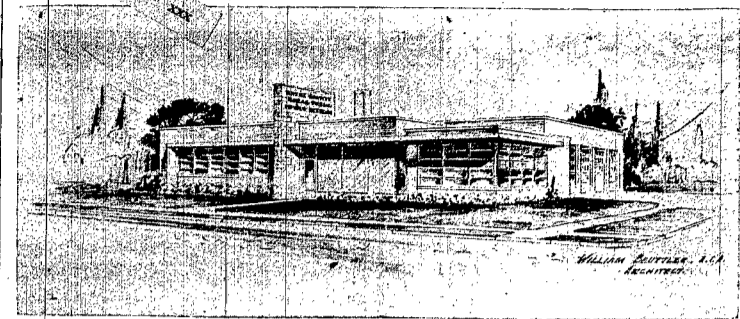

Extension Notes

Housing Workshop

Last Friday three Wayne county farmers and their wives took time off from planting oats to attend a housing workshop at the county agent's office. They were Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Dranselka of Wayne, Mr. and Mrs. Arnold Wittler of Hoskins and Mr. and Mrs. Fred Eckert of Carroll.

The group first discussed the general principles of house planning and structural features governing possible changes. The last of the day was spent working on individual plans with interruptions for the discussion of common problems. Some of these were finding space for bathrooms, remodeling kitchens, planning sewage disposal units and changing doors and windows for better use of wall space and improved traffic lanes.

Remodeling

Several bulletins have been published within the last two years to help farm families plan remodeling. Some of these are: Your Farm House—How to Plan Remodeling, When You Build or Remodel Your

Farm House, Plan Before You Build, Farm Housing Bathrooms, and Farm Sewage Disposal.

These are available at your county agent's office. The county agent may be able to help you with some of your remodeling plans.

Rispa Douglas and Arnold Olson, extension housing specialists, emphasized the importance of considering plans for the entire house even if you were planning to remodel only one room, as the kitchen, at this time. Economical remodeling requires a complete plan before you start and should include the improvements you want to make now and over a period of years. Some of the important features lacking in old houses and to be planned for are: enough closets and other storage space, bathroom, water supply and plumbing, electric service, improved heating and comfortable features, proper surfaces and finishes, and desirable sizes and shapes of rooms.

The question was asked if it would pay to remodel or to build new. You should probably remodel if the foundation is good, the framework is well braced, if the space can be easily rearranged, and if the location is good. You probably should not remodel if the foundation is poor, the framing is

weak, if the house is around 75 years old and if the ceilings are excessively high. The important point to remember in remodeling or building is to plan before you build so it is easier to correct mistakes and to make better room arrangements on paper than to make these same changes on the job.

Overloading Democracy

In his luncheon address here last Friday, Gov. Val Peterson put the finger on a governmental weakness when he said that we Americans sometimes try to make democracy do too much.

The governor said it might be better to place the full responsibility in the hands of only a very few top officials, elected by the vote of the people, with these high ranking officials to be given the task of appointing qualified persons to other governmental offices.

If top ranking officials will exercise conscientious judgment in appointing lesser, but equally important, officials, it should indeed result in a better and more efficient government.

Is It Here to Stay?
