

Adequate parking space always is a problem in a city as busy as Wayne, and it will become an even more serious problem during the summer months, especially on Saturdays. We know of no way to eliminate the problem, but it could be alleviated to a certain extent if less space were wasted by improper parking.

The familiar yellow parking stripes have been pretty well worn away, making it difficult for motorists to know exactly where they should park. Repainting of these stripes now, plus vigilance on the part of motorists to make sure their cars are between the marks, would relp the situation.

Sometimes these acts take the form of putting the government into businessis competition with businesses already existing under the free enterprise system which helped make our nation the greatest in the world. And the government has shown itself virtually incapable of operating a business on a sound financial basis.

As the late great inventor, Thomas A. Edison, once said: "There is far more danger from a public monopoly than there is in a private monopoly, for when the government goes into business, for it never makes ends meet, and that is the first requisite of business. It just mixes a little business with a lot of politics and no one ever gets a chance to actually going on."

Senator Harry Byrd says the government payroll totals two million persons, in comparison with one million before the war. Further, he says the government is adding 500 employees to that staggering payroll every day. These figures should give any taxpayer some idea of "where the money goes," but they offer him no comfort for the failure of politicians to keep their promises to make substantial reductions in the number of government employees.
