Well, sir, we know it's going to be a hard job, but we'll try.

Of course, we know that just plain "trying" won't fill E. W. (Gene) Huse's shoes today, but maybe he has an old pair around that he wore 35 or 40 years ago that we could sort of break in on here at The Herald. He says that he was our age—and starting in at The Herald—about that many years back.

Gene says we will probably make some changes. Well, if we do, it will just be in the ways our ideas develop as we go along trying to keep pace with the times. The Herald has certainly kept pace up to now; we only hope we can do as good a job for the next 40 years.

But people in most communities refer to their newspaper as "our paper." Andperhaps more than most other types of business, the local newspaper is everybody's. So, if it is conducted correctly, perhaps in the long run it doesn't matter so much who happens to be the owner, if the paper carries on as a worthy public servant. So we'll try to do just that. And we do want your comment, your criticism, and your good will. As long as it is "our newspaper" all of us in this community should have a hand in The Herald's future.

But E. W. will still be identified with the newspaper. He wants freedom from responsibility... but he will conduct a col-umn of his views and interpretations on the passing show of life, and also contribute some editorial comment for Herald readsome editorial comment for Herald readers. In other words, he is just going to do as he darn pleases, yet he has a desk here when he wants it. (And already E. W. is getting sort of carefree—he didn't show up at the Herald office until after seven this morning, and he used to make it before six).

We are not qualified to pay compliment to Retiring Publisher E. W. Huse, for we have known him such a short time. But we have heard of him for years, and in the field of community journalism we have heard much — all good. We can see his handiwork here... and it is mighty good.

The United States tried hard to avoid World War II, and is now trying desperately to prevent a third military conflagration. It sacrificed many precious lives and billions in treasure to insure world freedom. It is producing to the limit and under frequent hardships to further world rehabilitation and to feed hungry peoples abroad. If it were not strong enough to do that, conditions would be incomparably worse.

Against Compulsion

Senator Taft believes compulsory military training would force a similar policy in every nation in the world and prove an obstacle to peace. He thinks compulsory military training would encourage war. A program of the compulsory kind mentioned, is yet to be considered and decided

A story in the current Time magazinc, treating of President Robert Gordon Sproul of the University of California at Berkeley, quoted the distinguished educator as suggesting that 10,000 of the more than 40,000 enrolled shouldn't be there. 

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
