In Old Nebraska

By James C. Olson Supt., State Historical Society

On the brisk winter evening of Jan. 9, 1856, the frontier dignity of the Nebraska Territorial legislature was ruffled, to say the least. Cause of the excitement was the appearance of Mrs. Amelia Bloomer, one of the period's foremost exponents of votes for women, and the lady after whom that billowing caponents of votes for women, and the lady after whom that billowing garment, now apparently extinct, was named.

After a long and successful carear in New York, Mrs. Bloomer had moved with her husband to Council Bluffs, la. There was some agitation in the territory of Nebraska in favor of granting votes. to women, and the members of the legislature decided that Mrs. Bloomer's residence just across the river provided an opportunity they could not afford to miss.

According to a newspaper account of the event, when the speaker arrived the tiny assembly hall was crowded to overflowing, "and by the gailantry of Gen. Larimer, a passage was made for her to the stand."

She arose amid the most enthusiastic cheers, and from all accounts held the enchanted attention of her audience for an hour and a half. One reporter, whose account from the Oneida, New York Chronotype, was published in one of the early volumes put out by the State Historical Society, stated: "We watched her closely, and saw that she jwas perfectly solf-possessed—not a nerve seemed to be moved by exchanged and the processing the state of the processing the state of the processing the state of the processing the processing the state of the processing the processing

As a final compliment, he added, "A man could not have beat it. Apparently, Mrs. Bloomer convinced a rather considerable number of the legislators that women should be trusted with the vote in Nebraska territory. General William Larimer (he who had so gallantly conducted the lady to the speaker's stand) introduced a bill granting the franchise.

Now, of course, it was one thing to listen to a speech, but entirely another to take so radical a step as the speech advocated, and opponents of the bill put off its consideration as long as they could. Finally, on the next to the last day of the session, it was brought up and passed by the House. The legislature adjourned, however, before the Senate got around to considering the question.

As a concluding act in the little drama, on the last day of the session, opponents of the bill created quite a stir by presenting General Larimer, its advocate, with a peticoat.


