Farm Production Last Year Was At Highest Peak

Conservation practices, better land use, and increased soil fertility were important factors in boosting farm production to new records during the war and post-war periods, says T. Thomas P. Roberts, chairman of the Wayne agricultural conservation committee.
Improved farm machinery and new crops and varieties, as well as good weather, were others. The increased wartime production was not obtained by plowing up an additional 30 million acres for crops, as during the first world war. Total planted acreage of principal crops showed only a moderate increase during the recent war years.
It's generally agreed that spread-up agricultural production with a great increase in total acreage was possible only because of the improved and fertility reserves built up in the period between the two world wars, Roberts said.
Since 1936, says the chairman, farmers all over the nation have cooperated in preventing soil erosion and in building up the soil through an agricultural conservation program. Such practices as contouring and strip cropping have lessened damage from water erosion. Seeding of green manure and winter cover crops, besides protecting against crop failure through increased crop yields through organic matter returned to the soil.
Both total farm and total food production rose tremendously because of higher yields, with the result that farm output in 1945 from a planted acreage of 358 million was about 36 per cent more than previous total food production rose to 40 per cent above.
Roberts warned that farmers who intend to participate in the 1946 farm program must complete their sign-up by March 31.

Wayne State's Wildcats handed the Peru State Bobcats a blank record for the 1948 season by walloping the conference champions, 45 to 41, in the finale at Peru last Friday.

Wayne led all the way and was never in serious trouble to notch win number 12 in Nebraska College conference play and second place in the league.

The Wildcats defeated every other team in the conference at least once during the year; no other team boasts such a record. In January, Wayne topped Peru, 53 to 36.

Wayne took charge with four remaining minutes in the first half as Jim Strahan began to hit. From a 19-19 tie, he carried the Wildcats to a 27-23 half-time edge.

Wayne extended its margin through a slow third period although Guard Vernon Harder went out on fouls.

With six minutes remaining, Wayne led, 41-29. Wayne's Jack Baumert was banished with five fouls and Sub Guard Bill Vossen sparked a Peru bid that narrowed the count to 44-41.

The Wildcats' Blackbird made good a free shot with three minutes remaining and Wayne stalled successfully.

Extension Notes

By Don Warner, County Agent

Oats are an important crop in Wayne county. As the time for seeding oats approaches, there are still some questions remaining unanswered. First as to varieties:

There is a new extension circular available at the county extension office. "What Oats Shall I Grow" is the title and the number is EC 177. E.C. 177 contains information relative to the results obtained at the out-state testing plots on the Ed Galtz farm south of Wayne. In three-year tests Clinton oats have averaged 71.5 bu. Cedar 66.3 bu. and Marion 64.5 bu. Clinton oats are reported to be resistant to Victoria blight, crown rust (except race 45 which is not common in Nebraska), stem rust and smut. Cedar is susceptible to Victoria blight, resistant to crown rust, susceptible to race 8 and 10 of stem rust, and resistant to smut. Marion is resistant to Victoria blight, moderately resistant to crown rust and stem rust, and resistant to smut. Clinton, Marion, Cedar and Nemaha are the varieties recommended for this area.

Nemaha is a new variety from the cross Victoria Richard X Morola Bond. Seed is being released.

to certified growers in Nebraska and Kansas this spring and should be generally available in 1949. Nemaha is similar to Clinton in many respects; however, it ripens two to five days earlier. It is resistant to Victoria (helminthosporium) blight and to the races of smut, crown rust and stem rust commonly found in Nebraska. Generally, the grain is light red in color but may have a pinkish-ivory or yellow cast. The straw is heavy and resists lodging. In height at Lincoln, Nemaha averaged 33 inches tall as compared to 34 inches for Clinton and 30 inches for Cedar. In 10 tests Nemaha compared favorably with Clinton in yield. Certified growers in Wayne county who have been allocated Nemaha oats are: Albert Watson and Son, Wayne; Willard Maas, Hoskins; E. P. Cawwe, Wayne; Lloyd Morris, Carroll; Ernest Strate, Jr., Hoskins; Elhardt Forstahl, Wayne; David Rees, Carroll; Gilmore J. Saha, Carroll; Emil Gutzman, Hoskins.

Running Out We hear many comments from time to time in the county extension office that this oats or that oats has "run out." Oat varieties do not run out. Our plant breeding are constantly at work developing new varieties, but not because the old one has "run out." Oats are self-pollinated. All of the fertilization of the seed takes place within the logue in which the oat kernel is set. What happens to oat varieties is that when a new variety is introduced it is resistant to all the known diseases in the area. As the variety is grown, new diseases, or new races of the old disease appear and attack the new oat variety.

Beaver Oats Every year it seems that Nebraska farmers, as well as grain processors, must be plagued by someone who brings in Canadian oats or some other poorly adapted seed grain for planting on our farm. This year it is Beaver oats. Beaver is a Canadian variety. It matures several days later than Clinton, grows taller and is susceptible to rusts and smuts. Beaver is not recommended for this area. Other northern varieties that do not do well here are Legacy, Vanguard, Ajax, Erban and Carter.

Seed Treatments All oats seeded this spring should be treated with new improved Ceresan or Ceresan M, at the rate of one-half ounce per bushel. There are some other mercury compounds on the market that may be effective, but some are definitely harmful. Before using some of these newer seed treatments, consult your agricultural agent. Treating seed oats with Ceresan will not eliminate Victoria blight from your crop. Seed treating will lower the incidence of blight by a large per cent, depending upon the thoroughness of mixing, rate of application of the chemical, etc. The recommendations of the college of agriculture experiment station are: (1) Plant certified seed resistant to Victoria blight; (2) treat all seed oats with a recognized effective chemical.



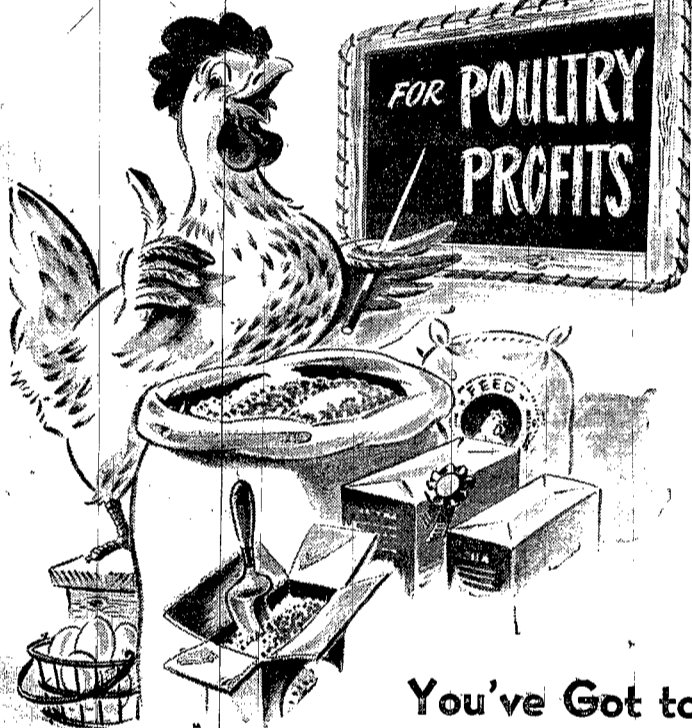

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Russia on the March

The days of Hitler are returning to Europe, with Joseph Stalin, Russia's powerful leader, assuming the role once played by the Nazi dictator. This time the Communists are on the march, but whether they are Communists or Nazis, the goals seem to be identical—the gobbling up of smaller nations unable to defend themselves against aggressors.

Czechoslovakia, once grabbed by Hitler, then "liberated" in World War II, last week came under the complete domination of Russia. The rules being laid down by Czechoslovakia's new Communist premier are strikingly similar to the regulations imposed by the Nazis whenever they complete the annexation of a neighboring state. Finland seems destined to be next on Russia's list of intended victims.

Hitler's annexation of Czechoslovakia resulted in the Munich pact and a policy of appeasement which did nothing to deter the Nazi dictator's appetite for expansion. Another Munich certainly won't help, and nothing is being done in a military way to halt Russia. No nation is in a position to do much, although British newspapers early this week suggested that the United States warn Russia that continued aggression will bring a rain of atom bombs on Russian soil.

We hope the use of the atom bomb never again will be necessary, but the facts seem clear—Russia is building up to another war, and it may come sooner than anyone thinks. We are told repeatedly that

Russia doesn't want another war now. Neither did Hitler when he began his annexation policies, and he gambled that no one would declare war upon him. He won his gamble to the extent that he gained time to build up his armies to the point where he was ready for war.

Russia appears to be making the same gamble.

Many Nebraskans Agree

Gov. Val Peterson gave voice Monday to the thoughts of many Nebraskans when he said that Atty. Gen. Walter Johnson "should resign." Although Johnson is serving in Washington, D.C., in a private capacity as a paid lobbyist, he retains his office as Nebraska's attorney general and has refused to turn in his resignation. We are old fashioned enough to believe that a public official cannot fulfill the duties of his office unless he spends his time working in that office. As if that were not enough, there also is some reason to suspect that Johnson's activities in Washington are not exactly in the best interests of the state of Nebraska.

Our Shifting Population

A census bureau survey of the nation shows there is an increasing trend from the farm to the cities and towns. This means that annually there are hundreds of thousands on the move from rural to urban districts. According to the bureau's survey two and one-half million families left the farming areas in the seven-year period since 1940.

A part of that movement easily is understood. That seven-year period included the war years when war production called for millions of workers in industry. High wages were paid. Jobs were to be had in cities and towns. Young men and young women, too, moved cityward in droves. It may be recalled that at that time farm production needed for winning the war was threatened by lack of labor required.

What is causing the farm population to continue its movement toward the cities and towns was not explained by the census bureau. It merely gave the facts of the survey. As of April last only 17 per cent of the nation's households were on farms. In 1940 the percentage of rural homesteads was put at 20. In 1930 22 per cent of the households were on farms. Yet farm prices today are higher than in a quarter of a century. Prosperity has come to the farmers. Yet the younger generation is on the move toward the congested centers. It will be interesting to know what motivates them when the answer to that question is found.

Fortnight Presidential Candidate Says: Present Parity Support Can Bring Back the Bureaucrats.

Bob Taft doesn't talk through his hat. He wears it on a very level head that is chockfull of foresight, facts and courage.

Here is a Taft statement on farm policy that was transcribed for twelve Nebraska radio stations, while the candidate was in Omaha for the Lincoln Day weekend. If you haven't heard it, this is it:

"When OPA was enacted and the Government given power to fix farm prices, the law provided an exchange that the Government would support farm prices at 90% of parity for a period of two years after the end of the war.

"This guarantee does not expire until the end of 1948. In my opinion it imposes a moral and legal obligation on the Government and it must be fulfilled.

"When we consider a long-term agricultural program, however, for 1949 and thereafter, we have an entirely new question. The Government has never before undertaken to support farm prices at any specific percentage of parity. The danger is that if the guarantee is too high, the Government

will be forced to buy large quantities of the commodities until final prices are established. It will have to protect itself against excessive production by production control.

"No one wants such production control. That is the reason that all impartial studies, including those made by the National Grange and Aiken Sub-Committee reached the conclusion that if there is to be a Government support price program it should be at substantially less than 90%. I was suggesting nothing new in my program. We don't want the Government to be limiting production and telling every farmer how many acres he can plant, what commodities he can raise, and how he must run his farm."
