Seek Voluntary Rationing Of Electricity In County

The power situation in the state is critical, according to R. D. McWha of North Platte, operating manager of the Nebraska public power system, who last Thursday appealed for voluntary rationing so as to make it possible to maintain service. Last Wednesday the power load reached within 1,000 kilowatts of the state's total capacity.

R. D. Slagle, manager of the Wayne county rural public power district, reports that this situation affects all rural and town users who get power from the state pool. Equipment of the Wayne county district is more than adequate to carry the load but the only shortage is in the state pool. Mr. Slagle explains.

The extra heavy use of electricity at the holiday time prompted the power organization to urge voluntary controls so that a shut-down may be avoided. Nebraskans are asked to turn off all lights possible, including Christmas decorations and store show windows, between 5 p. m. and 7:30 p. m., when the generating capacity bears the heaviest load.

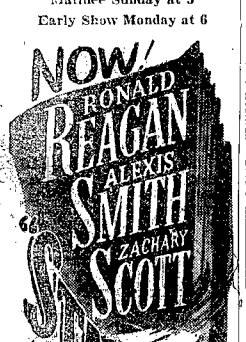

Citizenship Is Good Safeguard In Club Service

Guy R. Davis Sees Value for Future

Good citizenship as a future safeguard is the important contribution of 4-H work, stated Guy R. Davis of Lincoln, assistant state 4-H leader, in addressing Kiwanians and club leaders Monday.

Kiwanians and 4-H leaders are alike in that they are active doers, Mr. Davis stated. The 4-H members may not remember all that is told to them but they do remember what they do. This training is most worthwhile even though it takes much time and money.

The speaker paid tribute to the late Dr. Bessy of the university who, though he had an estate of only \$1,000, left one of the richest heritages in the state from a standpoint of service to others. He advanced 4-H work greatly.

Mr. Davis spoke of the "Greatest Person I've Ever Met" feature in the Reader's Digest and noted that all life histories reviewed have one thing in common. They have not built for themselves, but for others.

Future citizenship in years ahead depends on leadership of today. The nation had 1,700,000 in 4-H work last year and hopes to enlarge this to 3,000,000. "The more we reach, the more good citizens we will have."

Publicity about 4-H work is not enough. Parents must learn of the value of club work. Then Wayne county could have 400 instead of 200 in 4-H work.
