October usually makes good its reputation for moderate temperatures with enough frost to tint and beautify vegetation. Cold nips leaves. They lived when they were most needed, and having served their purpose, they scatter over the ground in enrapturing colors and gradually disappear. As chill elements increase, trees become skeletons, and in time are covered with draperies of snow. October lies between winter extremes. Rarely does a bad storm appear. October is generally acclaimed with few disappointments, a month free from atmospheric disorders. It is sometimes somber, but usually delightful.

An Innovation. Grand Island schools have added what seems to us an important course. They propose to teach students how to drive cars. A careful and understanding teacher will be able to insure in large measure against reckless driving. They may be able to present many future accidents. Students will be taught driving rules and conventions, traffic conditions, the mathematics of speed and the driving mechanism of cars.

Safeguards to avoid car accidents to students attending the college and high schools have been provided, and in view of numerous young persons going and coming, they are eminently necessary. Especially motorists need to be on the alert to protect young children who are often forgetful of dangers. It is important for car drivers to slow up in school neighborhoods.

Corn Condition. It is encouraging to note more favorable reports on maturing corn from government crop experts. The corn is said to exceed earlier estimates, and frost no longer threatens. More filled silos will no doubt serve extraordinary live-stock feeding. It is always a relief to receive crop reports that are better instead of worse than expected.

The young man emphasized deep gratitude for copies of the Herald which he received as long as they could be sent.

Can One Learn. We wonder if we will be able to learn after many years in a groove, how to play and enjoy more leisure. In our youth we enjoyed fishing, but we recall we were not smart enough to capture anything more intelligent than bullheads. We fished once in Klamath river in Oregon, but caught nothing. Fall in Elevator Fatal to Matron

Rites for Mrs. Esther King Are Conducted Monday In Lincoln Chapel.

Mrs. Esther King, nearly 40, formerly Esther Hennegar of Wayne, was killed early Friday in a fall down the north elevator shaft at Good Milling & Elevator Co., 6th and South street, Lincoln. She apparently dropped 22 feet to the shaft floor when the step broke on the main lift on which she was riding. The lift was about 10 feet from the main floor when the accident occurred.

A police officer described the death as accidental. Funeral rites were conducted Monday at 1:30 from a Lincoln mortuary with Rev. F. M. Drulliner of University Place, formerly of Carroll, in charge. Burial followed in Wyuka cemetery in Lincoln.

Esther Hennegar was born December 23, 1907, at Bloomfield. The family came to Wayne in 1915. She was married in Minnesota 24 years ago to Kenneth King. The couple lived at Carroll for a few years and then went to Nelson, Neb., and eight years ago to Lincoln.

Deceased leaves her husband, three children, Shirley Mae, now Mrs. Richard Bjerly of Lincoln, LeRoy of Salinas, Calif., and Robert at home. There is one grandchild, Suzanne Bjerly. Mrs. King is also survived by her mother, Mrs. Alex Hennegar of Wayne, two sisters and a brother, Mrs. E. M. Morris and Lonnie Hennegar of Wayne, and Mrs. Helen Cook of Mankato, Minn. Her father died in 1933 and a sister, Evelyn, died at 9 months.

Tells Importance Of Vocational Ag

Campus High Farm Course Is Under Direction of Bernard Burke.

"One of the most active and valuable programs at the campus high school of Wayne State Teachers college is the vocational agriculture work under the direction of Bernard Burke," said Dr. Victor P. Morry at a recent meeting of students of the school.

Mr. Burke outlined the work of the classes and explained the entire vocational agriculture program with particular emphasis on first year work and continuation type projects.

The Future Farmers of America organization will highlight this year's work with awards for the best student shop and supervised farming programs as well as undertaking a cooperative purebred swine project.

Work of the students began with a meeting September 24 when parents were shown demonstrations of meeting procedures at the campus school. Crops, livestock and shop materials were displayed.

In addition, the meeting featured slide films showing outstanding project work in Nebraska and a movie, "Potatoes Unlimited," which demonstrated marketing, production and handling processes in commercial potato production. Plans for the year's work were also discussed.

On September 26, the class attended a terracing demonstration at the Hansen farm where an excellent terrace was quickly and easily constructed to dispel a tendency to believe the modern farming technique is a difficult undertaking. "We believe that this type of soil conservation is going to be a must for profitable farming in the future," said Mr. Burke.

Dr. M. B. Street, superintendent of the campus school, emphasized that the vocational agriculture program is available to all interested students from Wayne and its vicinity.

Centers of Study Well Under Way

Wayne State College Gets Twelve Classes Formed In This Section.

Organization of study center classes sponsored by Wayne State Teachers college in 12 cities in northeastern Nebraska started Saturday, October 4, when initial class meetings were held in Norfolk, Albion, O'Neill and Pender.

The classes are arranged through cooperative effort of county school superintendents and the college to provide on-the-job training for Nebraska teachers and to supplement advanced work for higher degrees.

Teachers may enroll for three semester hours credit in classes which meet five times during the first semester of the college year.

Classes scheduled for this fall, location, instructor and starting date include the following: Psychology, Norfolk, Dr. H. E. Terrega, October 4; American history, Albion, Aldo Molinari, October 4; public school music, O'Neill, Miss Norma Wendelberg, October 18; geography of North America, Neligh, George W. Costlerman, October 18; rural school management, Center, Clarence McGinn, October 18; American history, Hartington, Aldo Molinari, October 18; English, South Sioux City, Dr. M. H. Hanawalt, October 18; elementary science, Pierce, Miss Lula Way, October 18; education, West Point, Dr. O. F. Moore, October 18; primary activities, Schuyler, Miss Ruth Williams, October 18; methods in grammar, O'Neill, Miss Frances Phillips, October 4; and American history, Wayne, Aldo Molinari, November 8.

Clarence McGinn, dean of men at the college, is director of the study center program. He will conduct courses in the improvement of instruction in social studies at Pender beginning October 4 and at Ponca beginning November 1. These classes will grant three semester hours credit and will hold five meetings during the first and second semesters of the college.

Well, sir, we know it's going to be a hard job, but we'll try. Of course, we know that just plain "trying" won't fill E. W. (Gene) Huse's shoes today, but maybe he has an old pair around that he wore 35 or 40 years ago...

But E. W. will still be identified with the newspaper. He wants freedom from responsibility... but he will conduct a column of his views and interpretations on the passing show of life...

We are not qualified to pay compliment to Retiring Publisher E. W. Huse, for we have known him such a short time. But we have heard of him for years, and in the field of community journalism we have heard much—all good...

Then, too, Gene has been receiving some heavy mail lately from old friends who know his work... who are qualified to comment. By means of a modest amount of petty thievery, we have stolen a few excerpts from these letters, and present them below.

—The Publishers

From the Sioux City Journal: "Mr. Huse... expressed the hope... that he would be able to do better work in the future. (He might be setting himself a difficult task in that, for his work in the past has been excellent). Mrs. Nyberg... is known to The Journal as one of the most accomplished news writers in the newspaper field."

From the Norfolk Daily News: "After 37 years under the capable management of E. W. Huse, ably assisted for 25 years by his daughter, Mrs. Dorothy Huse Nyberg, The Wayne Herald has changed ownership... This will be counted as an event in Nebraska journalism. The Wayne Herald has been living proof of the saying that a newspaper is what you make it... Mr. Huse has expanded the field of The Herald beyond what would ordinarily be considered the territory of a weekly paper. His paper has given service not only to

Unwarranted Ugliness

What a world-wide miasma of bad feeling has developed! And where is the reason for it? Why so much unwarranted hate directed at this country? Russia is now the central source of disturbing threats, and its leaders should have better sense.

The United States tried hard to avoid World War II, and is now trying desperately to prevent a third military conflagration. It sacrificed many precious lives and billions in treasure to insure world freedom.

The United States is going all out to help. Why can't foreign groups see this country's benevolence, and at least reciprocate with an appreciative attitude? Needs constantly met should encourage distressed peoples.

Senator Taft believes compulsory military training would force a similar policy in every nation in the world and prove an obstacle to peace. He thinks compulsory military training would encourage war.

A story in the current Time magazine, treating of President Robert Gordon Sproul of the University of California at Berkeley, quoted the distinguished educator as suggesting that 10,000 of the more than 40,000 enrolled shouldn't be there. But how would one be able wisely to discriminate? Would it be fair and just to appraise student values in a way that would eliminate certain ones? Thomas Edison was a poor student in school. How many Edisons would be dropped and cast aside?

Senator Wherry of Nebraska was quoted in Chicago recently as determined to equalize advantages for small business. He is chairman of the senate small business committee. He said hearings would be held on tax reforms. He mentioned that 98 per cent of the nation's business firms are small ones.

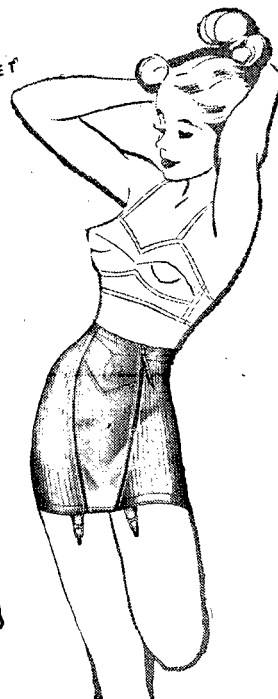

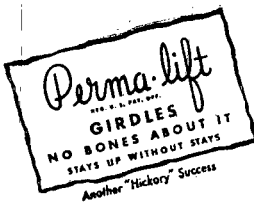

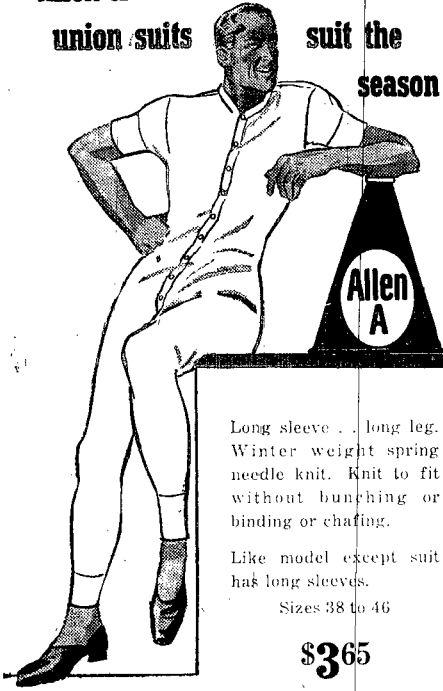

Three Wayne county farmers who have entered the World-Herald Soil Conservation program, point out benefits of starting soil conservation early to prevent excessive erosion.

Roy Sundell has constructed 4,900 feet of terrace on his gently rolling farm land near Wakefield. He uses stubble-mulch tillage, enabling the land to take more moisture. Furrows help conserve the moisture.

Roy Day, Wayne, another entry, plants all crops on the contour and has built 3,900 feet of terraces and 3,600 feet of grassed waterways.

Arthur Westerhaus who farms near Winside, was represented in the contest for a second time. He received a certificate of recognition last year. This farm has nearly three miles of grassed waterways and all cropland is farmed on the contour with terraces. More than 100 acres are included in long-time crop rotation.

Carroll Church Has Anniversary

During that time a new church was built in Carroll. Minutes of November 1916 show that each landowner contributed \$100 for a parsonage built south of the church.

Rev. F. W. Kaul was installed to serve in May 1921, and was succeeded by Rev. H. F. Krohn about six years later. In February, 1934, Rev. C. E. Fredrickson of McCook, accepted a call and remained here until August, 1946, when he went to Hoisington, Kan.

Special services in March 1942 celebrated completion of a basement under the church structure. A year later the main building was enlarged and completely redecorated.

Rev. M. Reetz, formerly of Gurley, Neb., was installed December 15, 1946.

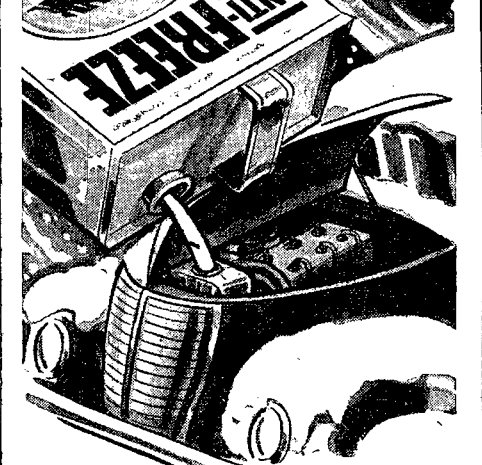
