Unit Takes Tests in Dixon County

Health Department X-ray Is Conducted Free for All in Coming Weeks

Dixon county chest X-ray survey starts at Allen Tuesday, June 24. The big state department of health mobile X-ray unit will give free chest X-rays to residents of Allen and vicinity through Thursday, June 26.

The unit will be in Wakefield June 28 through July 1; Dixon, July 3 through 7; Emerson, July 9 through 11; Newcastle, July 14 through 16; Ponca, July 18 through 22.

Sponsored by local physicians, the Dixon county chest X-ray survey has as its goal the chest X-raying of every adult in the county. While youngsters under 12 years are remarkably free from pathological chest conditions, local physicians emphasized that they, too, are welcome, especially if any suspicious symptoms exist.

Abel Bid Is Low On Oil Surfacing

Contract to Be Awarded After Approval Is Given By Federal Group

Bids on oil mat for Highway 13 from Wayne north 10 miles to the Concord junction were opened by the state department at Lincoln Thursday and Abel Construction Co. was low bidder. The figure was close to the engineer's estimate and the bid must be approved by federal officers at Kansas City before the contract can be awarded.

The road from Wayne north has stabilized base. The oil mat will complete the hard surfacing of this sector. A couple of years ago the five miles from Laurel to the Concord junction was treated to oil mat. When the project north is finished, the oil mat will be complete from Laurel to 275 south of Wayne.

Oil mat is being applied on the Laurel-Coleridge sector of the highway now by Steele Brothers. A stabilized base between Coleridge and Hartington will prepare for oil mat to be placed later. No. 81 from Yanktop south to a point two miles west of Fordyce is being rebuilt this summer. When completed the only gravel left between Wayne and Yanktop will be 12 miles between Hartington and the point west of Fordyce. It is thought that this will be improved in the near future.

J. N. Eimung started this week to regrade the Wayne-Wakefield and Wayne-Winslow roads. Gravel is also being laid north of West Point.

Tom Dunn Is Taken Ill at Wisner When Returning With Transport.

Tom Dunn, about 45, transport driver for the Stirtz Oil Co., died Wednesday morning about 6:30 in a local hospital where he was brought early that morning after being taken ill at Wisner. Mr. Dunn was coming to Wayne with a transport. He fell ill and stopped at Wisner. The night marshal at Wisner called C. C. Stirtz who with Ralph Morse went there immediately. Mr. Stirtz rushed Mr. Dunn to the hospital here and Mr. Morse drove the transport to Wayne. Mr. Dunn seemed to be rallying well this morning until he suffered a heart attack and died.

Funeral rites in charge of the Beckenhauer mortuary are not yet made. Mr. Dunn had been driving for the Stirtz company for at least 10 years. Mr. Dunn leaves his wife and infant son in Nebraska City, a son, Robert in Wayne, a daughter, Yvonne in Norfolk, and a daughter, Erma Jean, California.

Allocate Funds To Four Schools

Appropriation Increase Is About One-fourth for Next Biennium

Wayne State College has been allocated \$160,233.80 for operating costs for the coming biennium. This is about 25 per cent increase over the past two years. Chadron receives \$413,132.29; Kearney, \$470,262.85; and Peru \$435,192.36. The legislature made the state college appropriation in a lump sum and the amount was divided among the schools on a basis of enrollment and need.

Though the sum is considerably below the estimated needs in view of higher costs, Dr. V. P. Morey thinks that careful planning will enable the local school to function well. Supplemental fees from larger enrollment will help.

The board made the division of funds Monday at the meeting in Lincoln.

The selection of Donald Meek of Missouri as assistant coach at the college here was also approved Monday.

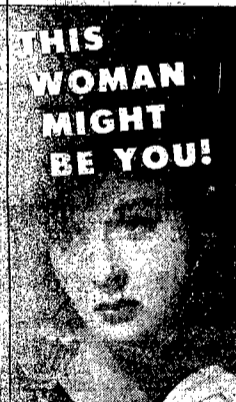

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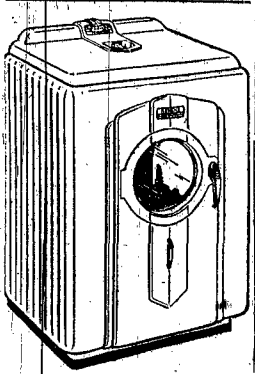

**Proposed Ordinance**  
 FOR A college town, Wayne is eminently tolerant. It has accepted present liquor regulations as the best solution of a vexing problem. But it has been deeply perturbed by a proposed ordinance to permit sales Sundays. The ordinance mentioned was put on the table by the city council some weeks ago. It is gratifying to note that the municipal body left it there at its recent session. In the interest of continued peaceful relationships, it would be wisest to keep it there.

It appears from the record that an ordinance was adopted in January fixing midnight as the closing hour on week-days with no Sunday sales. In the proposed ordinance it would be made lawful to open at noon Sundays and remain open until 9 o'clock Sunday evenings. Such extension of time has aroused sharp opposition.

A leading citizen who called the matter to our attention, said he would circulate a petition for a popular expression on the subject if the ordinance were passed. That would upset the status quo. It would be disappointing even to prohibitionists who have reluctantly yielded to strict regulation as the most practical course.

Sales are permitted until midnight every day excepting Sunday, and we have heard of no expressed desire on the part of dealers to lengthen the time. Those responsible for the movement should have the foresight to avoid the appearance of trying to make a college town, with a thousand students to protect, into a wide-open town. Wayne has never been that kind of town. Its citizens are predominantly education-bent. They have active churches and many devoted church members; Wayne is eager to grow as an educational center, and to develop wholesomely and righteously, thus to attract and satisfy more and more home owners.

Liquor excesses are responsible for a large percentage of the appalling automobile tragedies. Those who spurn over-indulgence, have quietly gone along with regulation. But they threaten revolt in the face of unnecessary license. Aroused from quiescence, dry forces would become a veritable storm of resentment. We hope councilmen will leave the present undisturbed. Let them look ahead and be influenced by practical judgment. To grow in strength and service, it is advisable for the town to avoid Puritanism on the one hand and wild excess on the other.

**Corn Crop**  
 H. J. GRAMLICH, general agricultural agent of the Chicago and Northwestern railway system, reports that rainfall from April 1 to May 26 this year considerably exceeded that in the same period last year in mid-western states with the exception of western Nebraska and western South Dakota. It is a fairly safe guess that June moisture will fix the sections reporting deficiencies to compare favorably with other areas. Wet fields have made corn planting a problem. Mr. Gramlich says one Illinois farmer with 700 acres expected to plant his

crop in five days by using two four-row hill-drop planters with tractors equipped with headlights.  
 Speaking of the Nebraska condition, Mr. Gramlich says:  
 "By May 17, 34 per cent of the Nebraska crop had been planted. Last year, on the same date, 58 per cent of the corn was in the ground; however, in 1945 on June 2, only 67 per cent of the Nebraska crop had been planted, and on June 16 there was still 15 per cent to be planted. That year Nebraska produced a bumper crop."

As we listened to Paul Porter, erstwhile new deal bellwether, at one time drum major of the now dead OPA, discuss price regulation in the Meeting-of-the-Air program last week, fumbling questions hurled by abler analysts, we were led to wonder if by walking blindfolded through a town like Wayne one could not pick enough government help to supplant all new deal hangers-on and insure sound, practical government functioning at a small fraction of the present cost. Fire all new dealers. Recruit necessary substitutes — not many would be required — from the lowly ranks. In qualifications, shift the burden from theory to actuality. It would be refreshing, and no doubt successful.

Defeat of a candidate for congress in the state of Washington with the open support of Henry Wallace may be explained as not due to the influence of the apostle of economic incongruities, and thus not hinder the third-party movement. A third party is not indispensable to republican victory next year, but it would make that outcome easier, cheaper and more certain. Besides insuring a change in the national administration, a third party would probably fold Henry into oblivion where he could quietly contemplate "what might have been."

How little the cries of suffering humanity sink into the thick cranial epidermis of Russian leaders was emphasized last week when Red soldiers fired on a Swedish relief mission car and killed the chief of a Save-the-Children organization. The man was on an errand of mercy near the Czechoslovak border. An accident is suggested. How deliberately firing into a car could be interpreted as an accident only reflects customary soviet crassness. A perfunctory investigation will no doubt follow. But a valuable contributor to relief will remain dead.

Congressman Karl Stefan's report of millions spent by the United States to eradicate the hoof and mouth disease among Mexican cattle with each infected animal paid for by this country, makes us wonder why our southern neighbor does not share the expense. The service in getting rid of the disease to prevent its spread into the United States must also be beneficial to Mexico.

On account of a big sugar surplus in warehouses with an abundant crop reported in Cuba, Senator Hugh Butler wrote a letter to the senate sub-committee urging early end to sugar rationing. This has happened, and so no longer will coupons be necessary in providing households with this essential. Incidentally, this action will help reduce government overhead.

The generally reported and profoundly deplored practice of the government in destroying surplus potatoes in order to keep the price up does not jibe with the president's plea for lower retail prices. In addition, it mocks the demand for more food to relieve hungry people.

A humble task well done is just as creditable as a showy and more lucrative endeavor. Whatever is undertaken—high or low in the scale of human activities—should be done with the zest that insures a satisfied mind.

**NEBRASKA'S NEED**  
 Last week Senator Hugh Butler introduced in the senate a bill requiring the United States army to sell part of the output of nitrogen of the Grand Island plant to American farmers for use as fertilizer. The senator explained that farmers in Nebraska are urgently in need of additional fertilizer. "Right in my own state," he told the senate, "the army is at present manufacturing fertilizer and then shipping it thousands of miles across land and water to the countries occupied by the armed forces. The farmers feel that they have produced to the limit all during the war, and seriously depleted the fertility of their soils. They realize our responsibility to foreign countries, but they feel they, too, should receive some consideration. In most cases fertilizer manufactured and shipped abroad this month will arrive too late to be of any value to European farmers during the current season. On the other hand, farmers in Nebraska need fertilizer immediately."

**Marines of Sixth Division Get Book**

Plans for the distribution of the Sixth Marine Division Memorial History in the early part of September have been announced by the division's history board, headquarters marine corps, Washington, D.C.  
 All former members of the division, and the next of kin of those members who were killed in action will receive a gratuitous copy, the announcement said.  
 The history, which contains 100,000 words of text, 300 halftone battle photographs, 20 illustrative maps and 19 full color photographs, was edited by Fletcher Pratt, well known war correspondent and military historian. The original text of the history was prepared by the officers and men of the division, and highlighted throughout by combat anecdotes as told by individuals who made up the division.

**FEDERAL EMPLOYEES**

The Norfolk Daily News calls attention to the 1,980,175 employees of the federal government scattered through the states as an argument in favor of trimming the president's budget. It says 16,508 are in Nebraska, less than one-third connected with the necessary postal service. It adds that more civilian employees are working for the war and navy departments than are employed in handling the mails. The News concludes with these paragraphs: "The agriculture department might be expected to have a good sized force in this farm state. But that department has fewer persons on its payroll than the navy department, and considerably fewer than half as many as the war department. What all these men and women are doing in Nebraska would require many pages of print to explain. Senator Harry Byrd, whose committee on nonessential federal expenditures has investigated personnel says there is no need for so large a payroll. And it is probable that ninety-nine out of every hundred Nebraskans will agree with him."

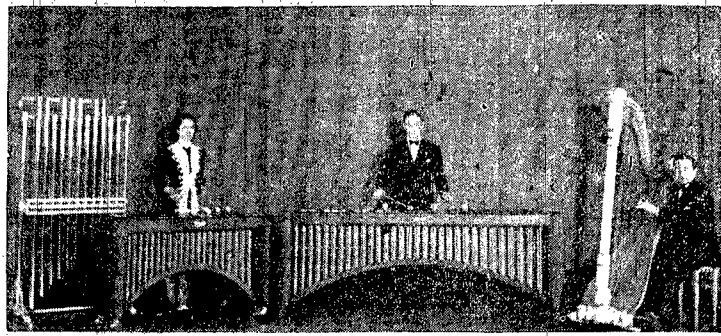
Self-employment allowances for veterans of World War II operating their own businesses or farms have gone up again in recent months, after a six-month decline beginning July 1, 1946.

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# To Honor Pioneers With Monument

## Pioneer Day Observance Brings Recollection of Wiseman Tragedy

Early Days from the Wayne Herald for June 18, 1931:

"A monument to pioneers will be erected on the court house lawn as a feature of the celebration commemorating Wayne's 50th anniversary July 2, 1931. The granite will bear the inscription, 'All honor to pioneers who broke the sod that we might live.' Beneath this will be the names of the first village board of trustees: A. R. Slater, John T. Bressler, Charles Johnson, James Britton and E. B. Taylor. Below the names will be carved the inscription, 'All honor to citizens who built a city that men might live wisely and well.'"

The annual pioneer day observance at Wynot brings back to early settlers recollection of the tragedy in the Wiseman family. The memorial stands on the site of the home in which four children were massacred by Sioux Indians July 24, 1863. Wiseman was a scout in the U. S. army. Mrs. Wiseman had gone to Yankton for supplies and left her children at the home near the site of Wynot. The Civil War was in progress, and the Indians often took advantage of the stress to vent vengeance on the whites who were settling the frontier. The Indians came to the Wiseman home and took the lives of the children. Several Indians paid with their lives for the misdeeds.

In Early Wayne Files.

From Wayne Herald for June 18, 1913: The state normal board discussed Wayne college's need for a new administration building. Prospects for the new structure are promising. Wayne Commercial club elected as officers L. A. Kiplinger, H. Bluechel, Fred Blair and H. B. Jones. Marshal Geo. Miner advises auto drivers to observe traffic rules. He suggests that they start soon enough so that they will not have to hurry and endanger lives. Fred Volpp, banker at Scribner and former resident of Wayne, may run for governor. A new boiler will be bought to bring the power plant up to date. W. C. Martin sold his pool hall in Wayne to J. F. Winteringer of Norfolk. Mr. Winteringer, who is a balloon ascension specialist, says he never had any desire to run an airplane or any other kind of air conveyance.

J. H. Kate and E. J. Raymond moved their X-ray incubator factory to Des Moines. Residents of Wayne think that by promoting new industries this city can grow to 6,000 population in a short time.

The Ponca Journal for June 28, 1893, states that citizens raised \$3,500 which they would donate toward a new \$5,000 court house at Ponca, provided that the county pay the other \$1,500. Commissioners have not yet acted on the matter.

Recorded at Ponca.

From Northern Nebraska Journal, Ponca, for June 9, 1887: Weather is very dry and small grain is suffering. July Fourth plans are as yet not made but Ponca and Martinsburg will celebrate.

The Des Moines and Fort Dodge railroad has been transferred to the Rock Island. Gladstone went to Wales to deliver addresses in favor of home rule for Ireland.

Sturgis, S. D., reports that the Fremont, Elkhorn and Missouri valley railroad will be extended to that place. The question of ad-

mitting the Dakotas to statehood will likely be taken up at the next meeting of congress. Wakefield proposes to celebrate the Fourth.

The Chinese laundryman, Sing Ho, has quit business and left Ponca. The election at Covington for the street car franchise was snowed under two to one.

The sums paid out for the Massey bluffs was \$26,000. For farming the land would not bring \$2,000. A large part of it would not be taken as a gift. Yet \$26,000 had been paid. There is no finer exercise than to take an early morning walk to one of Ponca's guardian hills. The view of the town, half hidden in trees, and the valleys, plains, river and forest is inspiring. 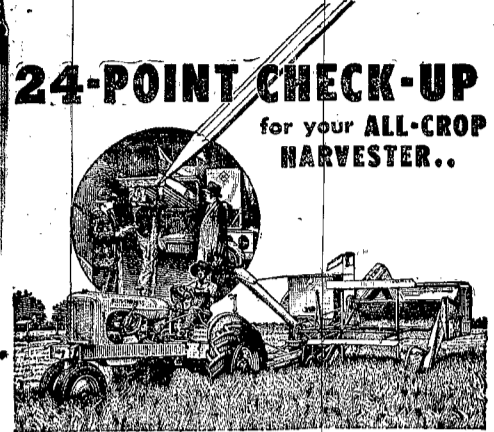

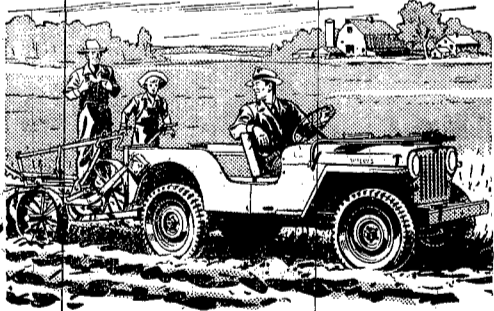

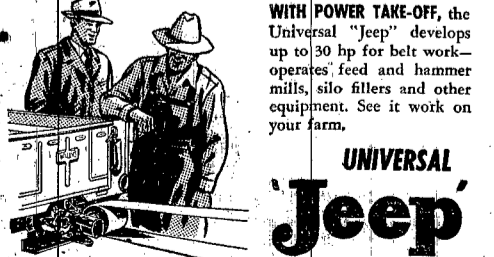

City Ordinance as to Fire Protection Is to Be Enforced

Following is a part of a City Ordinance as given in Chapter 7, Article 1. The provisions and penalties stated therein mean just what they say and will be enforced.

"When the fire alarm shall have been sounded every vehicle already stationed or parked at or near said fire shall remain so for a period of five minutes after the sounding of such alarm.

"The driver of any movable vehicle at or near said fire UPON THE APPROACH OF ANY FIRE ENGINE OR FIRE APPARATUS shall immediately draw up such vehicle as near the right hand curb as possible and shall bring such vehicle to a stand still until such fire engine or fire apparatus shall have passed."

"No vehicle, except by specific direction from the Chief of the Fire Department or his Assistant shall follow, approach or park closer than THREE HUNDRED FEET to a fire or fire apparatus."

"All members of the Fire Department shall during the time of the fire, have and may exercise the powers and duties of the Chief of Police."

Under the above regulations, anyone driving his car closer than 300 feet to a fire or following a fire truck closer than 300 feet is subject to arrest and fine.

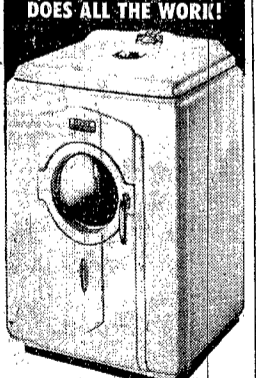
