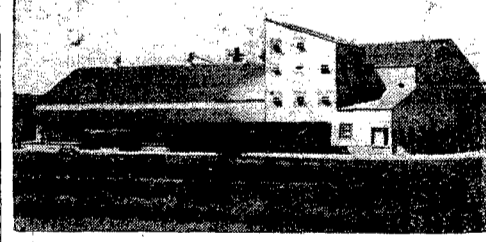

Wayne Being Considered for Aircraft Plant

Tour of East by Nebraskans Gets Attention

Wayne is one of three Nebraska cities being considered by the aircraft industry as sites for the establishment of parts manufacturing plants.

It was learned this week that the return of the Nebraska aircraft caravan from its two-week tour of eastern states, Wayne was selected by John H. Chamber of Commerce secretary.

Of 23 cars and 68 Nebraskans, the caravan led 3600 miles in telling the aircraft industry the story of free enterprise industrial opportunities. Reports to the caravan exceeded all expectations, it is reported.

Advantages of the aircraft industry as a direct result of this tour, plane manufacturers have received detailed information about facilities in Wayne, Fremont and Columbus.

With industrialists, a million pieces of literature about Nebraska products were distributed throughout the tour. Research groups produced tangible results and a promise of additional developments, said.

A permanent hall of science industry in New York, connected with the work of the caravan, the Nebraska state exhibit in Philadelphia the latter part of this month. This is the first time since establishment of the institution that any state has had an exhibit which has been arranged in advance.

Midwest Locations
A group found that numerous industries, particularly in air-impliments and chemurgic tries, are seeking locations in midwest. These industrialists expressed great interest in Cornland and its "new frontier" points.

Points of personal interest to many members included the national convention in Philadelphia where Nebraska presented largest state delegation, a two-top in New York and theington banquet with Nebraska congressman. State and local officials escorted the caravan through most of the trip.
