Conservation is Stressed Here

Winners of Soil Building Contest Are Honored at Banquet-Program.

The important influence of soil, water and climate on citizenship was stressed Wednesday evening, December 18, when the Omaha World-Herald and Wayne county soil conservation district held a banquet and program at Wayne auditorium to honor Mr. and Mrs. David B. Schaefer and Mr. and Mrs. Albert Watson for winning in the 1946 soil conservation program sponsored by the city paper.

Senator Norris F. Schroeder, director in Wayne county soil conservation district, presided. He introduced special guests, among them State Conservationist E. G. Jones of Lincoln, University Regent and Mrs. C. Y. Thompson, Paul Williams and T. W. Summers of the Omaha World-Herald, Editor Tom Ledley and Associate Editor Carl Detemeyer of the Nebraska Farmer, Senator and Mrs. Geo. Weberg and Senator and Mrs. Roy Carlberg of Pender, Senator and Mrs. Dwight Burchey of Hartington, Senator and Mrs. Ernest Rasch of Norfolk, Don Cunningham and Hart Jorgensen of Sioux City, Geo. B. German of Yankton, District Supervisor Robt. H. Spence, Jason Webster of Brookings, S. D., besides soil district supervisors in nearby counties and several local people.

A message from Governor-elect Val Peterson, read by Mr. Schroeder, stressed the fact that soil is the state's most priceless material possession and that the ideal situation is to have it farmed so that it will be passed on to future generations in improved condition.

Mr. Summers of the World Herald presented framed certificates to each of the three winners, a plaque bearing the winners' names to the district soil office and \$500 to be used by the district for equipment to further soil practices. Mr. Summers explained that the soil contest started after the World-Herald published a read Louis Bromfield's "Pleasant Valley" and realized the value of soil and water conserving practices. He wanted to do something to help Nebraska.

Dr. G. E. Condra, soil specialist with the state university, gave the principal address and stressed the benefit gained by Nebraska in the World Herald's movement to conserve and improve the soil. Such practices not only improve the land but encourage highest type citizenship and they help the future as well as the present. Such awards provide incentive.

Dr. Condra mentioned that the abundant wealth of good soil and water in such rich areas as Wayne county often leads to waste. The heritage of natural resources is the greatest here of any spot in the universe. But Dr. Condra warned that these resources must be conserved lest waste take even the abundance that is here.

The fertility is here, and Dr. Condra advised against looking for greener pastures elsewhere. With the abundant natural wealth and with the help of soil specialists, Dr. Condra sees unlimited possibility. The speaker appealed to every farmer to study the potentialities on his place and to cooperate for a better Nebraska.

The best people in the world, Dr. Condra added, are those who have to fight the stimulation of four seasons. Strong human fibers built by conquering handicaps. Health and intelligence are developed.

By conserving the rich soil and by developing citizens who are able to meet and conquer problems, this state has the most promising opportunity in the world, Dr. Condra noted. Conserving resources will continue to keep high type citizenship here. Rural Nebraska did its full share to help win the war, and Dr. Condra sees promise that it will help establish peace. Let us harness forces to our benefit and not to our detriment.

Reconstruction Marks Year Now Closing

The passing of the first year after World War II finds civilization making a desperate attempt to insure peace for all time. Americans, as a rule, are buckling down to the serious business of rehabilitation and adjustment. A review shows this area cooperating in the general trend of affairs, and the record gives inspiration to each one to serve even better in his own niche.

Early in January, Val Peterson, veteran and former Wayne resident, "threw his hat in the ring" for the governorship of Nebraska. The government agreed to send 25 trailers here to house veterans. With World War II over, the number of discharges increased greatly. Another consequence of the war was a survey proposed to find employment for returning veterans. Still another result of the war was a drive for used clothing for sufferers in war-devastated areas.

An engineer was invited to study the Logan valley and recommend ways to prevent floods. A basketball game to build a fund for helping polo victims was held. The fair board started plans for the fall festival. The REA began to push development of rural electric lines after a wartime period of scarce materials. Elmer Meyer arranged for a new garage on East 3rd street.

The dairy association began to give added stress to improved fields in February. City caucuses were called. Farm programs for the year were signed. The important place for religion in the reconstruction period was stressed by the Lutheran World Action rally. Mrs. H. C. Houghton of Red Oak, Ia., national officer of the Women's club, spoke in Wayne and noted that the issue in the atomic age is survival itself. One of six health conferences in the state was held at Wayne college, this to promote better physique for all young folks. Wayne airport was approved for offering flight instruction under the GI bill.

Events of Early Spring. In March, Dr. J. T. Gillespie headed the Red Cross welfare drive. Dr. C. E. Bush bought the dental practice of Dr. L. F. Perry. Dr. G. Eubelth and Cliff Johnson bought the Korf site east of the auditorium for business buildings to be put up later. Way Dads adopted resolutions pledging to help veterans in rehabilitation. Farmers' day was attended by a big crowd. Wm. Beckenhauer started enlarging his funeral parlor. Dr. C. M. Coc of Wakefield, war veteran, came to associate with Dr. Walter Bentback. I. V. Packard of the state aeronautics commission, predicted great possibility for the Wayne airport. A chapter of National Aeronautics association was formed. Schuyler won the Class B basketball tournament and Wayne Prep the Class D play-off in Wayne. Larson's store was remodeling and installing new fixtures. C. C. Stirtz started building a new garage at 5th and Main, and Redeemer Lutheran church began planning its new edifice near the court house. Dick Pinkham held a formal opening of his enlarged produce station. A VFW post was organized and named for S. Sgt. Llewellyn Whitmore, who was the first Wayne man to give his life in World War II, having died July 24, 1942, in a prison camp after the fall of the Philippines.

Two Here Cash Forged Checks

FBI Officers in Search for Man Who Operates in Several States.

FBI and other officers are on the lookout for a man who is believed to have forged checks in Colorado, North and South Dakota, Iowa, Minnesota and Nebraska, two of these having been cashed in Wayne. A check cashed at a local bar was for \$59.60, and one cashed at a grocery was for \$61.25. In each case the forger, who used the name of Henry Miller, made small purchases and took the balance in change. Checks stolen from Ingwersen Bros. Commission firm of Sioux City, last summer were used. One check cashed here was signed by Geo. E. Ingwersen and the other by Geo. G. Ingwersen, the name of a man who is no longer with the firm. The checks were drawn on the Livestock National bank of Sioux City.

The check artist was in Wayne Thursday and Friday, December 12 and 13. He visited Norfolk Friday and fleeced merchants there of between \$300 and \$400. In Norfolk he cashed checks at a grocery store, department store, two bars and a pool hall. He is said to have stopped in Wisner also.

The man using the name of Henry Miller is between 25 and 35, about 5 feet, 8 inches tall and weighs between 150 and 160 pounds. The Ingwersen company reported that 200 check blanks had been taken from their office last April. Sheriff Hans Tietgen sent the two checks cashed in Wayne to Lincoln for photostatic copies.

Approval was given for building Quonset huts on East 7th street in Wayne to house college veterans. Dr. Walter Traub of Omaha spoke here, advising high ideals as the only basis for aristocracy. Dr. Roy Matson bought the practice of Dr. L. J. Kilian, who died. The city school budget was set at \$61,770, which was a boost over the previous year. City expenses were estimated at \$266,200, which was also higher. Rev. O. B. Proelt told graduates that the world's destiny lay with youth. Dr. Victor P. Morey was chosen dean of Wayne college. Action on bids for Wayne college's new stadium was deferred. The airport was allocated federal funds for improvements, and the REA was also allocated \$500,000 for extension of service. Rev. C. W. Wilberg of Wakefield gave the Memorial day address in Wayne. Editor J. S. Woodson of Sioux City was speaker at the college memorial homecoming.

June saw the college summer term open with a big enrollment. Ed. Meese bought the Ahern store building. Senator Hugh Butler won over Gov. Dwight Griswold in nomination for republican candidate for United States senator in the primary election. Val Peterson gained the republican nomination for governor. Karl Stefan for congressman, and N. F. Schroeder and L. M. Schultz were nominated candidates for the unicameral

Veteran Houses Given to School

Final Inspection Is Made And Units Are Accepted Friday and Monday.

The Great Western Construction Co. formally presented the 10 completed Quonset huts on East 7th street to the government, and the federal representative in turn presented them to the college at short ceremonies Friday morning at 10. After final inspection of the papers transferring the properties were signed.

Theo. E. Spencer represented the Great Western Construction Co. DeSoto B. McCabe, jr., was here for the federal public housing authority. Mr. Larson has been foreman in charge. Dr. Victor Morey signed for the college. The school committee in charge of the project includes Dean Clarence McGinn, Prof. Raymond Schreiner and Dr. M. H. Hanawalt, who are assisted by R. B. Standley.

The 10 Quonsets will house 20 families of veterans who attend college. Each unit has three rooms and bath. Sink, ice refrigerator, gas range, gas water heater and gas space heater are installed. The quarters are roomy and nicely finished. Ten families already occupy units, and others are moving in. All are reserved.

Five barracks type houses, housing ten families, were turned over to the college Monday by the Chris Hanson Construction Co. These are very similar to the Quonsets and will also house veterans attending college. These are also reserved.

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Suffers Injury In Car Mishap

Donovan Barton Goes Home From Local Hospital After Auto Wreck.

Donovan Barton of Lincoln, formerly of Wayne, was severely cut and bruised and was rendered unconscious for several hours after he lost control of his car Friday evening about 10:30 on the highway two miles north and three-fourths east of Wayne. Stitches were taken in a cut over his right eye. He was in a local hospital until Sunday when he was able to return to Lincoln with his sister and husband, Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Mann.

Mr. Barton, who was alone, was driving east and was enroute to a school program near Wakefield. After he lost control of the car, his auto went off the road on the north side, plowing into the bank and throwing dirt 15 feet. The impact with the earthen bank caused the car to whirl to the right, turn so the back end was torn off and then stop in the ditch. The machine remained upright.

Mr. Barton was thrown against the windshield with such force that he was rendered unconscious and the glass was broken. He was hurled out an open door and was lying at the side of the road.

The driver of the evening bus happened along first and called for the Beckenhauer ambulance which brought Mr. Barton to a local hospital, where he regained consciousness the next morning about 5:30. The five-passenger car was damaged considerably. It was left here.

Mr. Barton had driven his car here Friday and Mr. and Mrs. Mann had come to Wayne the same day in their car.

Wayne and Wakefield bands joined 50 at Stanton for a concert.

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SHORTEST DAY OF YEAR REMINDER OF ROME'S SATURNALIA

THE shortest day of the year, December 22, being the winter solstice, rolled around as usual. The sun reached its farthest point south, and reversing itself, has begun to travel north. It will continue that way until the longest period of daylight, June 22. The winter solstice was important in the lives of ancient Romans because they were never sure the solar orb would get back. It was so essential to agriculture that the possibility of losing it entirely was terrifying. When the sun started its return trip, which it has never failed to do, Rome put on a big, tumultuous celebration called the Saturnalia, honoring Saturnus, the god of agriculture. It was necessary to stand in with any influence friendly to farm production, and Saturnus was reputed to be that kind of god. So, the natives, reassured by the sun's re-tracing course, engaged in merry-making, exchanging gifts and getting drunk. The sun has never varied its habits. Saturnus has passed out as a power. And farms have continued to produce without riotous show or weird hocus-pocus, but with improved methods intelligently applied.

ed fourth in the Sioux City Sue contest. Dr. Morey, college dean, was elevated to the presidency of the school. Winside entertained a big crowd at the Old Settlers' picnic. Stephen Haboush, native Gaillean, spoke in Wayne. The farm bureau federation voted opposition to a subsidy on wheat. REA service was reported to be supplying 930 families on 414 miles.

College Shows Growth

Wayne college opened in September with the largest enrollment for some time, the number of men being more than at any time in the school's history. Dr. Walter Benthack made plans for a third-story addition to his hospital. Outstanding fairs were held in Concord and Wayne. Dr. S. B. Shively went to Superior, Wis. The building of Quonset huts was started, and Edw. Seymour began a 12-unit apartment building. The need for saving fats to supply soap, etc., was stressed. Dr. H. D. Griffin was named director of the veterans' guidance center at the college. David Meyer's Hereford took championship at the county fair. Gene Perry's Angus and Wilbur Heithold's Hereford earned reserve championships in their breeds in the Omaha Ak-Sar-Ben show. The VFW bought wheel chairs and crutches to loan to any needing these.

A big republican rally was held in Wayne early in October. Royal Neighbors held a district convention here. The Legion post set a membership goal of 250. Jap leaders were charged with cruelty to Pfc. Wilford Lindsay, who was taken prisoner on Wake Island in 1941. Leo Kilian was appointed to Annapolis. About 100 attended the big employer-employee banquet and program at the auditorium. Republicans Gain Victory

The big republican victory marked early November. Senator Hugh Butler and Congressman Karl Stefan were reelected. Val Peterson was elected governor and N. F. Schroeder was chosen for the unicameral. Emil Meyer was elected commissioner to succeed Frank Erickson, who died after 24 years in office. Other county officials were reelected. The Wayne County club hosted Memorial party from the city. A parade, game and dance featured the college fall homecoming. J. H. Morrison suggested a year-around pool on the school site, and the Legion proposed reclaiming Evans lake for a fishing resort. The first big snow fell November 9 but melted after a couple of weeks and the ground remained clear until Christmas. The early storm caught many farmers with much corn still in the field, but the improved weather later enabled them to finish the task. Leland Herman won honors on cattle at Baton Rouge and Chicago. Wayne county organized to promote improved farm-to-market roads. T. F. Roberts, Ray Roberts and Art Mann were reelected leaders of AAA.

Wayne county's first farmer airstrip was opened early in December on the Glenn Winget place. H. V. Osterberg of Norfolk spoke to the Wayne Chamber of Commerce stressing the need to promote agriculture, aviation and good service. Kiwanians sponsored the ninth annual presentation of "The Messiah" as a Christmas feature. The county soil conservation service and Omaha World-Herald honored Albert Watson, Bernard Splitzberger and David Rees, Wayne county farmers who won one of the high awards in the soil saving contest. Mrs. Earl Anderson and Mrs. Ed Schellenberg were nominated as county candidates in the homemakers' contest. Wakefield voted to build a \$14,000 fire hall. Meteors caused considerable speculation for their antics in the sky. Prof. John R. Keith was chosen head of the county Red Cross, and Carl Nuss was named leader of the Chamber of Commerce.



Foreign Ingrate

LOUIS Bromfield, columnist, reports receipt of a letter of hatred and envy from Germany. The unnamed author shouts vengeance over the plenty and prosperity of America in contrast with the poverty and misery of Europe. Yet this nation could not have fought and won a global war without the backing of vast material resources. It could not have sent millions in money and innumerable tons in provisions to rehabilitate the unfortunate in other lands if it did not have a huge source of supply. Stricken areas should not only feel grateful, but they should accept in the right spirit the pattern of democracy, and do their best to imitate it. But criticism of wild waste in this rich country should prompt wise moderation as an example and as a future safeguard.

Candidacy Announced

HAROLD Stassen, former governor of Minnesota, has announced himself as a candidate for the republican presidential nomination. His briefly stated principles on which his hopes are predicated, largely follow the old Greek philosophy of the "golden mean." He would curb dangerous radicalism on the one hand and oppose equally dangerous conservatism on the other. He would steer between extremes, and that would seem to be the sensible course for any nation. We think he would make a sound, constructive executive. If nominated, he would likely be elected, as demands for a change are in the air everywhere. But a convention made up of delegates from thickly populated states, may be difficult to capture.

Straight Course

A member of the legislature may well cast his support in behalf of propositions he thinks necessary for good public service. He should anticipate the state's welfare as expressed in essential improvements uninfluenced by usually unthinking street talk. He should be prompted by what he thinks practically wise and not by what superficially appeals as a vote getter. The very thing he fears may actually win votes. A forthright policy, frugal, but not penurious, looking out for the needs of a growing state, is reasonably certain to gain popular approval. It is sound and usually safe to chance the right course. The need is for more statesmen and fewer politicians.

For Small Business

THE Norfolk Daily News has discovered one useful government agency. It belongs to the commerce department, and it is designed to help small businesses keep on their feet. These comparatively inconspicuous units are vital to the country and manifestly should be preserved. "This agency," says the News, "does not regulate, nor control, nor snoop, nor prosecute, nor fine." It tries to give worth-while service. The News explains: "The number of these businesses which have been newly established, many of them by returning service men with small capital, is large. It is forecast that many of these little fellows will fail, for one reason or another.

Some of them are in wrong locations, some in over-crowded fields, many have had little experience operating their own businesses, some lack information necessary to have in the operation of their businesses.

"The department of commerce is hoping that the number of these failures can be reduced with its help. It has issued booklets bearing on the problems of business in many lines; it has information available that can be had for the asking; it also conducts surveys to gather information as to markets in given areas."

An Old Record

HOW sound is a 19-year-old? And should his political antics at that tender age be dug up and set forth? It is reported that Gen. Dwight Eisenhower made speeches for the democratic party in 1909. It appears the tariff irked him. Should what he thought nearly forty years ago be used to hurt or help him now? William Howard Taft was president in 1909. Issues at that far-away time are not the issues now. Earlier, Jefferson advocated state's rights. The late Franklin D. Roosevelt almost completely junked the Jeffersonian idea. Matured, Eisenhower, if permitting himself to be nominated by either political party for president, will have a line of modernized policies. One's thinking changes and settles, usually for the better, in forty years.

President Truman's economic council which reported recently, sees no need for alarm over business or markets in the near future. There will be unavoidable readjustments and as a consequence some possible dips in 1947, but nothing that freely operating supply and demand cannot cure without serious loss. The council emphasizes that temporary disturbances will be removed sooner and better if left to themselves rather than left to government interference. As stressed by the council and the president the main preventive of recession tendencies is for everybody to go to work or remain at work, and think more of the value of production and less of high wages with too much leisure.

Formal New Year's calls constituted an old custom, adopted, perhaps, to warm friendships and to modify dull monotony. No automobiles, no motion picture shows, no radios, nothing much but the family album, aroused the individual to create something to while away time. So, New Year's calls were invented. Men donned Prince Alberts and high hats and journeyed forth to enjoy the hospitality of a succession of amiable neighbors. The season's greetings, expressions of good will and praise of choice delicacies caused serenity, unmarred by highway accidents or airplane crashes.

Looking ahead optimistically, J. E. Lawrence says in the Lincoln Star: "A high degree of prosperity is within the grasp of a nation which must enjoy flourishing business to carry its load of debt." In a lesser degree, the individual is in the same boat. He pays more for everything. If an employer, he pays more for help. If a helper, he must have more wages in order to live. The future is said to be bright by those who ought to know. That is reassuring.

The navy in a late report says the Allies came near fumbling away victory in the Pacific, due to faulty coordination. However serious may have been disagreements and mistakes, we cannot see how there was the remotest chance for an enemy in the face of the atom bomb. That terrible instrument of death and destruction did not need much else to melt all opposition.

It is not the cash value of a gift, but the spirit of love back of it that really counts. Simple remembrances from persons who care, sink deeply into the sense of appreciation. We have known those who have received much, but who were still unhappy. Neglect is bad, over-indulgence is worse.

Foreign Minister Molotov is a queer bird. He bristles with demands until Secretary Byrnes becomes extra firm. Then the Russian meekly crawls down from his high perch.

LOOKING AHEAD.

As the old year draws to a close with nothing in the past to brag much about, we look to the future with noble resolves and high hopes. Let us quit straddling the fence, carrying water on both shoulders, spitting one thing and meaning another. Shilly-shallying weakens backbone and causes injustice. Let us figure how we can observe the laws of the land rather than how we can defeat or evade them. Let us endeavor to help fellow-travelers. Chokey any temptation to cripple and fleece them. Let us be decent, if for no other reason than to feel decent. The new year, soon to unfold, is full of promise. It may be turned to advantage or disadvantage as the individual inclines or reacts. We may work like the devil, but not act like the devil. More actual practice of the Golden Rule will help.

OUT OF OLD NEBRASKA

One of Nebraska's best preserved historic sites is old Fort Hartsuff on the North Loup river between Ord and Burwell. Nebraska's other forts have disappeared, but Hartsuff stands today about as it did in the late Seventies, when it served as a barrier against the Indians for the settlers of the North Loup valley.

The post was established in 1874, after the settlers of the valley, who had been there for about three years, petitioned the government for military protection against the Indians. The early settlers had both the Pawnee and the Sioux to contend with. The Loup valley was an ancestral home of the Pawnees, and though they were established on an agency in Nance county, the young men of the tribe roamed the valley at will, and often plundered the homes and fields of the whites. The Sioux, who came into the valley from the north to harass the Pawnees and to hunt and trap, were not content with mere plunder, but often burned the settlers out. Twice at Sioux Creek in October, 1873, and at Pebble Creek in January, 1874—there were armed encounters between the whites and the Sioux.

By the time the fort was built, the Indians had been fairly well pacified, and the soldiers stationed there were called upon for very little fighting. Their presence gave the settlers a sense of security, however, in addition to brightening the social life with military shindigs.

Then, too, the construction of the fort was the valley's salvation economically. The summers of '73 and '74 had been hard ones. What hadn't been dried out, flooded out, or burned out by prairie fires had been devoured by huge swarms of grasshoppers, with the result that there was no food and no money to buy food. Had they not been given jobs at good wages to help build the fort, many of the settlers undoubtedly would have given up the struggle and deserted the North Loup valley.

By 1881, all possible need for the post had passed, and the War Department ordered it abandoned. The land went to private ownership, and the buildings have had many years of service as headquarters for a number of some of their former glory passed away. The commanding officer's residence, for

example, was revamped for use as a silo. Nevertheless, most of the buildings, with their sturdy groud walls and red cedar frames, have withstood the ravages of time fairly well, and either are in a fairly good state of preservation, or could be made that way in short order.

The residents of the North Loup valley are greatly interested in having the fort turned into an historic park for the use of the public, and a short time ago the Fort Hartsuff Park association was organized for that purpose. They point out that not only do they have buildings of historic significance, but also a plot of ground which easily could be developed into an excellent recreational area.

OUT OF OLD NEBRASKA

By James C. Olson

Students at the University this year are using the new Don L. Love Memorial Library, probably the most advanced structure of its kind in the country. Just 51 years ago this week, on December 10, 1895, the university opened another new library. The building—the "old library"—to many student generations—caused as much rejoicing a half century ago as Love Memorial does today.

There is a tremendous contrast between the old building and the new, but in 1895 the university's new library was looked upon as the ultimate in modern design. Chavellier MacLean was quoted in the Lincoln Evening Call as stating that the distinguishing feature of the building was, "its modern air, as contrasted with the antique or monastic atmosphere of other similar institutions."

What's more, it was fitted out with those now-fangled electric lights, and a ventilating fan in the attic which, it was promised, would change the air in the building at least once every 15 minutes.

The reception given by the Chancellor at the opening of the building was a gala affair, attended by Governor Sijas Holcomb, the regents of the university, state officials, and other prominent citizens from all over the state. There was no set program, although, according to The Hesperian, student publication, "In Professor Fling's rooms ices were served to all who came in and in the reading room tea was prepared for all who desired it."

Every effort was made in planning for the library, "to conserve the modern policy of departmental library work," and emphasis was placed upon "the convenient department laboratories."

That library served many more functions than its name implies. In addition to its collection of books, it housed classrooms, laboratories, the State Historical Society, an art gallery, and studios for the art department. Its total cost was \$110,000.

The building still stands on the university campus, and whatever comments may have been directed toward its architecture in recent years, in 1895 it was looked upon as a "splendid addition to the architecture of the capital city."

Gains Information On Corn Root Worm

Dick Bethune, Carroll, believes that he profited by planting corn on second year sweet clover ground this year instead of planting corn following corn or possibly oats. He states that he had 30 acres of corn following second year sweet clover that averaged 45 bushels per acre even though it was upland soil that was fairly thin or low in fertility. He found very little if any damage or infestation of the corn root worm.

However, 20 acres of low ground along a creek that was quite fertile averaged only 20 bushels per acre. This field was corn following corn. He contributed the low yield on this field to corn root worm which infested the corn nearly 100 per cent. These infestations apparently were carried over on the previous year's corn plants. The second year of sweet clover, however, seemed to have broken the cycle of the corn root worm and more than double the yield on the upland is the opinion of Bethune.

County Agent Walter R. Harder

was recently informed by Extension Entomologist M. H. Muma that recent research work has shown that corn root worm may live over winter on oats residue as well as corn stalks. These crops will have to be followed with corn and another year of some crop such as sweet clover to prevent reinfestation by the corn root worm.
