

The national administration may finance a pressing public demand by lopping off a horde of useless job holders.

A recent meeting of the democratic state central committee went on record against the unicameral which was engineered into being by the late Senator George Norris. The committee objects on the ground that members are non-partisan and lack party responsibility.

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FLOOD LOSSES can be reduced

We don't mean that you can prevent all flood losses, such as shown above at Cambridge, Nebraska. But where conservation practices are applied completely on a watershed, soil conservationists say floods the headwater streams may be reduced as much as 20 to 40 per cent. Farther down, on the bigger streams, flood crests may be reduced 5 to 15 per cent. Even that much off the crest of a flood - might cut losses

In addition to reducing flood losses, think of the soil that can be saved on sloping farmland! On slopes up to 5 per cent, a good cropping system, bolstered by contour, farming and well-sodded waterways, will cut the loss of topsoil from erosion at

least 50 per cent. Under similar conditions, with the fields terraced, erosion conti-been as high as 90 per cent effective.

Under a terrific rainstorm, the farmer can't always hope to hold all the water on his land. But what hurts is the damage done by the run-off. The individual farmer done by the run-off. The individual rather can do something about that: For example, level terraces on one Mills County, Iowa, farm held without loss a five-inch rain during the June wet spell. In other cases, drainage-type terraces carried away excess water with minimum damage to the land:
