Sioux City Journal to fed-Building secondary roads to fed-eral specifications is too expensive a program to be followed by a state trigently needing improvement of most of its secondary roads, in the opinion of the officials of the No-traska Good Roads association. Renge in a recent difference meet. braska Good Roads association. Hence, in a recent directors meeting in Lincoln, this association went on record as favoring a revision of the specifications held by the federal government to be a necessary requirement if national funds are to be spent on road improvement.

The association suggests that state and federal engineers join in simplifying the specifications. In

improvement.

The association suggests that state and federal engineers join in simplifying the specifications to permit "the least expensive form of construction commensurate with reasonable safety and the requirements of the anticipated traffic now using the roads." It is added that if such construction means higher maintenance costs, part of the increase should be charged to the counties.

There is nothing new in the assertion that public funds derived from taxes on motor vehicles have been diverted to other than road building purposes. That has been done in the past in most states. Now, however, there is a general tendency to make such diversion illegal, as it should be. Motoriats who pay a special levy on the theory that they are aiding in building better roads for their use have a right to demand that their contributions be so used. Nobraska's 1947 legislature probably will see the justice of this, lespecially with pressure being exerted for such action to safeguard the funds. It is easy to agree with these good road boosters in one other age to the such action. That is the end of all "traffic barriers," such as ports of entry and state boundary inspections of out-of-state trucks. Certainly the sooner states unite in uniform requirements as to carrier dimensions and loads, the better for all concerned.

As for modifying federal specifications on road building, it long has been the belief in construction circles that the cost of following extra requirements imposed in federal specifications offsets the amount of federal aid likely to be available. Granting that permanent construction is desirable for highways generally, there still seems to be ground for holding that building reasonably good roads to reach all rural homes may be a better policy than to build a lower mileage of far more expensive highways. 

HAROLD Stassen, former governor of Minnesota, has announced himself as a candidate for the republican presidential nomination. His briefly stated principles on which his hopes are predicated, largely follow the old Greek philosophy of the "golden mean." He would curb dangerous radicalism on the one hand and oppose equally dangerous conservatism on the other. He would steer between extremes, and that would seem to be the sensible course for any nation. We think he would make a sound, constructive executive. If nominated, he would likely be elected, as demands for a change are in the air everywhere. But a convention made up of delegates from thickly populated states, may be difficult to capture.

Straight A member of the legislature may well cast his support in behalf of propositions he thinks necessary for good public service. He should anticipate the state's welfare as expressed in essential improvements uninfluenced by usually unthinking street talk. He should be prompted by what he thinks practically wise and not by what superficially appeals as a vote getter. The very thing he febrs may actually win votes. A forthright policy, frugal, but not penurious, looking out for the needs of a growing state, is reasonably certain to gain popular approval. It is sound and usually safe to chance the right course. The need is for more statesmen and fewer politicians.

THE Norfolk Daily News has discovered one useful soverment agency. It belongs to the commerce deparatively inconspicuous units are vital to the country and manifestly should be preserved. "This agency," says the News, "does not regulate, nor control, nor snoop, nor prosecute, nor fine," It tries to give worth-while service. It has issued booklets bearing on the problems of business in many lines; it has information available that can be had for the asking; it also conducts surveys to gather information as to markets in given areas."

The council emphasizes that temporary disturbances will be removed sooner and better if left to themselves rather than left to government interference. As stressed by the council and the president the main preventive of recession tendencies is for everybody to go to work or remain at work, and think more of the value of production and less of high wages with too much leisure.

OUT OF OLD NEBRASKA
By James C. Olson
Superintendent, State Historical
Society
One of Nebraska's best preserved historic sites is old Fort
Hartsuff on the North Loup river
between Ord and Burwell. Nebraska's other forts have disappeared, but Hartsuff stands today
about as it did in the late Seventies, when it served as a barrier
against the Indians for the settlers of the North Loup valley.
The post was established in 1874,
after the settlers of the valley, who had been there for about three
years, petitioned the government
for military protection against the
Indians.
The early settlers had both the
Pawnee and the Sioux to contend
with. The Loup valley was an ancestral home of the Pawnees, and
though they were established on
an agency in Nance county, the
young men of the tribe roamed the
valley at will, and often plundered
the homes and fields of the whites.
The Sioux, who came into the
valley ifrom the north to harass,
the Pawnees and to hunt and trap,
were not content with mere plunder, but often burned the settlers
out. Twice—at Sioux Greek in
October, 1873, and at Pebble Creek
in January, 1874—there were armed encounters between the whites
and the Sioux.

By the time the fort was built
the Indians had been fairly well
pacified, and the soldlers stationed
there were called upon for very
little fighting. Their presence gave
the settlers a sense of security,
however, in addition to brightening the social life with military
shindigs.

Then, too, the construction of
the fort was the valley's salvation economically. The summers

By 1881, all possible need for the pbst had passed, and the War Department ordered it abandoned. The land went to private ownership, and the buildings have had many years of service as headquarters for a ranch. Some of their former glory passed away. The

OUT OF OLD NEBRASKA By James C. Olson Superintendent, State Historical Society
Students at the University this year are using the new Don L. Love Memorial Library, probably the most advanced structure of its kind in the country. Just 51 years ago this week, on December 10, 1895, the university opened another new library. The building—the 'old library' to many student generations—caused as much rejoicing a half century ago as Love Memorial does today.

There is a tremendous contrast between the old building and the new, but in 1895 the university's new library was looked upon as the ultimate in modern | design, the library was looked upon as the ultimate in modern | design that the distinguishing feature of the building was, "its modern air, as contrasted with the antique or mogastic atmosphere of other similar institutions."

What's more, it was fitted out with those hew-fangled electric lights, and a ventilating fan in the attie which, it was promised, would change the air in the building at least once every 15 minutes.

The reception given by the Chancelor at the opening of the building was a gala affair, attended by Governor Silas Holcomb, the regents of the university, state officials, and other prominent citizens from all over the state. There was no set program, although, according to The Hesperian, student publication, "In Professor Flings rooms lees were served to all who came in and in the feading room tea was prepared for all who desired it."

Every effort was made in planning for the library, "to conserve the modernloolicy of departmental

Every effort was made in planning for the library, "to conserve the modern policy of departmental library work," and emphasis was placed upon "the convenient department laboratories."

That library served many more functions than its name implies. In addition to its collection of books, it housed classrooms, laboratories, the State Historical Society, an art gallery, and studios for the art department. Its total cost was \$110,000.




