It would be well for negublican lead-ers in congress to consider this fact: No matter what the cost of the European re-covery program, it would be peanuts in comparison with the cost, in lives and moving closer day by day because we are doing nothing to prevent it.

The Law Places Selection of

Beer Retailers in YOUR Hands

With relicensing time here, let's review what the law says about selection of beer retailers. Nebraska's liquor control law forbids the brewers or wholesalers from having any finan-cial interest in the selection of licensees. It places the selection in the hands of public licensing ands of public licensing officials

These officials have the right to examine, under oath, any applicant for a retail-license or renewal. The board may authorize its agent or attorney to act in obtaining any desired information.

Further, the law provides that Further, the law provides that the local governing body must consider every signed edim-plaint from any citizen of a violation of the law or any ph-jectionable conduct on the part of an applicant. A new license may be denied or a renewal re-fused if there is cause.



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


