Vet's Corner

Pay For Leave Bonds Seen.

A prediction that congress will vote at this session to permit veterans to cash their terminal leave bonds immediately was recently made by Speaker Martin (Rep. Mass.). Mr. Martin said congress using "savings" obtained through budget reductions, could permit payment of the leave bonds right away and thus reduce the national debt against which they now are charged. Treasury figures show veterans now own over \$1,830,455,000 in bonds. The step also will save the government this way:

The treasury can now borrow money at 1 1/2 per cent. But it is paying 2 1/2 per cent interest on the bonds, which do not mature and cannot be cashed for five years after date of issue.

Q. Will the address of a veteran be furnished by the Veterans Administration to a person for the purpose of collecting a debt which was incurred before the man entered service?

A. The Veterans Administration will in no way furnish the address of a veteran for the purpose of debt collection.
