Canvass Reaches Every Family

Every town and precinct is being canvassed and no home or business place will be missed intentionally. The committee said everyone who has been overlooked may send his contribution to T. P. Roberts, Friendship Train Treasurer, Wayne.

The Woman's club of Wayne is soliciting the residential area of Wayne, with Mrs. Frank Morgan, club president in charge. Herb Kohlmooren, Wayne community chairman, is canvassing the local business district.

Windsie Drive Progresses

The Windsie churches and Community center are soliciting a 144-student drive around the county. They will cover all of Hancock and Chapin precincts and parts of Brenna, Strahan, Garfield and Hoskins. J. E. Gornley is chairman of the Windsie drive.

Norman Clark is taking charge in Hancock and surrounding community. He reports that all precincts have been chosen. They will have their share of the drive completed by mid-week.

Large Increase in Bond Sales

Omaha-Wayne county residents last year invested nearly twice as much in U. S. savings bonds as they did in 1946, a report from the Nebraska U. S. savings bonds division reveals.

Total sales of series E, F and G bonds in 1947 totaled \$1,042,086, an increase of \$65,569 over 1946 when sales totaled \$966,517.

At the same time, 1947 redemptions totaled considerably less than in 1946. The comparative figures are redemptions totaling \$236,592 in 1946 as against only \$173,023 last year.

On a per capita basis, Wayne county residents bought \$105.47 worth of savings bonds last year. The figure for the previous year was \$63.50 per person.

May Surpass First Semester

Enrollment at Wayne State Teachers college reached the 635 mark at the end of the first week of the second semester.

Late registration of new students anticipated next week is expected to swell the total well above the record 649 enrolled during the first semester.

Between halves of the second polio benefit game Saturday night in Wayne, seven of the county's 12 polio victims were introduced. They are Ladonna Hroch and Janet Ulrich, both of Hoskins; Janel Easter, Gerald Baker, Richard Schaefer and Jovan Preston, all of Wayne; and Glen Connor of Wakefield. The Wayne high baton twirlers, under the direction of Hazel A. J. Atkins' direction, performed. The twirlers led the March of Dimes.

Admission to the game and the March of Dimes totaled \$340, bringing the proceeds of the drive to-date to \$3,000. One-half of this amount will be kept in the county and the other half will be sent to the national fund. The county must raise \$3,700 if its balance is to equal that of 1947 before that year's epidemic.

Mrs. Chris Tietgen, county chairman, urges schools and rural families to get their contributions to county headquarters as soon as possible.

Dixon County Prepares 1948 Farm Program

Ponca - Community committee members of Dixon county received the details of the 1948 agricultural conservation program at a meeting held recently in Ponca.

Under the program, farmers cooperating will share a budget of \$34,949 for performing conservation practices approved for their farm by the county AAA committee.

The practices on which payments will be made in 1948 in Dixon county include contouring of intertilled crops where lines are established in 1948, construction of gradient, level, or diversion terraces, establishing of sod waterways, building dams or erosion control or livestock water, eradication of birdweed on cropland, plowing of sweet clover, winter rye, alsike, and red clover as green manure crops, and the establishment of permanent cover by use of approved grasses on cropland to be retired to non-crop or pasture.

As in the past two years, written prior approval from the county committee is necessary to receive payment. Specifications and requirements set forth for each practice must be met. Under the 1948 program, total payment to any one person cannot exceed \$500.

Farmers are now being asked to line up the conserving practices which they wish to carry out on their farms in 1948. While sign-up meetings to assist farmers in completing their farm plans are being planned in the near future, the county office is now prepared to complete the farm plans and any one wishing to do so may call at the office in Ponca.

In order for any farmer to participate in the 1948 agricultural conservation program, the farm plan must be signed before April 1.

Change Schedule Of X-ray Unit

A slight modification has been announced in the schedule of the X-ray mobile unit, now operating in Wayne county in the search for tuberculosis cases. The unit will not be in operation Saturday morning, Feb. 14, as previously scheduled, but will be open again Monday, Feb. 16.

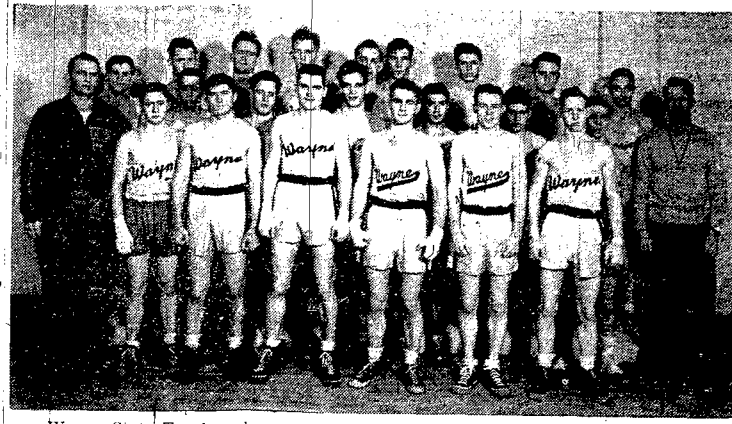

In Old Nebraska

One of the unsung heroes of the Nebraska frontier was the traveling Sunday school missionary.

In the early days it was impossible for each struggling pioneer community to support a church. To meet the need for religious work under such conditions the American Sunday School Union with headquarters in Philadelphia, commissioned missionaries to travel about the frontier organizing Sunday schools and making some provision for religious education in the various settlements.

In Nebraska one of the most active of these Sunday school missionaries was Chaplain C. H. Frady. A resident of Bazine Mills in Knox county when he began his missionary work, Chaplain Frady devoted his time to the new settlements in northwestern Nebraska and the Black Hills region of South Dakota.

This area was just about the nation's last stronghold for the wild and woolly westerner and Chaplain Frady's attempts to bring Sunday schools to the region taxed his resourcefulness, courage and faith to the utmost.

An experience at Chadron clearly illustrates the sort of problem he was up against. He arrived there a few days after the Chicago & Northwestern railroad had been built into the town. He was told that the day before some of the cowboys had welcomed a minister at a single file of cowboys on horseback coming on a high lode in his direction yelling at the top of their lungs and shooting bullets into the ground near his feet.

Chaplain Frady, however, was not perturbed and instead of running for cover he cheered the boys on, finding they could not intimidate him the boys gathered round and were told that the chaplain was holding a meeting at 10 o'clock and wanted them all there.

Sure enough, they all came. After preaching a sermon the chaplain's best object was to provide supplies for a Sunday school. He



turned to the cowboys with these words: "This morning you had your fun, then you passed the 'buck' to me. The game is still on, it is a dollar ante, every mother's son of you is expected to chip in."

And chip they did to the tune of \$50. The cowboys had had their fun but Chaplain Frady got his Sunday school.

Ice Cream and Beer
Last month in Moscow the government is to pay price schedule covering everything from

ice cream, beer and caviar to men's socks. By expressing the Russian and U. S. prices of similar items in average hours of factory labor, the house coordinator of information was able to make a simple comparison of the cost of living in the two countries.

The result is a thoroughly convincing argument in favor of the free enterprise system over communism, just in case anyone has any doubts.

For example, the Russian father must put in an eight hour day at the factory before he has earned enough kopecks to buy a quart of ice cream for his family. The American worker can buy it for 40 minutes work.

A quart of milk costs the Russian one hour and 18 minutes labor, but the average American works only 10 minutes for the same quart. The Russian housewife spends money equal to two hours and 10 minutes work for just one bar of laundry soap, but Mrs. American gets it for five minutes work and it's better soap. The Russian working woman would have to spend over two weeks' wages for one pair of shoes, but the American working girl buys hers for less than a day's work and they're better shoes.

Three hours of the Russian's working day would have to be spent if he wanted a cold bottle of beer on the way home from work. The U. S. laborer swears a little over six minutes for his and it's better beer. A pound of white flour costs the Muscovite an hour and 19 minutes of work, while the American could buy 10 pounds for the same amount of work and it's better flour.

Anybody want to go to Russia? Sewage disposal is a major problem in many Nebraska cities

and towns, and it is often costly to the taxpayer. The District of Columbia has not only found a highly satisfactory solution, but it's making some money out of it, too.

The city has converted sewage into usable gas in its sewage treatment plant at Blue Plains, D. C., and now plans to sell some of this gas to the naval research laboratory for a 2 1/2 year period. The district hopes to get from \$27,000 to \$54,000 from the sale.

Fort Randall Dam.
Michigan's Albert Engel, chairman of the House committee on appropriations for the army engineers, believes the Fort Randall dam can be completed by 1950.

At that time, the Columbus public power districts hopes to get an \$11,000,000 on the construction of a power line from the dam to Columbus.

 Newspapers have been advised that thousands of "begging" letters are being mailed to the United States. Perhaps some people in this community have received letters from some source, the origin of which may seem doubtful.

But—authorities find it practically impossible to investigate individual cases. It is probable that some of these are well organized mail campaigns that are a part of foreign black market operations.

The National Better Business Bureau has issued a warning concerning these begging letters, and appeals made direct for help. We therefore feel it best to advise Herald readers: It perhaps is best to make your donations through responsible foreign relief agencies only.
