Mr. and Mrs. Fred Stone, sr., early residents of Wayne county, observed their golden wedding anniversary Sunday with a family dinner at noon and open house in the afternoon at their home in Laurel. Mrs. John Kyl of Tekamah and Mrs. Jackson Trippy of Wayne, granddaughters, had charge of the guest book.

Mr. Stone, who was born near Detroit, Mich., October 3, 1873, and Mrs. Stone, the former Emma Hefti, who was born in Bern, Switzerland, March 28, 1878, were married at St. Paul Lutheran parsonage in Wayne December 29, 1896, by Rev. Mr. Eckhart.

Mr. Stone spent the first 10 years of his life on his parents' fruit and grain farm near Detroit. In 1882, his parents came to Nebraska and homesteaded on Indian reservation land opened to settlers in Cuming county 10 miles northwest of Bancroft. The prairie was then dotted with dugouts and sod shanties. The Stones built a two-room frame 16x21 with shanty roof. He was 18 when the family came to a farm west of Wayne.

Mrs. Stone came to America with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Rudolph Hefti, when she was three years old. The family first located in West Virginia. Later they came west, crossing the Missouri on a train which traveled over rails laid on ice. The Heftis settled near Carroll. Mrs. Stone attended school in Wayne and was organist at St. Paul church. It was in Wayne that she met Mr. Stone.

After their marriage, Mr. and Mrs. Stone took a short trip in a top buggy, then a luxury. They established their home in Wayne where Mr. Stone was a barber. Since early residents were more bewhiskered and the home haircutting habit was practiced, Mr. Stone decided to take up carpentry and for some time was employed by Rolls & Moore, Omaha contractors. He helped erect the Wayne county court house and other early buildings. He also helped plant the first trees on the court house lawn and those on the college campus. Many of the trees planted by Mr. Stone for the late Pres. J. M. Pile of the college still tower over the campus.

Later the Stones moved to a Wayne county farm. In 1930, they went to a place 10 miles northeast of Laurel, where they remained until three years ago when they retired and moved into Laurel.

Mr. and Mrs. Stone have two sons, Fred, Jr., and Robert of Laurel, and two daughters, Mrs. Frank Griffith and Mrs. Carl Vicker, Jr., of Wayne. One son, Glenn, died some years ago. There are 18 grandchildren and two great grandchildren, Jon and Jannene Kyl of Tekamah.

Mr. Stone is 73 years old and Mrs. Stone is 68. They are still active and enjoy their home in Laurel.

The clearest brain is needed behind every steering wheel. The soberest person cannot afford to take chances. Befuddled in any degree by liquid chain lightning, the motorist invites extra peril. Highways and cars cannot be made well enough to prevent serious dangers if misused. Airplane crashes and fires added to the holiday death toll. People are too often careless, thinking dulled, vision dimmed, reactions slowed. Off guard one second may prove fatal.

Livestock Clinic Will Be in Allen

State Specialists Discuss Topics of Interest to Stock Raisers.

A livestock clinic will be held in Allen at the high school agricultural shop Thursday, January 2, at 1:30 p. m. for the interest of all livestock men as well as the FFA and 4-H boys.

Dr. S. W. Alford, extension animal pathologist, who has been carrying on considerable research work with animal health and diseases, will discuss livestock diseases. He will begin his discussion with the topic, "Pinkeye," its causes, etc., including the practicality of vaccination. He will also discuss the disease named Anaplasmosis which he calls a million dollar disease.

Dr. Martin Munst, agricultural extension entomologist, will review and discuss grub control with some of the newer and later ideas. He is also requested to demonstrate control for lice and biting flies. His demonstration will include the actual application of proper materials. Cattle that harbor lice sacrifice their fat for a good living for the lice.

W. W. Derrick, also of the state agricultural service, well known to all livestock men in Nebraska, will discuss feeding, herd management and improvement.

Mr. Derrick, in his years of service to the college of agriculture and to Nebraska farmers as animal husbandryman, has visited a great many livestock farmers in Nebraska and he has helped them to solve a great many of them.

Salvation Army To Set Up Unit

Wayne Is One of Points In State Chosen for Welfare Work.



The Salvation Army will establish in Wayne a local service unit with its own local committee, fund and program. This movement is in connection with a national and state-wide extension plan now in progress. More than 350 towns in Nebraska have been selected by Salvation Army officials.

The Wayne committee will handle its own portion of funds, conduct its own health and welfare program, give advice and direction to the Salvation Army as well as officially represent the army in Wayne.

The first 45 service units have already been established in the state of Nebraska, and 20 states have already the service unit plan underway.

Brigadier John T. Seddon, secretary of public relations for the Salvation Army in Nebraska, particularly asks all business, professional and industrial leaders as well as the average citizen to cooperate in the following manner: Refuse to contribute to any person or persons representing the Salvation Army, unless that person carries the official authorization of the local committee. Make all contributions to the local treasurer at the time of the annual campaign, once a year. Discontinue giving petty cash contributions in any form of collecting either in box or tambouring by persons supposedly representing the Salvation Army.

The town of Wayne is now to have its own autonomy. Officials of the Salvation Army are making a special arrangement with the Omaha Salvation Army to offer for sale the special issues of their national organ, The War Cry, the cost of these is ten cents and will be a straight sale.

Niels T. Abildgaard, extension secretary of the public relations department and a member of the public relations staff, will organize the local service unit during the next few days.

Engineer Gives Report on Plant

H. S. Nixon Gives Council Information on Needs To Supply City.

Engineer H. S. Nixon of Omaha was here Tuesday evening to report on the size of engine needed at the Wayne power plant to carry the electric load which has about doubled in the last 10 years.

The local plant has three engines. Two are operated constantly and the third is a stand-by for emergencies. Since the demand on electricity has increased about 10 per cent each year for the last decade, it is necessary to have an additional engine. The council called on the engineer to study the situation and make recommendations.

It is expected that about a year will be required before delivery can be made on an engine.

Wrestling Bout Here Postponed

French Angel - Joe Dusek Band Benefit Now Set For January 23.

Car trouble in Mexico caused postponement of the wrestling match which was to be staged at the Wayne municipal auditorium January 9 between the French Angel and Joe Dusek for benefit of the Wayne band. The tentative date is now January 23.

The Angel was in Vera Cruz, Mexico, filling wrestling engagements when his car broke down and it was necessary to send to the states for repair parts. Because of the delay, his manager was obliged to postpone engagements at Fremont, Hastings, Omaha, Council Bluffs and Wayne.

The Angel's manager, Carl Rogelio, wired that the party expects to have the car repaired in 10 days and to reach Omaha by January 17, and he thinks the wrestling bouts will be held in Wayne January 23.

Search for Lady Who Rents Car

Widow of War Veteran Is Wanted for Alleged Trade of Auto.

FBI agents in Omaha called Sheriff Hans Tietgen Friday evening, asking him to impound a car driven by a young woman from Wilmore, Ky. The lady, a student at Wilmore college, had come to this county to bring another student home for vacation before she went to Phoenix, Ariz., to visit relatives of her husband who lost his life in the war.

The woman is reported to have rented a Plymouth sedan from a "drive it yourself" garage at Wilmore, Enroute here, it is said, she traded this car for a 1941 Chevrolet in West Virginia.

The young woman left December 27 when she stated she was going to Phoenix.

Research Is Done On Turkey Crop

Market prices for turkeys indicate that consumers want smaller birds. This information was compiled by Prof. F. E. Mussehl, chairman of the poultry department of the college of agriculture at the University of Nebraska. Mussehl quoted a special turkey market report on relative values on a live weight basis. Turkey toms weighing over 22 pounds sold for 25 to 26 cents a pound. At the same time, turkey hens sold for 39 to 40 cents a pound. Mussehl observes that the differential of 15 cents a pound will influence turkey breeding plans for the future. Research work in this connection is being carried out at the university. Crosses of small white stock and broad-breasted bronze stock have been carried on.

STEFAN OUTLINES WHAT HE EXPECTS OF NEW CONGRESS

BEFORE leaving his Norfolk home for Washington, Congressman Karl Stefan, dean of the Nebraska house delegation, issued an outline of what he expects the newly organized congress to do: Balance the budget. Cut appropriations without impairing necessary government functions. Declare World War II over. Put an end to the draft law. Keep up national defense and scientific research. Scrap the president's emergency powers. Make annual payments on the government's huge debt. Cut taxes wherever possible. Eliminate all useless employees and duplicating bureaus. Practical steps to build farm-to-market roads. Restore state and county rights in carrying out programs in which federal funds are represented. Provide for extension of rural electrification. Encourage foreign nations to share more liberally in foreign relief. Legislation to prevent strikes. Stimulate farm chemistry. The congressman's program makes sense.

Federal housing administration, which bore the expense of erecting the temporary houses, receives all rentals above expenses. The college rented the land and assumes the responsibility of seeing that the property is kept in good shape. The aim has been to provide homes for veterans until normal housing conditions return. Funds above cost go back to FHA.

The land was leased for two years with privilege of extending the lease one year. The theory is that in three years permanent housing should be available.

Winter Storm Grips This Area

Light Snow Here Is Blown About and Temperature Is Below Zero.

Winter gripped this area Saturday for the second time this season. The snow that measured about three inches was blown into drifts that halted travel for a short time Sunday. East and west roads received the most drifts though none was very bad. All highways out of Wayne were open Monday.

Main street in Wayne was clear of snow Sunday and Monday. Temperatures dropped to below zero over the week-end.

The bus from Norfolk to Sioux City was cancelled Sunday morning, but other buses operated nearly on schedule.

The mail truck from Yankton Saturday night remained here until Sunday morning before going to Winsor to bring mail from the east. This returned Sunday afternoon. Geo. Patterson's mail truck came in from Norfolk Sunday about two hours late. Rural carriers here went out Saturday and again Monday.

The snow was much lighter than the one that came in early November.

Bert Shellington, who has been manager of the Blue Star Produce at Wakefield, bought the business from the Blue Star company of Council Bluffs and took possession Monday. The firm will now be known as the Shellington Produce. The firm will operate the up-town cream station and will also maintain the country and city routes as in the past. Mr. Shellington will discontinue the processing plant for the present.

The poultry and cream business was established at Wakefield two years ago.

Funeral rites were conducted at Lake City. The body was taken to Lincoln for interment. Services were conducted there Thursday, December 26, at Roper's mortuary with Rev. Gauman, friend of the family, in charge.

Wayne now has 14 veterans, students at the college, and their families housed in Quonset huts and four college veterans in the barracks type houses. The remaining 12 families, to make a total of 30, will move into the huts and barracks after vacation.

Families who will move into the huts or barracks after the holidays are William Meserve, Kenneth Rihanek, Jack Strain, Dennis Monch, Duane Ketselen, Donald Smith, Elgin Bailey, Vernon Koziak, Harvey Holcomb, Harold Hutcheson, Robert Eckert and Glenn Heyne.

After the homes are no longer needed, the school assumes the responsibility of removing them from the site. The college becomes owner of the houses, repaying the school for removing them.

Power District Gets Allotment

Will Serve More Farmers With Additional Lines To Be Constructed.

Wayne county rural public power district has just received an allotment of \$260,000 for 192 miles of line construction. This will serve an additional 320 farmers. Included are funds for a regulator to be installed at the Winside sub-station, this to insure full voltage within 20 miles.

The loan will provide for extension of 35 to 40 miles on existing Wayne county lines. The remainder will be in Pierce county. The total includes 166 line miles and the rest service miles.

Richard Slagle is informed that the legal department in Washington is overtaxed, so that two or three months will be required to get the loan papers signed. Orders on wire require about a year and transformers about 20 months for delivery. It is hoped that staking for the extensions may start next summer.

When the additions are completed, the district will serve about 1,500 farmers on 750 miles of line.

Mail at Holiday Period Is Heavy

Holiday mail at Wayne reached one of the highest records at the post office. Between December 15 and 21, Postmaster J. J. Steele reports that 3,000 packages and 63,229 cards and letters were mailed. This office sold 28,000 three-cent stamps and 49,000 cent and a half stamps between December 10 and 25. A year ago the office sold 22,000 three-cent and 41,000 cent and a half stamps in the same period.

Ushered in Amidst Many Hopeful Signs—City and Small Town Advantages Discussed.

The New Year promises large growth and expansion, and a return to more normal living. Removal of government controls proved beneficial. These were no doubt necessary during the war, but they were a hindrance in post-war reconstruction. Currently increased retail price, slashes on credit funds of dangerous inflation. Buyers balking at exorbitantly high costs showed the steady power of popular judgment. Some readjustments will be necessary. The November election thundered the country's disapproval of federal interference in peace-time. It struck a blow at maintenance of costly and unnecessary Washington bureaus. Any tardiness on the part of the national administration in getting rid of useless employees will be up to the corrective attention of the incoming congress. More economy expressed in fewer payroll-encumbering hangers-on is an evident demand. More retrenchment along lines that will not impair public service is a responsibility of the republican congress.

The new Nebraska unicameral will have its hands full, too. The task of the salons is to provide essentials without waste and without unnecessarily burdening taxpayers. It is plain that improvements have been neglected and that schools have been the victims of unwise penny-pinching. To avoid a sales tax or an income tax the state has been permitted to whistle along with frayed coat, patched pants, no socks and no shirt but a bosom on which the "white spot" is boastfully lettered. It will be up to the unicameral to devise some way to raise more pecuniary dough to meet demands for better roads and better schools. The "white spot" can still be kept fairly white without looking and acting like a tramp.

A mean between painful stinginess by the state and wild spending by the federal government makes practical sense.

The past year Wayne and neighboring areas have done about all the improving allowed under government permits and made possible by the availability of help and material. Lack of houses has kept some families from satisfying an expressed desire to locate here. Prospect for more new living quarters is encouraging. A veritable building boom in 1947 will depend on needed supplies. Builders are anxious. If new structures materialize, as desired, the community will experience a lively growth. Barring production interruptions, nothing would seem likely to interfere with an increased flow of things needed.

The municipal government should move in the direction of improvements—better lighting, recreation grounds, swimming pool and show other evidences of a modern spirit.

Gloomy Gusses see evil forebodings than are groundless. With the world demand unprecendented there is no good reason why sound, prosperous conditions should not get well under way early in the new year and continue through several succeeding years. It is up to Washington to act wisely, and it is up to the rank and file to look for the bright side.

Where to Live. Merits of the city and small town were discussed in the Town Meeting of the Air forum Thursday night. Plenty of reasons were offered by both sides, but it is doubtful if anyone were convinced against already formed opinions. The city was defined as a place of more than 500,000 inhabitants, and the small town of less than 10,000. Those between were left out. The city was emphasized as offering more advantages of education and entertainment; the small town as affording close acquaintance and more helpful friendships. We do not should have towns and cities of varying sizes, and people will locate where fancy leads.

Will Visit Graves Of Service Men

Mrs. Chris Lueders, who is leaving for a visit in Holland, will make an effort to visit graves of young men of this territory who gave their lives in that vicinity. She will take pictures of graves. Persons wishing Mrs. Lueders to try to visit graves for them are asked to have information of place and serial number to her by January 4.

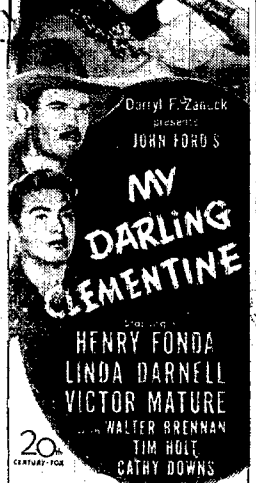

Coats and suits are 18, shoes seven, stockings three, woolen dresses 11, silk dresses seven, blouses five, gloves two, wool two ounces per coupon, other material per yard two coupons. Suits for men are 26 coupons and shoes nine. "You can imagine that clothes are getting pretty shabby."

Prices for houses and furniture are out of bounds. Miss Jackson explained that a house near her home sold for more than four times its original cost.

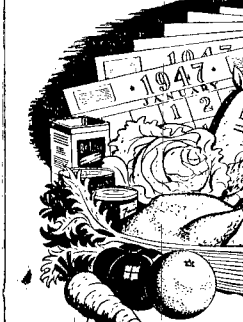

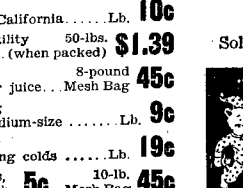

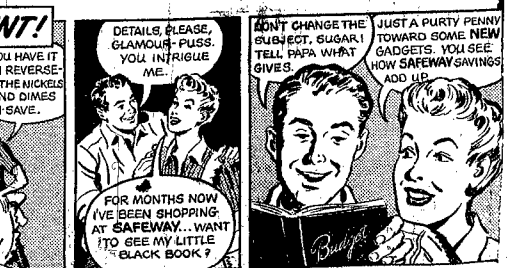

Tariff Issue
 The Norfolk Daily News suggests a likely change in the former tariff policy of the republican party. It points out that we need foreign trade, and that we are interested in rebuilding other nations. A new condition exists, and reciprocity could easily prove an advantage here as it proves an advantage elsewhere. The News says in part:

"The switch of the old high tariff groups to new ground is apparent. The reason, of course, is that we not only need imports to pay for our exports, but if we are to sell abroad the surplus goods we will have to produce, if we maintain a high rate of employment, we must build up new purchasing power, in the form of dollars in foreign countries, to be spent here, and the surest way to do this is to buy their goods. If we want to sell wheat to Europe, we will have to buy goods from Europe."

Possibility of a war with Russia caused a lot of disturbed nerves during the past year. There never seemed a shadow of reason for serious trouble between this country and Russia or any other nation, but the soviet union did arouse suspicions by its perverse attitude. It did not come out into the open and contrarily, often offered resistance to former agreements and to policies pledging the rights of minority nations. Of late, Russia's conduct has improved somewhat, and the new year finds relationships more hopeful.

The unions thus want to be paid while going to work and getting ready to work. When does portal pay start? Sleeping, eating and recreation are preparatory to hours of actual labor. Why not sue for 24 hours' pay? Reports state that attorneys employed to prosecute the action will receive ten per cent of any amounts collected. If the suits are successful how can the industries stand up under the load without adding to the already considerable burden on buyers? This portal-to-portal pay idea may be one more thing handed over to congress to clear up and correct.

Diplomatic relations with foreign governments are weighted with extra difficulties because their leaders in angling for advantage, use language to deceive. We wonder if all nations would not fare better by being completely frank, not slyly trying to disguise the truth. Candor would inspire confidence, and justified not only by words but by deeds, would insure peaceful and mutually helpful fellowship. It would be hard for Russia to do that, judging its long experience in wrong practice. It tries to be cunning, but it deceives no one who really thinks.

The Georgia mess over the governorship due to the death of Governor-elect Talmadge, has revealed some fine qualities in the incumbent, Gov. Ellis G. Arnall, whose term expires. He says he will willingly retire as soon as his successor is qualified. The lieutenant governor would seem to be in line, but the Talmadge faction is going to ask the legislature to select the dead man's son. Arnall's attitude is statesman-like, and should help remove gnawing factional bitterness.

Evident in advertisements locally and generally, merchandise prices have been slashed considerably, and buyers will turn the same to advantage. The trend is back to ample supply at reasonable prices. This was predicted as an experience early in the new year, and it is here on time. People have plenty of cash, and they have numerous demands to satisfy.

It is carefully oiled diplomacy to express deep regret over an urged or forced resignation in a high place. Prospective retirement of some from an official Washington niche leaks out. Simultaneously rumors of disagreement leak. A resignation follows. Expression of profound sorrow over the parting comes in order. Then just a dull thud.

Uncle Sam's foremost resolution for the new year should be to conceal all facts about the atomic bomb. Let no secrets leak out to any nation or any individual involving solution of the problem. If any other nation finds out, let it do so absolutely unaided by an American source.

Vikota Oats and Velvon Barley High in Tests



Northeast Nebraska regional oat test plots, conducted in 1946 by J. T. Webster on the Ed. Castle farm four miles south of Wayne, showed that Vikota was the high yielding oat variety and Velvon 11 the high yielding barley variety. About 200 farmers and others observed the grain varieties growing, and yields on the plots have just been received by County Agent Walter R. Harder.

Yields for oat variety tests are as follows: Vikota, 69.7 bushels; Marion, 65.6; C. I. 4301, experimental variety, 65.6; Cedar, 64.9; Clinton, 63.7; Osage, 59.4; Vickland, 56.3; Boone, 56.2; Tama, 53.2; C. I. 4140, experimental variety, 50.8; Otee, 48.7.

The Clinton variety that is receiving considerable publicity ranked fifth in yield. However, it had the heaviest test weight, 33.5 pounds per bushel. Weight of other varieties ranged from 31 to 32.5

pounds. Mr. Webster states that this variety should yield 8.8 bushels more than the other varieties in order to have any practical advantage over a period of years. The eight varieties yielding highest do not vary as much as 8.8 bushels below the Vikota that placed first. Vikota is a cross between two varieties of oats that are the parent of Cedar, Tama, Boone and Vickland.

The average yield of oat varieties in northeast Nebraska for three years, 1944-46, are given by Webster as follows: Cedar, 52 bushels; Vikota, 51.9; Vickland, 50.1; Tama, 50.1; Clinton, 48.5; Marion, 47.4; Boone, 43.6; Osage, 42.3. Four varieties outyielded Clinton. However, Clinton's test weight of 33.5 pounds leads over Marion's 32.5 and Cedar's 31.1.

Helminthosporium, a new oat disease which has been quite common in Iowa, Illinois and Indiana, apparently did not affect varieties at the Wayne county test plot. Cedar and related varieties in Iowa and other cornbelt states are affected by this disease which has not caused any apparent damage in Nebraska to date. Clinton is immune to Helminthosporium. Marion is also somewhat immune. Cedar and related varieties are probably the best yielders in northeast Nebraska as long as the new oat disease does not prevail here. Clinton yielded first in only one outside test plot in east Nebraska.

Barley varieties in the 1946 test plots at Wayne are listed in the order of their yields: Velvon 11, 47.4 bushels; C. I. 7114, experimental variety, 42.9; Sel 383993, experimental variety, 40.9; Beecher, 39.1; Ezond, 38.8; Spartan, 35.3; Trebi, 34.3; S. D. 385, 34; S. D. 252, 33.9; Mars, 32.8. Mr. Webster states that these varieties must differ 4.3 bushels in these tests to be of importance in selecting varieties.

Average yields the past two years are: Velvon 11, 50.2 bushels; Ezond, 48.8; C. I. 7114, 41.5; S. D. 385, 39.5; Mars, 37.5; Trebi, 37.5; Spartan, 31.3. Velvon 11 outyielded Spartan this 1946 and an average yield over Spartan of 18.9 bushels. Velvon 11 was grown this year by seven certified seed growers who had yields as high as 55 bushels per acre on a field average.

Northeast Nebraska farmers can improve their grain and increase their income by observing the tests to learn varieties best adapted. Small grain test plots will be planted in Wayne county again in 1947. Farmers will have opportunity to observe these at a meeting in late June or early July.

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New Varieties Being Released
Lincoln soybeans were first released to Nebraska farmers in 1944. Velvon 11 barley was released last year and Clinton oats is being released this year to a very limited number and only a very limited amount, states W. R. Harder. The Clinton oats did not compare with Cedar; previous years in the northeast Nebraska experimental test plots. However, it has been approved for state certification because it has proven to be more disease resistant than Cedar and related varieties and has a stiffer straw that may make it preferable particularly for fertile lands. The Velvon 11 barley has given higher yields in northeast Nebraska than Spartan.

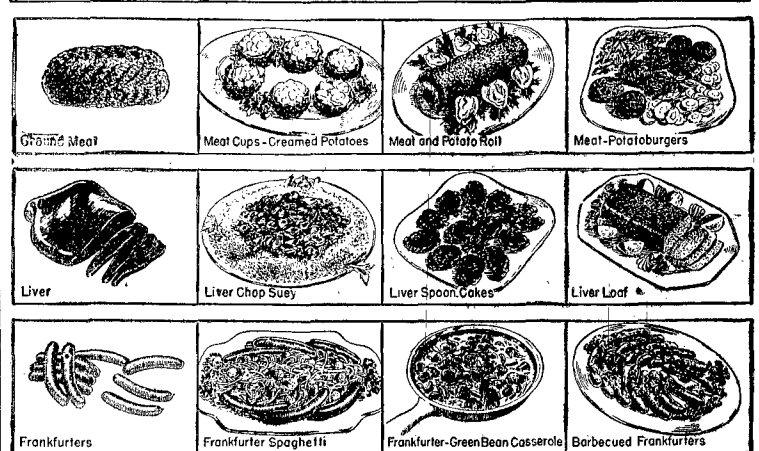

BUDGET HELPERS FOR THE HOUSEWIFE



Although more meat is available today, Mrs. Housewife can continue to make good use of the meats she relied on during the period of scarcity. There are a number of these which offer many opportunities for variety and at the same time are easy on the budget. The meats pictured above are excellent examples. Most housewives include them in their family meals, but more often than not the ways in which they are served are very limited.

As a matter of fact there are almost endless possibilities for using these meats in preparing dishes that are different. A few suggestions are given here.

Meat Cups - Creamed Potatoes Combine 1 pound ground beef, 3/4 cup dry bread crumbs, 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 teaspoon salt and 1/2 teaspoon pepper. Spread on waxed paper to 1/2-inch thickness, making a rectangle about 6 x 10 inches. Spread with 2 cups mashed potatoes (use sweet potatoes if meat is pork). Roll like a jelly roll. Place in roasting pan and bake in a slow oven 45 minutes.

Combine 1 1/2 pounds ground meat, 3/4 cup cracked crumbs, 1 egg, 3/4 cup milk and 1/2 teaspoon pepper. Spread on waxed paper to 1/2-inch thickness, making a rectangle about 6 x 10 inches. Spread with 2 cups mashed potatoes (use sweet potatoes if meat is pork). Roll like a jelly roll. Place in roasting pan and bake in a moderate oven 1 hour.

Meat-Potato Burgers Slice 1 pound hamburger, 2 cups coarsely grated unpeeled potato, 1/2 cup grated onion, 1/2 teaspoon salt and 1/2 teaspoon pepper. Mix well. Shape into 8 patties and broil or panbroil slowly until done.

Liver Chop Suey Cut 1 pound liver in 1 x 3/4 x 3/4 strips. Cook in 4 tablespoons lard or drippings 5 minutes. Add 1 cup sliced celery, 1 cup sliced onions. Cook 5 minutes. Add 1 can Chinese vegetables and liquid and 4 teaspoons soy sauce. Simmer until meat is thoroughly cooked, about 1/2 hour. Season, thicken. Serve over hot rice.

RECIPE

Devil's Food Cake. Mrs. John E. Bergerson. Sift into mixing bowl 1 1/2 cups flour and one level tablespoon

2 teaspoons soda 2 1/2 tablespoons cocoa 1/2 teaspoon salt 2 tablespoons sugar Add to dry mixture

1 egg 1 cup maple syrup 1 cup thick sour cream 1/2 cup cold coffee (a little more if needed) 1 teaspoon coloring

After everything is measured in to a bowl, beat very thoroughly. This is important. (An electric mixer is ideal). Can be baked in square pan or cup cakes, and is an excellent cake. Maple syrup is sweeter than corn syrup, and you can't tell this cake from one that is made from sugar.
