Socialism, Fear of Russia Seen as Threats in Sweden

Socialism in government and fear of Russia are real threats in Sweden, according to observation of Oscar Peterson, who arrived home December 3 after a three-month trip to his native land.

Mr. Peterson and Carl Samuelson left September 5 for their first trips back since they came to this country. Mr. Peterson 41 years ago and Mr. Samuelson 40 years ago. Mr. Peterson visited a sister, nephews and other relatives in the province of Malmo. Mr. Samuelson was with brothers and sisters at Bur Ros.

Mr. Peterson reports that Sweden is the best kept country of any he has visited. Each home is beautiful with flowers and immaculately clean. People are attractive and dress well.

Streets and roads are paved. Cars are not so numerous as in this country, and an American is somewhat confused by the fact that Swedes drive on the left side of the road. Trains are well built and are run by electricity.

Conditions seem to be good in Sweden. Everyone is busy and wages are high. People are brought in from Norway and Denmark to help in government projects and in farm work. Sugar beets and potatoes are the largest farm products and most of the work is done by hand. Corn does not grow well and small grain raised is used for livestock. Farmers have cattle and some hogs. The cattle are especially good dairy animals and many are imported from Switzerland and Holland.

All food is rationed but everyone seems to have enough. Some foods are imported. Cost of food is about double the prices here.

their own people and the world, a controlled economy is no guarantee against inflation. It will be to America's advantage to get this message across to the Russian people, who have little opportunity to learn anything other than what their own government chooses to tell them.

At one time farmers supposedly were easy marks for salesman of such articles as gold bricks and the Brooklyn bridge. But the other day an alert farmer was credited with having given federal agents the information which enabled them to smash a large counterfeiting ring. He was an observing farmer who became suspicious of one of the gang when the man showed little interest in either the price or weight of a turkey he was buying from the farmer. He noted down the license number of the car the counterfeiter was driving and gave that information, along with a phony bill he received in payment for the turkey, to the proper authorities who then proceeded to move in on the manufacturers of the funny money. This is an enlightened age, and rural people are as well informed as anyone.

Inflation in Russia

For many months Russian propagandists have pointed scornfully to the inflationary trend in America as an example of the inevitable decay and eventual collapse of the so-called capitalistic system of our democracy. Meanwhile, the Russians smugly told how smoothly their own system of controlled economy was working.

But it develops now that Russia is having a little trouble, too. While the Reds apparently are in no danger of an economic collapse, they have had to deflate the value of the Russian ruble. And this may be a bit difficult to explain to the Soviet citizenry, especially since the devaluation of the ruble gives our state department an effective weapon for informative broadcasts to Russia.

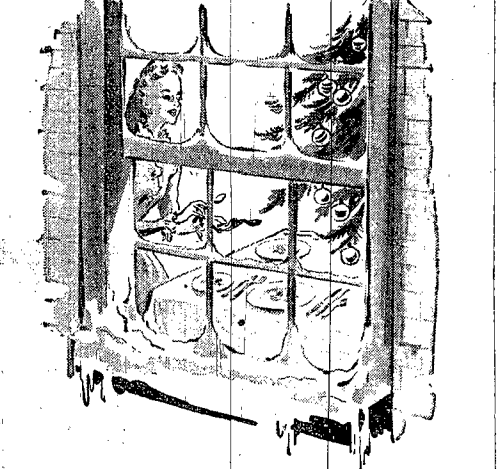

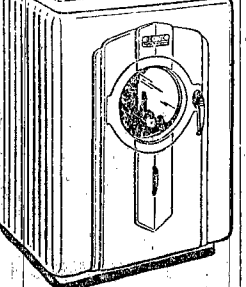
