Warn Farmers To Complete ACP Practices

AAA Deadline Is December 31

Wayne county farmers this week were warned they should not forget that all conservation practices under the 1947 agricultural conservation program must be completed by December 31.

Farmers who have completed practices and who have not reported them to the county agricultural conservation association office should do so at once, says Thomas P. Roberts, chairman of the county committee.

No Extra Help. Limited administrative funds will not allow for extra help to take care of a last-minute rush job in the county office, Roberts said.

"The only way we can get the job done of checking compliance and putting through applications for payments is for farmers to cooperate by getting us know promptly of the practices they have carried out," he stated.

Delay in reporting practices piles up a lot of work at the last minute that we will not be able to do when it should be done this year. This will cause a delay in sending through applications for payment and may mean several months delay in payments," Roberts said.

The chairman urges farmers to report conservation practices as soon as they are completed.

"Farmers who have not completed practices and who intend to do so," said the chairman, "should remember that December 31, 1947, is the cut-off date for completing conservation practices under the 1947 program."

Plan Reduction Of Gas Rates

Peoples Natural Gas Co. produced a Christmas surprise for Wayne residents this week with the announcement of a reduction in gas rates, effective with the January meter readings.

The company said it was able to effect the reduction because "the pipe line company supplying our requirements through the increased use of natural gas and the resultant improvements in load factor has reduced our costs."

A comparison of the old and new general rates per month follows:

Old Rate: 500 cu. ft. \$1.00 min. bill; 1000 cu. ft. 1.00 per m.c.f.; 1500 cu. ft. .80 per m.c.f.

New Rate: 600 cu. ft. \$1.00 min. bill; 1200 cu. ft. .80 per m.c.f.; 3000 cu. ft. .70 per m.c.f.

There will be no change in existing rates for quantities of gas consumed in excess of those listed above.

Visitor Reports Situation Is Encouraging in Canal Zone

(By Dorothy Huse Nyberg) The general situation in the Panama Canal zone is encouraging, according to Merrill Whitman, assistant general counsel, who with his wife, son, Merrill, Jr., and daughter, Lynn, are here spending the holidays with Mrs. Whitman's father, H. B. Craven.

Attorney Whitman is located at Balboa Heights in the administration office of the Panama canal, a branch of the U. S. government dealing in operation of affairs involving the canal and the federal strip across the country of Panama. He also serves as counsel for the Panama railroad which is owned by the United States and which operates a line across the isthmus and also the steamship line from the zone to New York.

Contracts and all other litigation are handled by the office.

Tenseness Lessens. Tenseness of the situation regarding the United States lease of air bases in Panama has been relieved, Whitman states. Bases were maintained in Panama during the war as a means of protection. The question of whether these leases should be renewed drew considerable opposition from nationalists in Panama and the nationalists were supported by communists of the country. Some rioting followed.

Recently Florencio Arosemena, a friend of the United States, was appointed new foreign minister in Panama after the old minister resigned in protest to conclusion of the agreement regarding the bases. The new minister, whose position is similar to the secretary of state in this country, dealt with the United States through the ambassador and the air base leases have been renewed for 10 years. Rent of these fields and the business of selling to the personnel at the bases comprise the largest revenue in Panama.

Prices Are High. Very little industry or agriculture is carried on in Panama. Making of liquor is probably the main

one. Bananas and oranges are plentiful and many are shipped. Only a small amount of corn is raised. Import duty makes prices high in Panama. Food and other things shipped in from the United States are about 50 per cent more than here.

A proposal to reconstruct the Panama canal from a system of locks to one at sea level has been a big issue in the zone recently. The zone governor, Mr. Whitman explains, was directed by congress to study the matter and a million and a half dollars were appropriated two years ago for this purpose.

The change to rebuild the canal would require the employment of about 200,000 people at first cost of about two billion dollars. Advantages of the change are that the canal would be more easily protected and that it would be large enough to accommodate the big, new carriers which cannot now go through the locks. The governor has just recommended to congress that the canal improvement be made, and congress is expected to take some action at its next session.

Plans to Resign. After his return to the canal zone, Whitman plans to resign the position he has held there for eight years and will come to the states to enter private law practice.

Donald Whitman is credit manager for Capital Record Co. in Los Angeles. Miss Margaret Whitman is teaching in Balboa Heights and plans to remain in the canal zone.

Aviation Cadets To Be Reinstated For Pilot Course

War-time-qualified aviation cadets whose hopes for pilot training with the air force were ended by the curtailment of the aviation cadet program in 1944-45 may be reinstated M/Sgt. F. E. Delaney, US Army Recruiting office, Norfolk, said today.

The United States air force estimates that there are approximately 35,000 young men who had qualified for aviation cadet pilot training during the war who were either awaiting assignment to or actually undergoing flying instruction when the program was curtailed in 1944 and 1945 because of the successful progress of the war, he said.

The acceleration of the aviation cadet pilot training program to a total of 3,000 aviation cadets during 1948 will make it possible for the air force to fulfill its obligation to many of these men who volunteered during the war. Men in this special category, M/Sgt. Delaney said, may be reinstated merely by passing the required physical examination, if they are unmarried, between 20 and 26 1/2 years old and have had two or more years of satisfactory college study.

Formerly qualified cadets interested in resuming pilot training should write direct to the headquarters, United States air force, attention: aviation cadet section, Washington, 25 D. C., for information and instructions.

Candidates for aviation cadet training must be between 20 and 26 1/2 years old, unmarried and have at least one-half of the credits leading to a degree at an accredited college or university, or be able to pass an examination measuring the equivalent, and be of excellent character, sound physique, and in good health. The ap-

proximately 35,000 men who had qualified during the war will not be required to take the USAF qualifying examination now given to all prospective candidates for the determination of aptitude, M/Sgt. Delaney said.

Under no circumstances is the fear justified that psychology or psychiatry can ever take the place of religion. In order to achieve a good life, we need to believe in ourselves and in human nature generally. Unpleasant things in life are so much more likely to be forgotten if we are not so concerned about them as we become so deafened by the roaring tempest of hate that we are apt to forget the stronger tide of loyalty and compassion."

Dr. Liebman reminds us that our own opinions can become so fixed at a point where we stop thinking. He declares, too, that stubborn insistence that we are infallibly right or wrong may cause hardening of intellectual arteries.

He says, "If man would recognize the inward yearning to give something of himself, he will therefore by explode the theories of cynics that man is totally selfish. If we would master fear and worry, we must accept help from others as well as our own abilities and limitations."

Born in Germany

In 1882 Mr. Brogren, his mother, a brother and a sister came to Elk-horn, Neb., where his father had made a home for his family, having come to America a year earlier.

The family moved to the Windside vicinity in 1891, where Mr. Brogren remained until February 7, 1899, when he was united in marriage to Lena Rushman. They established their own home and continued farming near Windside. Mr. Brogren also farmed near Dalton several years.

Plan Management To Conserve Food

In connection with the nationwide food conservation program the University of Nebraska college of agriculture proposes a statewide program of sound farm and home management practices to conserve livestock feed and human food. State County Agent Walter R. Harder and County Agent Mrs. Lorraine Dorr. Objectives of this program will be reached by the following methods: Less waste of livestock feed; greater use of roughages and by-products, and the efficient use of protein feed to conserve corn and wheat; less waste of human food; greater use of fruits and vegetables, particularly potatoes.

For less waste of livestock feed, recommendations are: Re-emphasize usual fall and winter campaigns to control rats, pests and parasites that destroy grain and reduce productivity of livestock; cull continually both livestock and poultry and market those that make poor use of feed; repair cribs

and bins, foundations and roofs to avoid 'waste' of stored grain and feed; screen out shelled corn, silks and husks when cribbing corn; keep poultry and other stock out of feed storage places; provide shelter, dry bedding and warm water for stock in severe weather; hog down low-yielding corn fields and turn stock in fields after corn pickers to clean up waste; use electric fence when practical; avoid preventable fires; place fire guards, check electric wiring and repair lightning rods.

Greater use of roughages can be made by the following: Eliminate, for the present emergency, the luxury finish put on fat stock in long feeding periods; change grain rations to make efficient use of crop processing, plant by-products, and high protein feeds; adjust grain feeding to quality of roughages; clean up field roughages this fall that will be damaged by weather and save well-cured and stored feed for later in the season; winter stock cattle on roughages and high protein concentrate; market hogs at 250 pounds or less.

For less waste of human food: Plan menus several days in advance and make good use of leftovers; cook foods, particularly meat, eggs, cheese and milk at low temperatures; serve smaller portions and offer second helpings; growing children's diets should be the last to be changed, limit afternoon and evening snacks and refreshments to beverages and fruit; store food at proper temperatures.

Greater use of fruits and vegetables can be made by: make use of 1947 bumper crop of fruits, and high protein concentrate; eat both orchard grown and wild; eat potatoes instead of bread and other cereal foods; stress home gardening and food preservation for 1948.

Wayne county agents urge Wayne county residents to cooperate where and when practical in the Nebraska program to conserve human food and livestock feeds in order to share in the nationwide food conservation program.

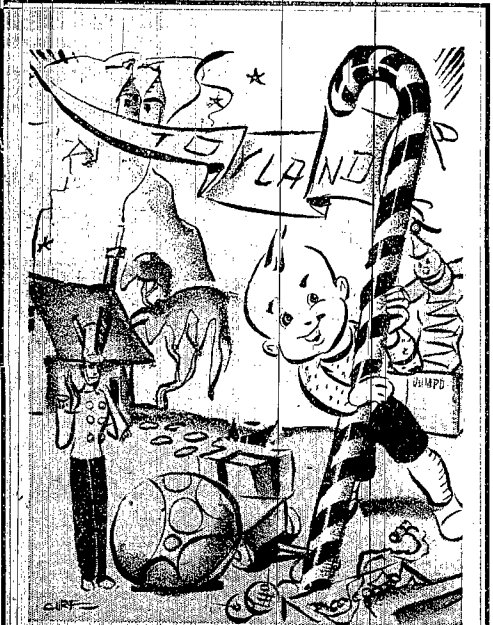

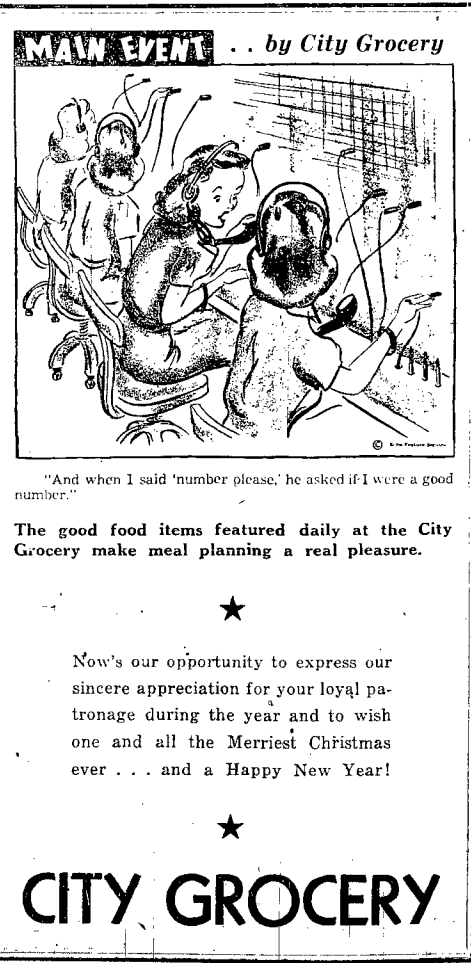

Employment Service Given Added Duties

"Plans for the placement of workers in agriculture and in certain related seasonal industries in this area are being prepared this month by the local office staff of the state employment service," Manager Walter Steffen said today.

The state extension service took over supervision of the farm labor program in May, 1943, in order to meet the farm labor shortage brought on by the war. The extension service is relinquishing administration of the farm labor program to the employment service January 1, 1948. Prior to 1943, the state employment service handled placement of farm laborers.

"We have consulted with farm group leaders and producers in

this area before moving ahead with our farm labor placement program," said Steffen. "Our plans for getting the necessary farm help in 1948 are being drawn in keeping with the experience of persons in the area who are directly affected by it," he added.

An extensive organization composed of voluntary farm labor placement representatives will be set up with a worker in all principal points in the Norfolk area. It is expected that this organization will be completed shortly after the first of the year, according to Steffen. The names of farm placement representatives in Wayne county will be announced later.

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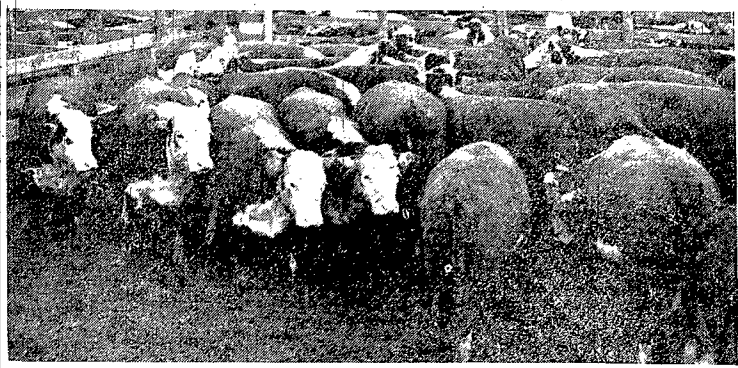
