Five methods of meeting the crisis were pointed out by Dr. Kennedy. "First, we can turn to economists for the answer, but there is too much disagreement among them. In conquered nations of the world today, we're the economic bosses. We can do what we want, but we don't know what to do, or how to go about doing it. Yet, we know that hunger and discontent are seed-beds of communism, and we are at a loss to know how to cope with the problem. "Next, we could turn to the politician for the solution. Here again we meet defeat. America has few times in its history been on a lower plane of political leadership. What should we do with Greece? Our 400 multion dollar loan looks too much like a bribe. What should we do with the United Nations? We cannot politically work for peace with nations that have no desire for peace. And there is no political answer to the Palestine question.

"What aid can a militarist offer? He has no answer to convince even himself, only to kill more of the enemy than they kill of us. But in killing one enemy we create a hundred new ones." Dr. Kennedy is strongly opposed to compulsory military tranning. He believes it is "50 years too late." Conscription of youth has never made a nation strong; it has merely put the education of youth in the hands of a small military bureaucracy. Certainly this is not what we want. Find God is Answer.

"But the answer to our crisis, find God; find a new basis for our life. Human nature must be redeemed and saved. We are not statistics or numbers. Each man's life has eternal significance. God is concerned with each individual. As soon as we get back to God's way and re-find our faith, we will have the strength, the moral power to overcome this materialistic.
