Protest Use of Cars. From Wayne Herald for March 31, 1904: A mass meeting was called in Wayne to protest against the reckless use of automobiles. Resolutions passed call for prosethe reckless use of automobiles. Resolutions passed call for prose-cution of drivers who endanger the lives and properties of others on the highways by trightening horses. One farmer who had experienced travel by oxfe and who now en-joys the luxury of a horse and buggy said he did not want this pleasure taken away by such new-fangled contrivances.

An Ordinance prohibiting the moving of any building, over a certain size, over, across, or along places within the corporate limits of the Village of Carroli, Nebras-ka, without first obtaining a per-mit therefor; fixing the fee for such permit and providing a penal-ty for a violation of this ordinance. DE IT ORDAINED BY THE CHAIRMAN AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF CARROLL, NEBRASKA: Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to move upon, over, across or along any of the streets, alleys or public places within the corporate limits of the Village of Carroll, Nebraska, any building of a great-er height than one story, or of a greater length than 18 feet or of a greater width than 12 feet, with-out first making an application and securing a permit therefor. Section 2. The permit mention-ed in the preceding section of this ordinance shall be issued by the Clerk of said Village, on the appli-cation of the person, firm or corpo-s ration desiring the same, and upon the payment to the Clerk of the sum of \$100.00. the payment to the Clerk of the sum of \$100.00.
