





Thursday, July 24, 1947 The WRITING of the "State of the Nation" in the Christian Science Veto Monitor, Roscoe Drummond, chief of that newspaper's Washington news bureau, says tax reduction has be-come a political football. Re-passing the tax reduction bill to be veteed a second time by the president promises to strength-en the republican position in the 1948 cam-paign. The veto was overridden-in the house by a large majórity, but was en-dorsed in the senate by a narrow margin. It is noted that the power of one man to frustrate acts of representative bodies has given rise to talk of au amendment to do away with the veto or cut down the over-riding two-thirds at present required. Says the Monitor writer in conclusion : "There is no party issue here, since Presi-dent Hoover used the voto as often when he lost control of congress in 1930 as President Truman is using it today. "Undamentally the veto is a brake on popu-lar government and was so designed by the authors of the constitution. It certainly would be as logical to abolish the requirement of a two-thirds senate vote to ratify treaties. Both are instruments of minority government. Elim-ination of either would increase the responsive-ness and power of congress." Parents CRUEL parental neglect is
