Nebraska Laws forbid sale of alcoholic beverages to minors. Violation of this law subjects the tavern keeper to revocation or suspension of his license. No retailer can afford that risk.

To protect tavern keepers against misrepresentations of age, this Committee has pro-vided retailers with "Sworn Statements" which doubtful cases must sign before making purchase. Minors who swear they are 21 years of age or over are subject to a \$50 fine for misrepresentation.

This is only one important service to the public provided by this Committee. The purpose of the program as a whole is to keep the handling of beer on such a high plane that it has the full approval of the public.



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


