Although rains have not been abundant this spring, enough moisture has fallen in the last couple of weeks to make lawns, trees, gardens and farm crops flourish in northeastern Nebraska. This is something that has been going on over the world for centuries and therefore is not an unexpected odcurrence, but nonetheless the yearly coming of spring in all its luxuriant glory is like the circus—it's always worth seeing.

As usual, we were enthralled with the sudden bursting forth of so much plant life. We are speaking of insect life—flies, mosquitoes and myriad other bugs we'd never attempt to identify.

Year after year we allow ourselves to be bitten and bothered by insect pests which could be exterminated with little effort and small expense, providing an extermination program is started early in the season—before the insects have a chance to breed. Through the judicious use of DDT, numerous midwestern communities were virtually fly-free the last couple of summers—and intend to be that way again this year. Community programs for the prevention of flies and other insects are no longer experimental—they have proved remarkably successful nearly everywhere they've been tried.






