago, thus justifying the action taken. It is believed the result will produce largely increased building operations. An era of unprecedented improvement seems assured. Fear expressed in some quarters that removal of OPA would boost prices beyond reason did not prove true. Trimming the agency was a stimulant. Similarly, cutting building restraints may be expected to sharpen competition and keep prices within the range of prospective builders. The president evidently sees the wisdom of all possible haste in shutting off federal interference. Encouraging people to employ their own judgment has always panned out well. It will assuredly do so again.

A report comes from Omaha that the CIO is trying to organize Douglas county officers into a union. If successful, a no-strike provision is demanded. But why organize? And if a strike were permissible, for what would an officer strike? He is elected or appointed at a stipulated salary to perform certain well defined duties. If he is dissatisfied, he could resign. Next thing we know the ambitious CIO will seek to invade the ranks of small businessmen under the pretext of unionizing to protect themselves against themselves. That doesn't make sense, but a lot of dizzy dreams don't.

Probably Mississippians could not have done worse in picking a United States senator than they did in picking Senator Bilbo whose record is being investigated by a senate committee. He is a raw specimen, and he should be returned to the back-woods from whence he came.

Appalling hotel conflagrations have happened lately, and a congressional committee to investigate has been suggested. The essential would seem to be to remove all hazards and look out for safeguards.
