Overloading Democracy In his luncheon address here last Fri-day, Gov. Val Peterson put the finger on a governmental weakness when he said that we Americans sometimes try to make democracy do too much. Pointing to our state government as an example, he said we overload our democratic processes by insisting that all public officers be elected by popular vote, a system that doesn't al-ways put qualified men in the offices to which they are elected. The governor said it might be better to place the full responsibility in the hands of only a very few top officials, elected by the vote of the people, with these high ranking officials to be given the task of appointing qualified persons to other gov-enmental offices. He pointed out that this is the system used in our federal govern-ment, where the voters actually elect only the president, senators and congressmen. The rest of our national officials will exercise conscientious judgment in appointing less-r, but equally important, officials, it should indeed result in a better and more efficient government. And it would not in any way interfere with our priceless demo-oratic system, because the officials who hold the responsibility of selecting other administrative officers are still chosen by the vote of the people.
