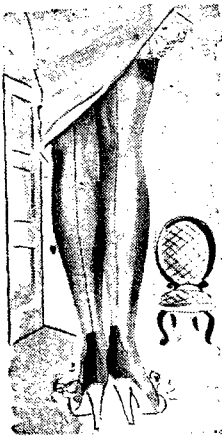

You Have to Ask for Them.

Aroused by the lamentable condition of northeastern Nebraska roads, representatives of six counties (Wayne missed this one) met last week in Tekamah to discuss the situation and concluded their meeting by recommending a hard-surfaced road building program.

Roads throughout the state need improving and pressure for a better highway program is mounting steadily. Road improvement, of course, cannot be accomplished without spending money, which, in turn, must be raised by taxation. If Nebraska's roads are to be improved to any great extent, it can be done only if the people are willing to pay the price. Merely declaring that good roads are needed and then turning the problem over to the legislature is not enough—if we really want passable highways we must be willing to advance the necessary cash.

But regardless of that fact, certain road improvements are going to be made every year from money on hand, and even if only a little is spent for that purpose, it will be spent first in those counties which most consistently make themselves heard.

Way Back When . . .

Further reason to believe that things are moving too fast for the average person to keep pace comes from Reno, Nev., divorce center of the nation, where it is reported that a plaintiff's petition for divorce was denied on the grounds of insufficient evidence. We always thought mere suspicion was enough out there.

At the same time, the industry has hinted that its products are not to be classed in the same category as the lather stuff many of us know as "soap."

They come in various forms, likely are excellent products and no doubt are well known to the average housewife. Who can blame him if he brings home a different brand than the one his wife associates with one of those daytime radio programs.

He was a delightful man to know, a wholly trustworthy, an upstanding citizen and an eminent lawyer who ever and always stood for the right."

Frank Yerby, author of Foxes of Harrow has written The Golden Hawk, which is perhaps as good as The Vixens but neither of these last two books were as good as his first one.
