





The Tension Increases

Everyone who keeps himself informed on current affairs is living under considerable tension. The international situation is enough to make anyone jumpy, and likely will continue to do so for a long time in the future. As if there weren't enough, the tension is being increased almost daily by such lamentable internal difficulties as labor strikes—both current and threatened.

The two most serious strikes now in progress—railroad and packing house workers—will not be solved by any action taken so far. Even though the government has assumed the burden of operating the railroads, the strike itself has not been settled. According to reports, many packing house workers want to return to their jobs, but dare not because they fear harm to themselves, their families and their homes. It has been proposed that the National Guard be called out to preserve order... to protect workers who want to work... but this, again, won't settle the strike.

The differences between management and labor can be worked out only by these two factions themselves.

The seemingly never ending succession of labor-management troubles is becoming intolerable to the people, and dangerous to the hation's health and economic welfare. If this strike situation continues it can lead only to economic difficulties from which it may take years to recover. Drastic legislation (which may come) is not the answer; it calls for understanding of the overall national picture, plus less, selfishness, and less stubbornness on the part of all factions involved.
