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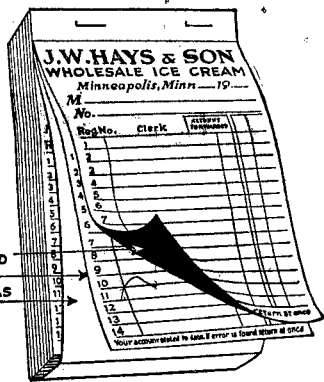

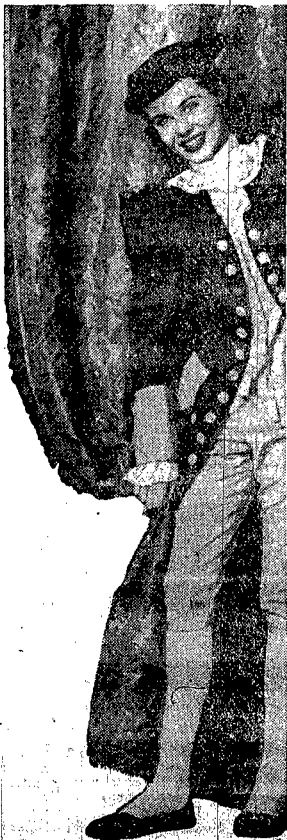

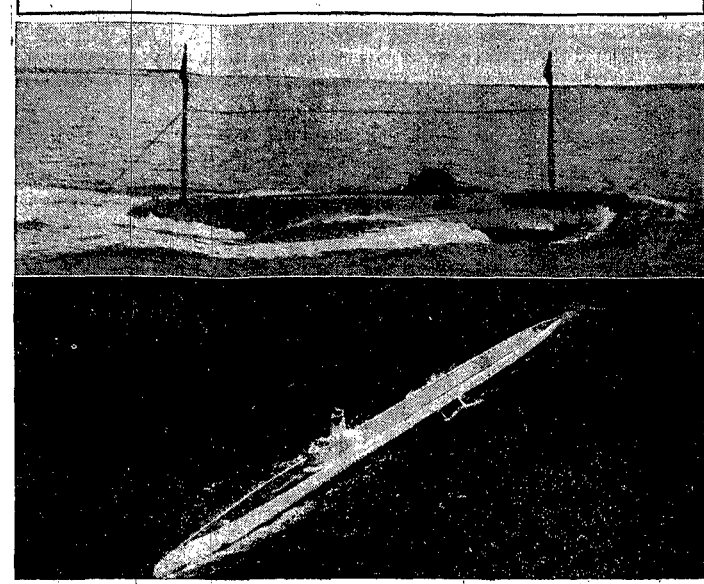

Congress As Seen By KARL STEFAN

Butter vs. Oleo The well-financed oleomargarine lobby capped a long, intensive propaganda campaign last week by drawing a 269-106 house vote favoring repeal of federal taxes on colored oleo.

While House members cleared their desks of mountains of papers, pamphlets and letters from moneyed margarine, the paper barrage continued to fall on the Senate, which will act next on the bill.

Its passage by the House was due principally to the southern members. Heeding the powerful voice of the soybean and cotton interests, they formed solidly behind the repeal and were able to lure to the oleo fold a sufficient number of members from metropolitan areas who thought they were doing the consumer a service.

What many failed to realize is that removal of the tax on imitation butter would do little to lower its price to the consumer. Many dairymen expect margarine production to under sell butter only by a margin large enough to assure volume sales.

Daيرymen have no objection to the sale of tax-free white oleo, but logically protest when the product is colored to capitalize on the reputation built up over several hundred years by the makers of butter.

Oleo's touching concern for the "poor consumer" is senseless if you remember that the big tax is only on the colored product. White oleo, which can be easily and quickly colored at home, is not now and never has been subjected to the tax born by factory-colored oleo.

Oleo's alligator tears and loud wails of grief over the consumer only mask its real purpose—to boost sales by artificially giving to its product what nature has given to butter.

Domestic Slow Down With Uncle Sam planning to pour his income into the air forces, foreign relief and a military man-

power training program, other domestic programs will be slowed down. The cost of preparedness is given as the reason for postponement of proposed domestic expenditures for education, housing, public works planning and water pollution control.

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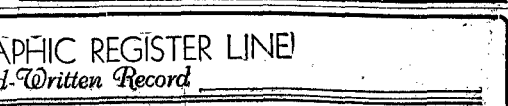

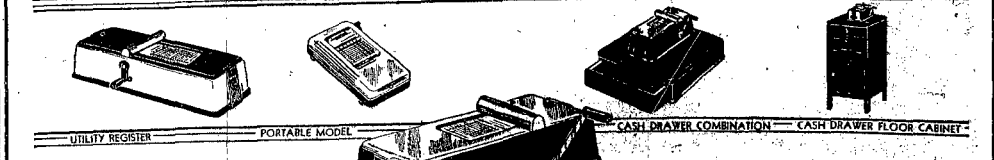

THERE HAD TO BE A FIRST TIME



Advances in American naval ships and equipment have been marked throughout the century and a half of the Navy Department's history by important milestones of progress. One of these was the first flight from the deck of a ship, made in 1910 by Lt. Eugene Ely, when he took off from a miniature flight deck on the foredeck of the USS Birmingham (upper). Three years later naval aviation had its actual start when Admiral George Dewey signed the report of the General Board, which recommended the establishment of a Naval air arm. Today aviation is one of the elements in the three-pronged American Navy, flying as "Navy Air" can be symbolized in such scenes as the lower photo in which an F-3 Fury jet-propelled Navy fighter, makes a landing aboard the USS Boxer while the ship cruises off the California coast. 
