A month or so ago the Ford Motor Contered the demand of its wags workers countered the demand of its wage workers for wage increases with the proposal that the workers accept, instead, a pay cut. This week, however, Ford followed the pattern manufacturers by offering an 1: to 13 cents hourly boost. In recent weeks, manufac-turers of other products also have granted pay increases to their employees.

pay increases to their employees. Closely following new wage increases have been the inevitable price raises on automobiles and other manufactured ar-ticles. The cost of living is advancing again. It makes us remember the OFA and the statements that were made when the gov-ernment agency was ended. Manufacturers were loud in their claims that prices soon would level off under the competition that was bound to result when unfettered indus-try was given a chance to go into quantity production. Some—but not all—of the gen-eral public didn't like OFA either . . . it seemed to have no place in the American system of free enterprise.

Result: There would have been no Abraham Lincoln.



Omaha Journal-Stockman says one rea-son Tor the existing shortage of beef is the fact that lightweight Mexican cattle are no longer being shipped into the U.S. for fattening. No cattle from Mexico have been allowed to enter this country since De-cember 1946 because of foot-and-mouth disease.

That accounts for a lot of beef because according to the Journal-Stockman, the J. S. obtained (in 1946) 410,522 Mexican

U. S. öbfained (in 1946) 410,522 Mexican cattle and calves weighing from 200 to 700 pounds, and 25,714 beef animals weighing more than 700 pounds. Imports of cattle from Canada are fewer, too. It appears that the demand for beef by American consumers probably won't be satisfied for some time to come... and the price of steaks may be expected to knock gaping heles in the daily food budget.
