# Navy Plans Issuance Of Campaign Medals

Omaha World War II area campaign medals will be presented to ex-navy men and women it was announced today by Lt. Cdr. Tom H. Wells, USN, the navy's recruiting officer in old Fort Omaha. These medals include those covering service to the American, European-African-Middle Eastern, and Asiatic-Pacific areas during World War II. Commander Wells said that the navy recruiting stations in the five-state Omaha area will present the medals to eligible navy veterans upon personal application, or will issue medals in bulk to an authorized agent of a veterans post for group presentation to eligible members. He added that the navy will not be able to issue medals to veterans other than those who are ex-navy and that all posthumous awards will be made by the navy department upon application of the next of kin.

# Norfolk VA Office Closed: Said to Be No Longer Needed

Lincoln The veterans administration office in Norfolk has closed, effective May 29, Ashley Westmoreland, Lincoln regional office manager, announced. The Norfolk office, he said, was one of 16 field offices established in Nebraska to handle inquiries by veterans, following the peak period of armed forces demobilization. During the past year, there has been a gradual and continued reduction in the volume of work in field contact offices. The closing of the office at Norfolk is consistent with the policy of the VA in closing offices when they are no longer required or justified, Westmoreland added.

Itinerant service by traveling representatives will be continued throughout the state in cooperation with county service officers, and community and service organizations. This plan will eliminate duplication of effort without curtailing essential service to veterans, their dependents and beneficiaries, Westmoreland said.
