Russia on the March

Russia on the March The days of Hitler are returning to Europe, with Joseph Stalin, Russia's pow-erful leader, assuming the role once played by the Nazi dictator. This time the Com-munists are on the march, but whether they are Communists or Nazis, the goals seem to be identical—the gobbling up of saller nations unable to defend them-selves against aggressors. Czechoslovakia, once grabbed by Hit-ler, then "liberated" in World War II, last week came under the complete domina-tion of Russia. The rules being laid down by Czechoslovakia's new Communist pre-mier are sträkingly similar to the regula-tions imposed by the Nazis whenever they completde the annexation of a neighboring state. Finland seems destined to be rust on Russia's list of intended victims. Russia already has control over all the Balkan na-tions, except Turkey and Greece and now dominates a far larger area with a much greater population than Hitler ever did. Hitler's annexation of Czechoslovakia resulted in the Munich pact and a policy of appeasement which did nothing to deter the Nazi dictator's appetite for expansion. Another Munich certainly won't help, and nothing is being done in a military way to hak Russia. No mation is in a position ot of much, although British newspapers early this week suggested that the United States warn Russia that continued aggres-sion will bring a rain of alom bombs on Russian-rooil. *We* hope the use of the atom bomb

Russian soil. We hope the use of the atom bomb never again will be necessary, but the facts seem clear—Russia is building up to another war, and it may come sooner than anyone thinks. We are told repeatedly that

He won his gamble to the extent, that he gained time to build up his armies to the point where he was ready for war. Russia appears to be making the same gamble.

Many Nebraskans Agree

Many Nebraskans Agree Gov. Val Peterson gave voice Mon-day to the thoughts of many Nebraskans when he said that Atty. Gen. Walter John-son "should resign." Although Johnson is serving in Washington, D.C., in a private capacity as a paid lobbyist, he retains his office as Nebraska's attorney general and has refused to turn in his resignation. We are old fashioned enough to believe that a public official cannot fulfill the duties of his office unless he spends his time working in that office. As if that were not enough, there also is some reason to sus-pect that Johnson's activities in Washing-ton are not exactly in the best interests of the state of Nebraska.

Our Shifting Population

(Sioux City Journal) A census bureau survey of the nation shows there is an increasing trend from the farm to the cities and towns. This means that annually there are hundreds of thousands on the move from rural to urban districts. According to the bureau's survey two and one-half million families left the farming areas in the seven-year period since 1940. A part of that movement easily is

period since 1940. A part of that movement easily is understool. That seven-year period in-cluded the war years when war produc-tion called for millions of workers in indus-try. High wages were paid. Jobs were to be had in cities and towns. Young men and young women, too, moved cityward in droves. It may be recalled that at that time farm production needed for winning the war was threatened by lack of labor re-quired.

farm production needed for winning the war was threatened by lack of labor re-quired. What is causing the farm population to continue its movement toward the cities and towns was not explained by the census bureau. It merely gave the facts of the survey. As of April last only 17 per cent of the nation's households were on farms. In 1940 the percentage of rural homesteads was put at 20. In 1930 22 per cent of the households were on farms. Yet farm prices today are higher than in a quarter of a century. Prosperity has come to the farm-ers. Yet the younger generation is on the move toward the congested centers. It will be interesting to know what motivates them when the answer to that question is found.
