Its tyrant bosses apparently don't try to figure out where the truth begins or ends. The United States is evidently in the way of communist world domination, and so Russia is eyeing this country with thinly disguised threats. That despite contribu-tions made to Russia during and since the war. Why the soviet union wants to force universal rule is not understandable. That that is its ambition is made clear. That its will fail in a conflict with free peoples is also clear. Then deflated power and shrunken territory will be the penalty. But the United States must be on the alert and be prepared. prepared

The Des Moines Register suggests the kind of literary pabulum Russian reporters are fequired to dish out to their home readers. The Register says "If a Russian journalist were to visit the fair he'd cable home a bitter piece about the Americans who were throwing baseballs at a colored journalist

man. Of course, nobody was; they were throwing balls at a board which dumped him into a tub of water if they hit it; a wire screen protected him from being hit; he wasn't a colored man anyhow, just a white man in blackface; and the boys throwing, the balls couldn't throw yery straight. But a Russian journalist would cable what Pravda wanted.

Members of the Nebraska delegation in Washington have not been loafing since adjournment of the two houses. Senator Butler has been in Alaska, informing him-self on conditions there. Senator Wherry has been visiting Nebraska towns and get-ting acquainted with popular reactions. Congressman Karl Stefan has just returned from a trip to the Pacific coast where he inspected government installations. The congressman is chairman of the house ap-propriations subcommittee. He is planning to visit points in the Third district before returning to Washington.

The Norfolk Daily News quotes Karl Wilken, Washington economist and busi-ness analyst, as telling livestock men meet-ing in Fremont recently that the cost of Wilken. ing in Fremont recently that the cost of living figured in percentages is no higher than it was in 1922 when farm prices and everything else were down to a low level. Mr. Wilken sags we were spending 20 per cent of our income for food in 1922 and we are spending the same proportion now. This report may tend to ease feelings dis-tressed by present high costs.

Louis Bromfield, columnist, says labor ions suffer most from restrictions impos ed by a socalistic government. This is prov-ing true in England. It is true wherever socialism is in actual practice. Unioners are told when and where to work and how much they are to receive. Union labor should be the last to flirt with the socialis-tic idea.

Not to be outdone by republican candi-lates, President Truman is to be urged by his party leaders to take a swing through western states on his return from Brazil. The president is not uneasy over his nomination, but his supporters have reason to be doubtful of the subsequent election.

Gov. Val Peterson is quoted as express-ing the need of a special session of the legislature to remedy defects in Nebraska's public assistance laws. It would seem any other public matters pressing for attention should be included in the call.
