ORDINANCE NO. 443

An ordinance of the City of Wayne, Nebraska, creating and establishing a street improvement district designated and to be known as Paving District No. 16 of the City of Wayne, Nebraska, defining the limits and boundaries thereof, determining and describing the real estate located therein, providing for securing plans and specifications and the estimate of the cost and expense of the improvements hereinafter specified, providing for and authorizing the grading, curbing, guttering, draining, paving and otherwise improving the street and alley wings located in said District; hereinafter described; providing for the payment of the cost and expenses thereof and the levying of assessments as provided by law on and against the real estate located in said District, as will be specially benefited by such improvement and abutting on or adjacent to such roadway to be improved, providing for the issuance of warrants during the course of work and construction of said improvements and for the payment thereof, providing for the issuance of District Paving Warrants or District Paving Bonds to pay the cost and expense of said improvements and providing for the levying of a general tax to pay said intersection paving bonds and interest thereon, and providing for the creating of a sinking fund for the payment of all said paving bonds, both District and Intersection, and the interest thereon as they mature, and for the issuance of temporary warrants as the work progresses, and finding and determining the sufficiency of the petition thereto filed in the office of the City Clerk of Wayne, Nebraska, by certain property owners in said proposed District and prescribing the time when this ordinance shall be in full force and effect.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WAYNE, NEBRASKA: Section 1. The Mayor and Council of the City of Wayne, County of Wayne, State of Nebraska, hereby find and determine; that a petition has been presented to and filed with the City Clerk of the City of Wayne, Nebraska, petitioning for the creation of a paving district and for the paving and improving of the following described street within the City of Wayne, Nebraska, to-wit:

1. That part of Sherman Street commencing at the North line of Seventh Street East of Sherman Street and running thence North to the South line of Ninth Street, by grading, guttering, draining, curbing, paving and otherwise improving the same. That said petition has been signed by more than 67% of the resident real estate owners of real estate directly abutting upon the street to be improved.

Section 2. That for the purpose of grading, curbing, guttering, paving, draining, and otherwise improving the street and alley wings located therein, hereinafter described hereby designated and to be known as Paving District No. 16 of the City of Wayne, Nebraska, shall be and hereby is created and established in said City. Said District shall contain and be composed of all the following described real estate located in Britton and Bressler's Addition to the City of Wayne, Nebraska, to-wit:

- 1. Lots two (2) and three (3) in Block five (5).
2. Lots two (2) and three (3) in Block eleven (11).
3. The East one hundred fifty (150) feet of the South part of Outlot two (2) lying South of the South line of Ninth Street produced West.
4. The East one hundred fifty (150) feet of Outlots three (3) and four (4).

Section 3. Said City shall provide for and secure and have filed

said City for the payment of the same and interest thereon, which said tax shall constitute a sinking fund for the payment of said Bonds and the interest thereon.

That all warrants which are issued pursuant to Section 5 hereof and interest thereon shall be paid in full from the proceeds of the District Paving Warrants or District Paving Bonds and Intersection Paving Bonds above authorized to be issued.

Section 4. That upon said plans and specifications and estimate being filed in the office of its clerk and approved and accepted by said City, said City shall in accordance therewith and in the manner provided by law proceed to and shall grade, curb, gutter, drain, pave and otherwise improve said street described in Section 3 hereof and the alley wings thereof; that said pavement of said street shall be of concrete and 24 feet in width between the curb lines thereof and said plans and specifications shall be prepared accordingly. Upon approval of the plans and specifications for said improvement and the estimate of the cost thereof submitted by the special engineer employed, bids for the construction of said improvement shall be invited by advertisement as provided by law. Upon the acceptance of any bid thereof, the Mayor and City Council of the City of Wayne, Nebraska, are hereby authorized to enter into a contract on behalf of said City for such work. The Mayor and City Council of said City shall have the right to reject any and all bids and to waive any defects therein.

Section 5. For the purpose of making partial payments as said work and construction progresses, warrants may be issued by the Mayor and Council of said City upon certificates of the engineer in charge stating the amount of work completed in a sum not exceeding eighty per cent of the cost and expense thereof.

Section 6. That after the completion of said improvements said City as provided by law shall levy special assessments on and against the several lots above described abutting on or adjacent to the street, alley or alleys so improved especially benefited by said improvements in proportion to such benefits, to pay the cost and expense of such improvements, except the cost and expense of street intersections and areas formed by the crossing of streets, avenues or alleys which shall be paid by said City.

Section 7. That said City shall as provided by law issue its District Paving Warrants or District Paving Bonds of said District and its Intersection Paving Bonds in the proper proportionate and necessary amounts to pay the cost and expense of said improvements, and said City shall, following the issuance of said Intersection Paving Bonds, annually levy a tax upon the taxable property within
