

The reason, of course, is that we not only need imports to pay for our exports, but if we are to sell abroad the surplus goods we will have to produce, if we maintain a high rate of employment, we must build up new purchasing power, in the form of dollars in foreign countries, to be spent here, and the surest way to do this is to buy their goods.

Possibility of a war with Russia caused a let of disturbed herves during the past year. There never seemed a shadow of reason for serious trouble between this country and Russia or any other nation, but the soviet union did arouse suspicions by its perverse attitude. It did not come out into the open and contrarily, often offered resistance to former agreements and to policies pledging the rights of minority nations. Of late, Russia's conduct has improved somewhat, and the new year finds relationships more hopeful.

Why not sue for 24 hours' pay? Reports state that attorneys employed to prosecute the action will recreate the per cent of any amounts collected. This portal-to-portal pay idea may be one more thing handed over to congress to clear up and correct.

Diplomatic relations with foreign governments are weighted with extra difficulties because their leaders in angling for advantage, use language to deceive. We wonder if all nations would not fare better by being completely frank, not slyly trying to disguise the truth. Candor would inspire confidence, and justified not only by words but by deeds, would insure peaceful and mutually helpful fellowship. It would be hard for Russia to do that, judging its long experience in wrong practice. It tries to be cunning, but it deceives no one who really thinks.

The Georgia mess over the governor-ship due to the death of Governor-elect Talmadge, has revealed some fine qualities in the incumbent, Gov Ellis G. Arnall, whose term expires. He says he will willingly retire as soon as his successor is qualified. The licutenant governor would seem to be in line, but the Talmadge faction is going to ask the legislature to select the dead man's son. Arnall's attitude is statesman-like, and should help remove gnawing factional bitterness.

Evident in advertisements locally and generally, merchandise prices have been slashed considerably, and buyers will turn the same to advantage. The trend is back to ample supply at reasonable prices. This was predicted as an experience early in the new year, and it is here on time. People have plenty of cash, and they have numerous demands to satisfy.

It is carefully oiled diplomacy to express deep regret over an urged or forced resignation in a high place. Northessi Nebraska regional outstate test plots, conducted in 1946 by J. T. Webster on the Ed. Gathle farm four mass south of Wayne, showed that Vikota was the high yielding oat variety and Velvon 11 the high yielding barley variety. About 200 farmers and others observed the grain varieties growing, and yields on the plots have just been received by County Agent Walter P. Harder.

Cedar and related varieties in Iowa and other cornbelt states are affected by this disease which has not caused any apparent damage in Nebrajska to date. Clinton is immuned to Helminthosporium. Merion is also somewhat immune.
