Visit Test Plot To Check Grains

State Men Tell of Results Found in Experiments On Nearby Farm.

About 100 farmers, business men and others interested in small grain experimental work attended the sunset meeting Wednesday evening at the northeast Nebraska regional testing field four miles south of Wayne.

Plots Free of Disease. Dr. Jessie E. Livingston, state extension plant disease specialist, discussed the results found on the barley and oat seed treatment plots as observed to date.

With a few exceptions, the untreated plots appeared nearly as free of disease as the treated plots.

Mr. Livingston stated that the oat blight caused 25 per cent damage along the river while only 5 per cent to 10 per cent was noted in the fields in Wayne county.

The helminthosporium blight, according to Mr. Livingston, is principally a root rot in the early or seedling stage of the plant.

Control methods for the oat blight were given by Dr. Livingston, namely, crop rotation, seed treatment, and the planting of seed.

Gives New Flags To Kiwanis Club

Dr. Harry E. Peterka Tells Members of Audiometer At Monday Program.

Presentation of new flags to Kiwanis by Prof. O. R. Bowen and message on the audiometer by Dr. H. E. Peterka made up the program for the local club Monday.

It was in July, 1929, just 18 years ago, when Ernest Folsom of Lincoln, then lieutenant governor of the Nebraska-Iowa district of Kiwanis, presented to the local club the American and Canadian flags which have hung on the wall since. At that time Mr. Folsom was unable to present and he invited Prof. Bowen to represent him in making the gift.

In his message Prof. Bowen noted that Kiwanis is the only organization that binds together the English speaking people of this continent. The two flags symbolize the goodwill of the nations.

Monday Prof. Bowen made a personal gift of new, silk American and Canadian flags which will adorn the wall at Kiwanis meetings and which will be saluted each time the group convenes.

President Dave Theophilus expressed the club's appreciation to Prof. Bowen and Mrs. Beckenhauer led the group in singing "America" and "God Save the King."

Tells of Audiometer. Dr. Peterka, introduced by Prof. Russell Anderson, explained the use of the audiometer which is used to test hearing disability. The equipment which he had with him, is approved by the American Medical association as an accurate device for testing auditory hearing. The device was secured for the college through the Kellogg Foundation.

Human speech, Dr. Peterka explained, is a series of vibrations. The frequencies of speech lie within a certain range, and the human ear is tuned to these. Persons who fail to distinguish consonants have a hearing loss, he noted. Tests on the instrument are recorded on graphs.

Dr. Peterka told that the aim is to test all children in this part of the state if possible. So often some correction such as removal of tonsils will correct their hearing so that they can grow to adulthood with normal hearing. Their learning is greatly affected by hearing ability. Many rejections in service were due to hearing loss. The results of tests are reported to parents who are advised to take the children to a physician or ear specialist.

Dr. Peterka invited all to avail themselves of the free hearing test available at the college.

Besides 45 members, Kiwanian Myron Brockway of Glenwood Springs, Colo., was with J. F. Keeline and Dr. Peterka and John Alden Lewis were guests of the club. Mr. Lewis is new scoutmaster of the troop sponsored by Kiwanis.

Prof. John R. Keith was in charge of music for the opening at 9 in the college auditorium. Dr. Rosene gave an address.

Cuming County Superintendent Margaret Graves presided at 10 in the administration building. Dr. Victor P. Morey gave the welcome and Cedar County Superintendent J. Mike McCoy responded. Prof. Dale spoke on modern methods in teaching geography.

PRODUCE BUYS AS MUCH OR MORE NOW THAN IN BAD TIMES

It took more produce to buy things at depression prices that started in 1931 than are required now at higher prices. Somewhat more than two bushels of corn at 42 cents per bushel July 8, 1931, were needed to buy a 48-pound sack of flour at 98 cents. Less than two bushels of corn now quoted at \$1.94 per bushel are required to buy a sack of flour at \$3.69.

On the date mentioned in 1931, oats were selling at 20 cents per bushel, eggs 11 cents per dozen, Leghorn hens 9 cents per pound, butterfat 21 cents per pound. Prices now: Oats, 48 cents, eggs 38 cents, hens 15 to 26 cents per pound, butterfat 45 cents, sour, and 70 cents, sweet. We note hens were quoted around \$6 per 100 in 1931. Top on the Sioux City market last week was somewhat above \$25 per 100. Wages of all kinds are considerably higher now than they were during the price peak following World War I, but jobs became so few during subsequent depression years that the WPA was launched as a remedy.

In Concord, Dixon and Laurel vicinity, bids are sought on gravel for No. 116 between No. 15 and U. S. No. 20, No. 117 between Dixon and Laurel and between Concord and Dixon.

Other jobs on which bids are asked are regreveling as follows: Oakland to Tokamah, between Emmons and Dakota City on No. 35, between Albion and Neligh, south of Stanton, No. 12 between Ponce and Jackson, north of Belden 3.9 miles, south of Osmond 18.1 miles, between Tekamah and Decatur, between Magnet and Nos. 20 and 81, between No. 12 and No. 84 in Knox county, between Newman Grove and Humphrey.

Farley's Disclosure WE WERE never favorably impressed by the late President Franklin Roosevelt. We thought he was more of a showman than statesman. But we did not suspect he would go as far as Jim Farley says he went in using a friend and then sidetracking him.

We thought the late president was misled by fantastic leftwingers. He saddled an increased burden of debt on New York when he was governor of that state, and he did the same thing on a big scale in leading the economy of the United States.

Preliminary to his first election as president, he warned against multiplying government bureaus and piling up a huge federal debt. He solemnly pledged a balanced budget. Instead he led a wild spending spree. Bureaus increased. The country got further and further into debt. When one costly and usually ill-advised experiment failed, he tried another with equally unfortunate results.

The war caught the country deeply in debt, but it started a wave of unprecedented buying and high prices. This was a tonic for the weakened economic body. Washington officials are now trying to ease the country out of inflation and into sound economy.

Those who had confidence in the late president may be inclined to wish Farley's disheartening revelation had not been

made. Those who hold a man in high favor usually do not relish being disillusioned.

Governor Thomas Dewey of New York, who is on a tour of the country, disclaims being a candidate for the presidency, but his lively interest in key men where he tarries and other symptoms suggest he is quietly sounding the depths of public opinion. He is, of course, mindful of the fact that New York is a large force in conventions and elections. The background of a comparatively economical and otherwise successful governorship will help him. If he has a notion to run, as he doubtless has, his delay in announcing himself should also add strength.

Even hitherto pronounced leftists are beginning to understand the raw duplicity of Russian leadership. The soviet union outfit has proved beyond doubt what many had suspected and suggested for a long time. It is safest to make no contributions to a country that shows enmity for any nation it cannot control. It is safest to prevent Russia from gaining any information about the atomic bomb or any other military secret that would help its thirst for world domination.

Millions of dollars in flood damage to the middle west of late have spurred governors of the central states to camp on the trail of congress to urge an early water control program. Delay in harnessing and directing midwest streams has not only caused huge losses, but delayed projects for essential irrigation and power. The national administration may finance a pressing public demand by lopping off a horde of useless job holders.

A recent meeting of the democratic state central committee went on record against the unicameral which was engineered into being by the late Senator George Norris. The committee objects on the ground that members are non-partisan and lack party responsibility.

John L. Lewis has scored a victory in boosting coal miners' wages. Mine management makes the concession to insure uninterrupted production. This is important to keep many branches of industry going. The result will logically increase coal prices to ultimate consumers.

Northeast Nebraska is behind other sections of the country in seeing the "flying saucers." Most states have reported seeing them. The question of what they really are is still unsolved.

Because of her restlessness and love of living, she attempts to influence the one man who actually loves her. The novel moves to an inevitable climax, vividly portraying on its way many lesser characters.

"Treasures of the Kingdom" is a collection of stories of faith, hope and love. T.
