

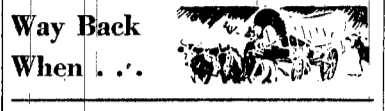

As our nation grows larger our government tends to grow more complicated. And in so doing it makes life more complicated for the people by continually adding new controls and regulations.

It should be remembered that when government influence is extended it usually is because some segment of the population or powerful pressure group has put the heat on congress to enact legislation intended to benefit that particular group. Sometimes these acts take the form of putting the government into business in competition with businesses already existing under the free enterprise system which helped make our nation the greatest in the world. And the government has shown itself virtually incapable of operating a business on a sound financial basis.

As the late great inventor, Thomas A. Edison, once said: "There is far more danger from a public monopoly than there is in a private monopoly, for when the government goes into business it can always shift its losses to the taxpayer. The government never really goes into business, for it never makes ends meet, and that is the first requisite of business. It just mixes a little business with a lot of politics and no one ever gets a chance to find out what is actually going on."

Senator Harry Byrd says the government payroll totals two million persons, in comparison with one million before the war. Further, he says the government is adding 500 employees to that staggering payroll every day. These figures should give any taxpayer some idea of "where the money goes," but they offer him no comfort for the failure of politicians to keep their promises to make substantial reductions in the number of government employees.

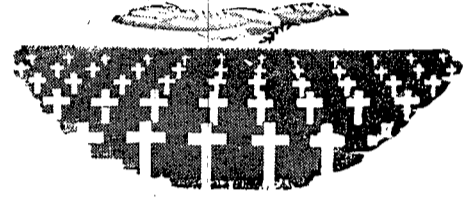

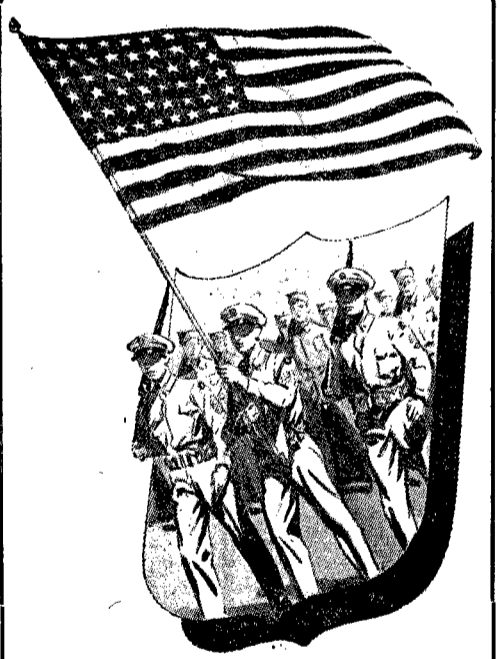

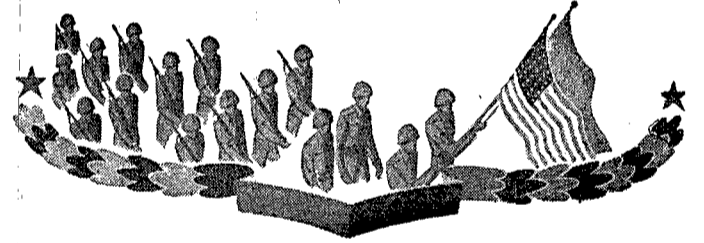
