Eventually we won but only because our endmies were unable to follow up their initial advantage and we thus were given the time we needed to train and equip a powerful army, navy and air force.

The end of that conflict has prought an uneasy peake that many authorities believe may not be far away from another shooting war, with the United States and Russia as the major, opponents. Perhaps that war never will come, but if it does it will be swift and sure with instantaneous destruction of our major cities and industrial areas. There will be no opportunity to build a fighting force AFTER the next war starts.

Meanwhile, military experts constantly Meanwhile, military experts constantly remind us that we are little better prepared for defense today than we were at the time of Pearl Harbor, while litussia still is armed to the teeth and soon may also have atomic weapons. Six years ago the fighting slogan, "Remember Pearl Harbor," served to unify this nation for an alloutlwar effort. In the interest of preparedness for future possibilities our memories of what happened at Pearl Harbor need to be refreshed.
