Sales SENATOR Petrus C. Peterson of Lincoln, and Dwight Burney of Hartington, have introduced a sales tax of two per cent. That appears a practical answer to the demand for mough money without overburdening real state. Some exceptions mention rentals, motor fuels, seeds, poultry and fertilizer. Both Peterson and Burney have had sufficient legislative experience to know conditions and needs.

A generally voiced demand for more revenue to improve state institutions is put up to the unicameral. The sales tax is one effective way to secure relief without placing an excessive load on property. The sales tax would make everybody conscious of contributing to support of the government. No one could escape.

State institutions have suffered neglect. Schools have been inadequately supported. Highways do not answer requirements. Everything is worn out. Needs are many and pressing. A sales tax, nuisance though twould be, seems the only way to meet demands and maintain self-respect.

It appears that Carter Lake which now belongs to Iowa, but which was shifted on Nebraska by a change in the Missouri river channel, is presented to this state's unicameral for legislative action. Since the river elected to shift its course, it is proposed to make Carter Lake a part of Nebraska. If the river is moved by a contrary whim to separate the town from Nebraska at some time in the future, another legislative move would be in order. As the river cannot be made obedient to manmade laws, it might be well to have a plan by which the town would move with the stream. But Editor Woodson of the Sioux City Journal thinks Carter Lake citizens should be permitted to exercise a decisive voice in the matter.

Congress is wrestling with the question of reducing the income tax to relieve the burden on taxpayers. The proposition to make a twenty per cent cut is considered too strong by some. Taxpayers will figure any reduction better than none. And it seems to be the prevailing opinion in Washington that possible reduction in expenses justifies easing up on the people. It is therefore in the hands of congress to decide how much of a claim a taxpayer has on his last year's earnings.

We feel like applauding the landlord who prefers to rent to couples who have children. Youngsters are future citizens. They can usually be led to preserve property. A little extra effort will teach them property values preliminary to later ownership. We would welcome them as tenants in the belief that high spirits do not necessarily mean disorder and damage.

The report that the university is over-crowded is in disturbing contrast with stories that the outlying state schools have more quarters than needed. The reason for this condition is a subject for earnest query. If what is lacking may be ascer-tained, the unicameral may be expected to supply a remedy.
