Faced with the proposal that the Voice of America program be discontinued, one state department official pleaded that it must continue. According to a story in the daily press, he said the state department is receiving appeals from behind the iron curtain "from people who hope the spirit of America will some day lift the iron curtain."

Commenting on the presidential possibilities of Senator Arthur Vandenberg and General Dwight Eisenhower, both of whom have said they do not want the nomination for president (but still haven't quite closed the door), the Sioux City Journal says:

"As matters stand now there is confusion in the minds of both republicans and democrats. Republicans who want Senator Vandenberg nominated really do not know whether he would accept if drafted. Democrats who continue to talk about drafting the general are in the dark as to what his statements really mean. Both ought to be sufficiently specific for the country to know where they stand today and will stand when the major party conventions are held."

The Journal has scored a point. The members of the two major political parties honestly would like to know exactly where these two proposed candidates stand.

Although there are several good republican candidates, they appear to possess such nearly equal strength that the GOP convention may reach a deadlock. In that event, the republicans would need a strong and popular compromise candidate—a man such as Senator Vandenberg.

The democrats have a different problem. So far, they have only one candidate, and according to public opinion polls he is neither strong nor popular. Leading democrats recognize the seriousness of the situation; they are searching frantically for a strong man to replace the incumbent president at the head of their ticket in the election next fall. Many of them would be overioyed if they knew that Eisenhower (he has said he doesn't want the nomination and, ALSO, he hasn't stated his polities) would accept the nomination.

In view of the caginess of Vandenberg and Eisenhower about making either a will or WONT statement, it's our guess that they would run if nominated. And what a race it would be if the two were pitted against each other.
