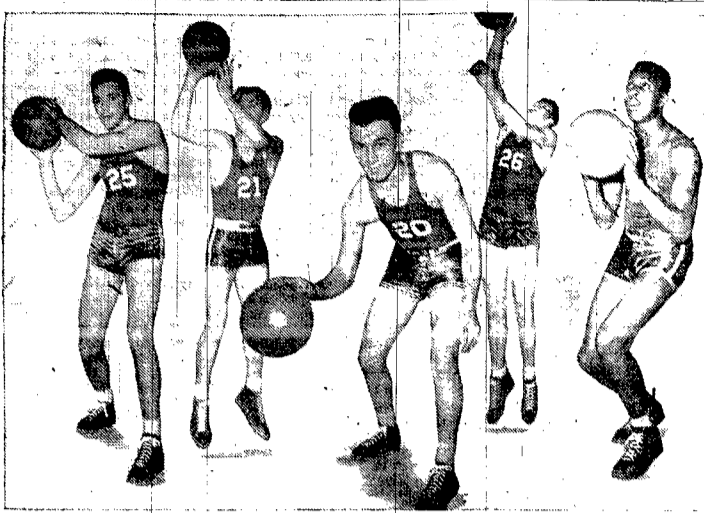

Need to Adjust To Way of Life

Dr. Victor P. Morey Gives Talk on Immigration To Local Group.

Adjustment to the American way of life is essential in making good citizens from foreign-born people, stated Dr. Victor P. Morey in addressing Wayne branch of AAUW and guests Thursday evening in the Women's club room on "Our Immigration."

Immigration authorities, now organized under the federal government instead of under state direction, make every effort through classes, texts and other means to help foreigners adopt American ways.

Persons coming to this country must before leaving their native

lands show that they are capable of supporting themselves. They also pass other tests. On arrival here they go before a panel for interrogation. Men who speak foreign languages are included.

During the war the immigration totals ran between 20,000 and 30,000 a year. The year ending June 30, 1946, brought a peak number, 108,721. Only 29,000 of these were quota immigrants.

Immigration and naturalization have since 1906 been under the department of justice. War makes people conscious of citizenship, and 1941 brought a record of 441,979 naturalized.

In the United States are three schools of thought, Dr. Morey pointed out: Those who try to bring in their friends through immigration, those who would limit all immigration and the great mass who are disinterested.

The important thing is that foreigners who do come here should share American ideas and ways and become good citizens or return to their native land.

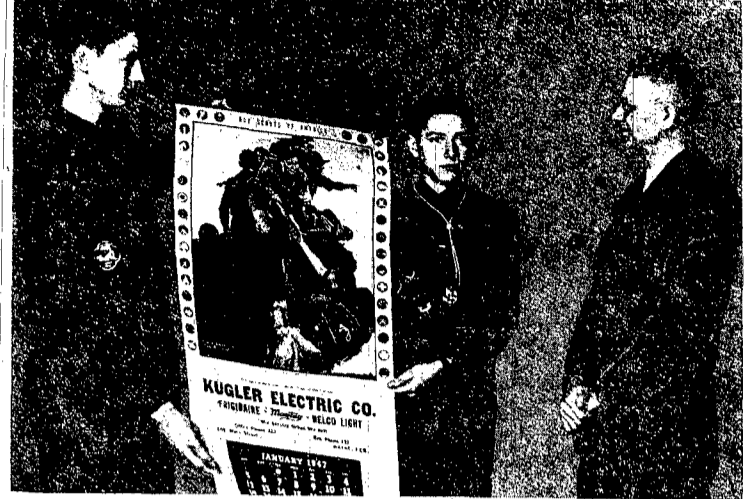

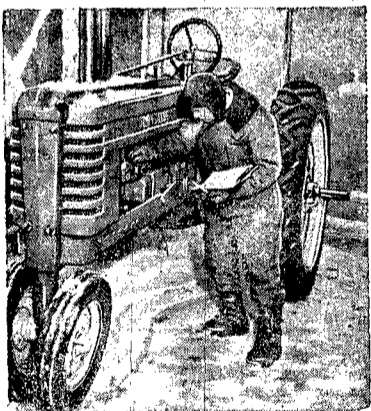
