The optimistic atmosphere in Washington may well encourage citizens everywhere to regard the future with more equanimity. It will contribute to the holiday spirit of confidence and good will. It will ease the country over Thanksgiving day with fewer troublesome prospects to contemplate.

Thanksgiving finds the world with numerous problems to solve. It finds this country with increased responsibilities — responsibilities it cannot escape. Congress in special session is trying to meet world demands without impairing the traditional system of free enterprise.

The Pilgrim Fathers who arrived in 1620 to secure religious freedom, suffered innumerable hardships. The country was raw and untamed. Restless Indians added to difficulties. Endurance was taxed to the limit.

Development in more than 300 years has been amazing. The United States has become the richest and most powerful nation in the world. Guaranteed individual initiative has made possible its giant forward strides. It has become so resourceful and has so much to preserve that it has been drawn into world affairs and must take the lead in tranquilizing the social order abroad.

Some light penetrates the shadows hanging over the world, but not enough to remove uneasiness. We may be thankful we are strong enough to lead the forces of precious human freedom. We hope congress will adopt the right course in upholding the American way of life, thus bequeathing to posterity the priceless values gained from a long line of illustrious patriots.

DAYS OF MOISTURE PUT STOP TO CORN PICKING PROGRAM

Two Are Injured In Car Accident On Wednesday

Condition of One Of Men Serious

Clarence E. Liveringhouse, 72, was severely injured and Elmer Bodendstedt was also hurt last Wednesday evening about 10:30 when they were accidentally struck by a car driven by Marv H. Guern on south Main street.

Mr. Liveringhouse's left leg was broken at the knee, two small bones being fractured and also the kneecap. The limb is in a full-length cast. The right ankle was fractured and the member is in a cast to the knee. Mr. Liveringhouse had a broken back vertebra. He also has internal injury. He is in a Sioux City hospital where he was taken after he had received first aid here Wednesday night.

Problem of Atomic Bomb Presented in New Way

A drastically different approach to the atomic bomb problem will be presented at 8 p. m., Sunday, November 30, at the Wayne Baptist church where the new sound-color film, "God of the Atom," will be shown. The picture has been produced by Dr. Irwin A. Moon, director of the Moody Institute of Science in Los Angeles.

"God of the Atom" points out that discovery of atomic energy has brought man's consciousness of religion more sharply into focus. The problem, Dr. Moon declares, is not what man has but what man is. "Our trouble in the world has never been due to the fact that we've had swords or guns or gunpowder or tanks or airplanes or even atomic bombs," says Dr. Moon. "Take all these things from the world and men will beat each other to death with their bare fists!" He believes that there is only one solution to the problem—a personal relationship to God.

Serious Accident Occurs on Sunday

A truck-car collision on Highway 20 Sunday evening about 6 o'clock a mile and three-fourths east of the Chambers station north of Dixon took the lives of two Wayne State college coeds, Miss Charlyne Burgess-Phillips, 17, and Miss Joan Hansen, 18, both of South Sioux City.

Gail Powell, 17, of South Sioux City, who was bringing the girls to Wayne after a week-end visit at home, was seriously injured and was taken to a Sioux City hospital, Vic Arms, 37, of Hartington, driver of the truck, was unhurt.

The accident occurred near the crest of a hill. The young folks were driving west and Gail evidently lost control of the machine on some ice. Mr. Arms said that the youth was having trouble and drove his truck onto the shoulder at the right side of the road and halted the machine. The car driver could not regain control of his machine and the auto crashed head-on into the truck.

Hurtled from car. Both girls were hurled through the door of the car as the lighter vehicle swung at an angle after colliding with the stock truck. Miss Hansen's lifeless body was under one of the dual wheels beneath the driver's side of the truck and Miss Phillips' body was in front of the rear wheel on the same side. Gail, who had a leg fracture and severe cuts and bruises, was rushed to Sioux City in a Laurel ambulance.

Willard White brought the bodies of the girls to Wayne. Booker funeral service of South Sioux City came for Miss Phillips' body and Barber service for Miss Hansen's.

The motor was torn from the car and was caught on the front of the truck. The truck engine was also badly damaged and livestock had to be unloaded.

Funeral services. Funeral rites for Miss Hansen were conducted Wednesday at 2:30 at First Lutheran church in South Sioux City, with Rev. J. E. Messer in charge.

War Memorial Being Planned By Community

Dedication Is Set For Decoration Day

Wayne Woman's club and Business and Professional Woman's division are taking the initiative in erection of a memorial to be placed at the park north of Wayne as a tribute to all Wayne county World War Two personnel who made the supreme sacrifice. The women have volunteered to provide the funds for this marker which may be the likeness of an eagle with outspread wings, the wings to bear the names of those who gave their lives, about 40 in all. It is also suggested that name plates for all who served, those for whom trees have been and will be planted, be placed in a suitable arrangement, probably on plaques in posts at the entrance gate. Unveiling is proposed at outstanding Decoration day services next May 30.

Representatives of various civic groups met last week to discuss the plans. It was suggested that the Legion sponsor the usual Memorial day services in the morning at Greenwood cemetery and that noon picnic dinner be followed by the special service with outstanding speaker at Memorial park. It is thought that such a program would be especially fitting next Decoration day as a number of the bodies of veterans will have been brought back from overseas by that time. It would also serve to deepen appreciation of sacrifices made.

Mayor L. W. McNail and city council, Chamber of Commerce, Legion, VFW, Legion Auxiliary, VFW Auxiliary, Kiwanis, firemen, War Dads, BPW and Wayne Woman's club were represented at the meeting last week. H. B. Craven is president and Mrs. Chris. Tietgen secretary of the community group.

Committees were named to investigate possibilities regarding the memorial, the tree plaques, gateway, benches, etc. The community group will meet again soon to hear reports, to coordinate proposals and to organize for promotion of the plans.

Woman's club took the initiative some years ago in providing the nucleus fund of \$6,000 for the new auditorium and promoting its erection. Last year the women promoted making the park a memorial ground and planting the memorial trees. The club is now interested in a community movement to honor war personnel at Memorial park and to provide a marker that will be dedicated as a fitting tribute to all at Decoration day services.

Power District Serving 1,220

The Wayne County Rural Public Power District closed its eighth year of operation November 17 with a record of extensive growth despite the war years which made expansion virtually impossible.

At its start, the district had only 150 miles of lines and served only 197 farms using an average of 37.5 KWII per month. Today the system has 567 miles of line and serves 1,220 customers using an average of 128 KWII.

Its eventual goal is approximately 1,000 miles of line with service to 2,400 customers. Officials said the sign-up for service is about 85-per cent complete, and funds have been allocated in the amount of \$1,322,000 for the completion of this work. Numerous system improvements are proposed, but these have been delayed because of material conditions which still are uncertain.

Original action by congress establishing REA was in 1934 and 1935. Agitation for rural electrification began in this area in 1935, and the first line was energized in 1939. But even today, after twenty years, 15 per cent of the farmers have not arranged for service to their farms, although progress is slow to those waiting.

In the past two years the district has shown an increase of more than 400 consumers. Officials pointed out that demands on the district have necessitated an increase in operating personnel. They said that construction of lines with district crews has made possible more rapid expansion because it has not been necessary to wait on contract construction delays. Although this procedure involves more personnel and equipment, they declared that it has resulted in considerably less cost for construction.

Need Clear Right-of-way

District personnel said one thing they must always keep in mind is the necessity of clear right-of-way which can be obtained only through the combined effort of all farmers in permitting tracts to be cut, thus preventing repeated trips to the same spot for trimming operations which are costly to both the district and the consumer.

The board of directors which established the project consisted of A. G. Sydow, president; Edward Grubik, vice president; Lyle Marutz, secretary; Albert Watson, treasurer; Lawrence Ring and J. G. Swigard, directors. This board still is serving the project, along with H. D. Addison, project attorney. R. D. Slagle has been manager the past two years.

Wayne Radio Repairman Overcomes His Handicap

A determination to succeed and a keen sense of humor have enabled Melvin Rothmiller of Wayne to overcome his handicap and to become an expert radio repairman. Mr. Rothmiller addressed Wayne Woman's club at the club room Friday on the subject, "What Do You Know About Blindness?"

Mr. Rothmiller, who was presented by Mrs. Don Wightman, lost his sight during an illness with smallpox and measles when he was six months old. He came to Wayne early last spring from Omaha where his mother and two sisters live. Mr. Rothmiller established a radio repair shop which is now housed in a small building across the street west of the college campus.

Mr. Rothmiller first explained to the women about Braille, the system of small dots punched in paper and used by blind persons in reading. From a piece of Braille, Mr. Rothmiller read a short history of Thanksgiving.

Braille is as natural to the blind as the pencil to the seeing person. Mr. Rothmiller stated. The young man said that he has tested himself on Braille and found that he could read as much as 175 words a minute. Braille writing is prepared by painting the dots with lacquer. Mr. Rothmiller has books of Braille instructions about radio repair.

The blind not only rely on Braille but they develop other abilities.

can fill a cup with coffee by feeling the heat travel up the side and stopping when one approaches the top. The young man measures with an inch-square ruler with inch, half-inch, quarter-inch and eighth-inch markings on each side of the four edges. The speaker explained that he threads a needle by placing the thread in a tiny wire and running the wire through the needle eye. He warned against placing objects on stairs for they are hazards for people who see as well as those who do not.

**Trains Sense of Hearing.**  
The blind develops his sense of hearing to a high degree. The army and navy taught the blind to get about by the use of echos. Buildings, trees and all objects echo. A blind person becomes sensitive to these. He cannot hear noises below his waist, however. One can follow another person easily. Mr. Rothmiller told that keeping track of the noises of a walking person is easy in a small city and he has been able to follow a single person as far as three blocks through city traffic. Walking fast enables one to follow best and most steadily.

A seeing eye dog is a great help to the blind and does much to make him independent. Mr. Rothmiller told that he is saving in the hope of being able to have a dog sometime. The blind can overcome their handicap and lead useful, happy lives. Mr. Rothmiller assured his listeners.

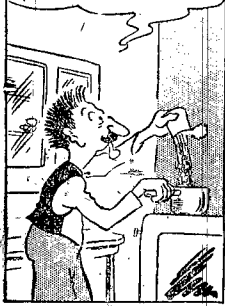

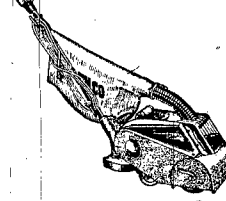

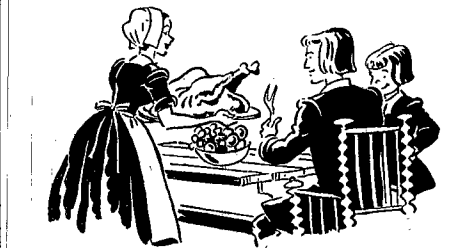

NO AGE LIMIT

The age limit on hiring or retaining helpers seems to have been largely removed. War demands opened the eyes of employers to outstanding merit in older workers. Editor Woodson offers this in the course of editorial comment in the Sioux City Journal: "Despite the bro-mide built up a few years ago by a book title insisting that Life Begins at 40, the job seeker who had attained that milestone, then came the war period, an acute manpower shortage, and employers began to discover that older workers might merit consideration. The attitude has been carried over into the post-war period, the national industrial conference board reports, after a recent survey of industrial employment. How much the age ban has been relaxed is illustrated by finding that only one in 10 industrial concerns now holds to a definite policy on a maximum age limit for hiring. A high percentage of personnel directors are setting up careful physical requirements for those seeking work, passing the attained age question as relatively unimportant."
